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## Overseas Premiers Outline a Plan For Settling Disputes

**An Empire Tribunal Will Be Named—Submission of Disputes Must Be Voluntary Not Obligatory—Both Parties Must Agree to Arbitrate.**

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

LONDON, Nov. 3—Heads of the overseas delegations to the Imperial Conference agreed on the outline of the Plan for an Empire Tribunal to decide disputes between Units of the Empire.

The premiers have agreed to the following details.

1—The submission of disputes must be voluntary, not obligatory.

2—The court will not be permanent, because it might become too rigid.

3—Both parties to a dispute must agree to arbitrate.

4—The decision of the tribunal, once a case is submitted, must be binding.

## DR. EINSTEIN IS OPPOSED TO AUTOCRACY

London, England, Nov. 3—Strong opposition to regimes such as those existing in Russia and Italy was expressed by Professor Albert Einstein, in a signed article in the Sunday Dispatch yesterday.

"It seems to be that the distinctions separating the Social classes are afise, Einstein wrote. In the last analysis, they rest on force, and I am convinced that degeneracy follows every autocratic system."

## A BIG LIST OF UNEMPLOYED

## PLANE CRASHED ON P. E. ISLAND N. B. MAN HURT

Summerside, P. E. I. Nov. 2—Level headed flying ability, plus plenty of grit saved two lives at Lot 16, near here, this afternoon about 4.30 o'clock, when a plane from the Moncton airport crashed just after taking off. The pilot, H. S. (Junior) Jones, of Apohaqui, N. B., and passenger, Charles Yeo, 15, are in the Prince County Hospital, the former suffering from a broken nose and shock and the latter a broken leg and cuts.

The plane had just taken off and reached an altitude of about 25 feet when the motor stalled and cut dead. Pilot Jones tugged frantically at the throttle in vain effort to make his motor catch again, but the spark was apparently dead and the weight of the motor, plus the wind, forced the nose down in a dive.

Jones did everything possible to lengthen the dive to a glide, but did not have sufficient altitude. He yelled to his passenger to brace himself and then the plane crashed.

Pilot Jones lifted his goggles just before the crash hit and in spite head injuries, jumped from the wreck and hauled his passenger from the rear cockpit to save him from the fire hazard. Both were taken to a nearby farm and medical aid summoned. Both were ordered to the hospital here, where they are under observation.

## PROVISIONAL CABINET IS BEING FORMED

**Acting President of Brazil Has the Powers of a Dictator—Election to Be Held Soon.**

Rio De Janeiro, Nov. 3—Holding "Dictionary Powers" which political observers interpreted as those of a virtual dictator" Dr. Getulio Vargas continued today with plans for the formation of a provisional cabinet pending his ultimate assumption of the Brazilian Presidency.

The first act of the provisional government was expected to be the dissolution of congress to be followed by national elections. It was understood that the elections would be held after November 15th, when the term of the Washington Luis administration will expire.

## BIG SHIPMENT OF WEST INDIES FRUIT DUE SOON

**S. S. Lady Rodney Due at Montreal Next Monday**

**WILL HAVE A  
LARGE CARGO  
It Will Comprise 120,000  
Oranges and Grape  
Fruit**

Moncton, N. B. Nov. 3—On the eve of Armistice day there will arrive in Montreal the third of a series of record shipments of grape fruit and oranges from Jamaica for distribution across Canada—recently Canadian National steamer Cathcart brought a mixed consignment comprising 30,000 specimens of these fruits. On Monday the Lady Rodney will dock and discharge even larger cargo of these tropical articles of food whose importation into Canada from Jamaica has increased 100 per cent in the past year as a result of the Canada West Indies trade treaty of 1925 and the resultant establishment of steamships to serve as up to date and refrigerated carriers. The Armistice Day shipment will be huge, comprising 120,000 pieces of these two fruits. Their quality and appearance is said to equal that of the first shipment which arrived this week and was the largest to date ever shipped direct from the West Indies.

## The Unemployed In Great Britain Increasing Fast

**The Number of Jobless at the End of October Was 2,100,000, or 1,000,000 more than a year Ago—May Be Three Million by End of Next Winter.**

LONDON, Nov. 3—The number of unemployed in Great Britain is jumping at the rate of ten thousand to twenty thousand a week and at the end of October totalled 2,100,000 which was almost 1,000,000 more than at the same time last year.

Failure of trade to revive this autumn which had been hoped and the apparent lack of success of the Imperial Conference in solving the empire's economic difficulties have led to pessimistic predictions of 3,000,000 unemployed before the end of the winter.

## CONVICTS AT SING SING TRIED TO MAKE BREAK

Ossining, N. Y. Nov. 2—Three Sing Sing prisoners were in solitary confinement today, facing possible murder charges, a fourth was dead and prison authorities were conducting an investigation of last night's unsuccessful attempt by the four to shoot their way out of prison.

Meanwhile 100 keepers searched 2,230 convicts and their cells in an attempt to determine whether any others had guns. They found none, but in a cell-block they discovered a hook and long rope similar to those the four men used in an effort to scale the wall.

### Body Claimed

Relatives today claimed the body of Harry Gordon, 23, Bronx robber, who took part with his three accomplices in a pitched battle with armed guards in the huge prison yard while sirens shrieked and flood lights glared.

Gordon, after slightly wounding Keeper Howard Marquard, was himself killed by four bullets from the gun of Marquard, who is an expert shot.

Herbert Davis, serving five years for grand larceny in the Bronx, was recovering today from a scalp wound received in the battle. Edward Ryan, who had escaped from the prison in 1928 and who was serving a long term for assault and gun carrying, showed no ill effects from the fight with guards, nor did William Lapere, convicted robber from Manhattan, although they were captured only after tear gas had been used.

## HIGH SCHOOL WON FROM MT. A. ACADEMY

Sackville, N. B., Nov. 1—Fredericton High School defeated Mount Allison Academy 11 to 0, in a fast game here this afternoon in the provincial school semifinal.

Fredericton kicked off with the sun and wind facing them and drove right into Mount Allison territory. Curry made the first try after a scrum five yards from the Mount Allison line, five minutes after the start of the game. The pigskin remained in Fredericton territory for the rest of the period with Academy fighting hard. Fredericton showed up well in passing and running as well as in dribbling.

## A BROTHER OF LORD THOMSON PASSES AWAY

### A Woodstock Heroine
