British Troops are On Guard Against Afridi Tribesmen

Repeated Threats Made Against the City of Peshawar India—Royal Air Force Planes Maintain Their Bombing Raids Against Unconquered Warriors—Clash with Tribesmen.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

PESHAWAR, India, Aug. 9—Reinforced British troops guarded Peshawar today against the continued threat of Afridi tribesmen to advance and attack the city. The Royal Air force planes maintained their bombing raids, flying high over the so-called tribal territory, a few miles from Peshawar, to harass the frontiers unconquered warriors before they were able to summon neighboring tribes to their aid. Slight Afridi casualties were reported after an advance guard of British troops clashed with the tribesmen near Landi.

Former War Minister Dies.

Berlin, Aug. 9—The death of General Walther Reinhardt, 58, last Prussian Minister of War occurred yesterday. He was the first commander-in-chief of the Reichswaehr, General Reinhardt retired in 1927.

LIVINGSTONE MEDAL GOES TO ARGENTINE MAN

Buenos Aires, August 9—The centenary David Livingstone medal of the American Geographical Society, of New York, was presented to Minister of Agriculture, Jose M. Sobral, of Argentina, yesterday for his work in mapping the Argentine Andes.

Robert Woods Bliss, United States Ambassador to Argentina, presented the medal on behalf of the Society. The medal is awarded annually to the geographer accomplishing the most outstanding work in the western hemisphere.

MANY ATTEND FUNERAL OF COMPOSERS SON

Berlin, August 9—Siegfried Wagner, son of the great composer, Richard Wagner was buried yesterday at Beyeruth. Mourners included Arthur Toscanini, the conductor, former King Ferdinand of Bulgaria and Prince August Wilhelm, of Prussia. Prince Wilhelm acted as representative of the former Kaiser.

WEAR THE KILT DRIVE FALLS FLAT

Millport, Scotland, August 9—Millport has refused to become a town of kilts. The kilted pioneers of the town, who started this year to popularize the "grab of Old Gaul" in the island of Cumbrae, have abandoned their campaign and have gone back to the conventional trousers. Despite the intermittent heat waves of the past two months the two local business men who led the movement among their fellow-islanders for the "wear the kilt" campaign. NEW CABINET SETTLED DOWN TO BUSINESS

Ottawa, August 8—Premier R. B. Bennett had no announcement to make when he emerged from the Privy Council chamber early this evening at the conclusion of the second meeting of his Cabinet. Departmental matters, it was intimated, had engaged considerable attention. Cabinet will meet again early next week.

The attendance at today's sitting was unusually large. In addition to the Prime Minister, Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, who was sworn in at Government House two hours before the Cabinet convened, was present with Sir George Perley, Minister with Portfolio; Hon. Gideon D. Robertson, Minister of Labor; Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice; Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce; Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals; Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of Pensions and National Health; Hon. H. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works; Hon. C. H. Cahan, Secretary of State; Hon. D. Sutherland, Minister of National Defence; Hon. Alfred Durand, Minister of Marine; Hon. Thomas G. Murphy, Minister of Interior, and Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Immigration and Colonization and Minister of Mines.

Hon. Maurice Dupre, Solicitor-General, left early this afternoon for Quebec. Several of the other Cabinet ministers from Quebec and one or two of the Ontario ministers will make fleeting visits to their homes over the week-end.

CONTRACTS FOR FIVE BRIDGES ARE AWARDED

A Millville Firm to Construct the Patterson Gulch Bridge in the Parish of Kingsclear, York County.

Contracts for five more new highway bridges for the improvement of New Brunswick's highway system have been awarded by Hon. D. A. Stewart Minister of Public Works. Yet most important of the five new structures is the Little River (Mouth) bridge on trans-Canada highway at the town of Grand Falls, parish of Drummond, Victoria County, for which the contract has been awarded to Smith and Williamson, West Saint John, the approximate price \$16,000.

The contract for the Patterson Gulch concrete arch culvert and roadway embankment, on trans-Canada highway No. 2, in the parish of Kingsclear, York County, between Fredericton and Woodstock, has been awarded to Estey and Liston, Millville, the approximately price \$8,000. This work consists of a six-foot concrete arch culvert and embankment fill with adjacent roadway excavation approaches, covering a total of 1.15 feet. It replaces a stone masonry box culvert and eliminates one of the few remaining dangerous curves between Fredericton and Woodstock on trans-Canada highway No. 2, as it follows the St. John river valley.

The contract for the Davis Brook concrete arch culvert on No. 3 highway, elading from St. Stephen to a connection with the trans-Canada highway at Long's Creek, has been awarded to Geo. R. Mavor, Siver du Chute, the contract price being approximately \$7,500.

The contract for Teague Brook bridge on No. 11 highway, between Bathurst and Caraquet in Gloucester county, has been awarded to Douglas and Wood, Fredericton, the approximate price being \$7,000.

The contract for Little Elm Tree bridge, which is also on No. 11 highway in Gloucester county, between Bathurst and Dalhousie, has been awarded to Randolph Gammon, of Durham Bridge, the contract price being approximately \$5,000.

The chief bridge engineer, C. A. MacKay states that there five construction jobs will be carried out without any appreciable interference with motor traffic.

BISHOP OWNS A SALOON

London, August 9—Owning a bar is just as natural an investment for a clergyman as for any other individual, according to the view of Dr. A. G. Rawstorne, Bishop of Whalley, Lancashire, who is attending the Lambeth Church conference here.

"I actually own a fully licensed public house near Blackburn," said Bishop Rawstorne in discussing problems then before the licensing commission.

"A public house, run as it should be run, can be as clean as business as any other," the bishop told a London newspaper. "It is at present let to a brewery and is managed by a widow, who, but for this work, would be without means of livelihood."

MARION IS NOW IN HANDS OF MILITARY

An Undercurrent of Racial Antagonism Prevails

TWO NEGROES WERE LYNCHED

State Troops Called in to Prevent Further Trouble

Marion, Indiana, August 9—Peaceful to all outward appearances but acutely aware of an undercurrent of racial antagonism the city of Marion was in the hands of state troopers today.

Since Thursday night when a mob stormed a Grant county jail, dragged two negroes into the streets, beat and hanged them there have been evidence of racial hatred that may develop into rioting officials, who requested the state soldier's aid.

Miners Killed by Fall of Rock in Penn. Coal Mine

Seven Met Death and Sixteen Were Injured When the Top Rock of a Tunnel Gave Way—Were at Work 1,900 Feet Under the Ground.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 9—Sixteen miners injured by a fall of rock which killed seven other workers in the Gilbert mine of the Philadelphia and Reading coal and iron company near here late yesterday, were recovering today while company officials investigated the cause of the accident. A crew of twenty-three men were laying new rails in a slope, 1900 feet underground, preparing for reopening of the mine which had been closed since last May when top rock in the tunnel became loose. Tons of rock and ceiling timber fell on the men. Miners from nearby collieries were rushed to the Gilbert mine and the first of the entombed men was reached one hour after the accident.

THE LAWYERS PREDOMINATE IN NEW HOUSE

Ottawa, August 8—Lawyers will predominate in the new House of Commons when the special session is summoned early in September. Out of 245 members, returns now make it possible to classify the occupations of 236, and those returns indicate that no fewer than 70 members of the legal profession have embraced politics as part of their career.

The Province of Quebec leads the wave of barristers, with 27. This is the largest provincial group from any profession that will be summoned to the Commons.

Of farmers there are 44; physicians and surgeons, 29; merchants, 19; notaries public, six; journalists, six; manufacturers, 13; publishers, 3, and gentlemen, seven.

The remainder range all the way from one gardener to one ship-owner, with teachers, a flax-grower, contractor, accountant, college professor, ship agent, locomotive engineer also included.
