The Rebel Movement In Burma is Likely To Become Serious

Delegates at the London Conference Attribute it to the Serious Economic Situation Due to the Low Price of Rice—British Troops in a Scrap With Natives.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

LONDON, Dec. 27—Unrest and rebellious outbreaks in Burma are likely to be intensified in the opinion of the Burma delegates attending the Indian Round Table Conference today.

The delegates attributed the rebel movement to the serious economic situation in Burma, due chiefly to the fact that the price of rice is now 30 per cent lower than the cost of production. Nearly four fifths of the Burmese population is dependent in some respects upon rice cultivation, the delegates said. Burma has at least one million unemployed, Burmese here said.

British Troops in Action

Rangoon, Burma, Dec. 27—British troops were in action against rebellious natives in the Tharrawaddy district today, and first reports received here estimated that eighty natives had been killed resisting the troops.

STOCK SWINDLE PULLED OFF IN CHICAGO

SCHOOL BOYS PLAY MARBLES WITH GOLD

Hollister, Mo., Dec. 26—School boys near here have been playing marbles with gold nuggets which the authorities believe were found near the home of Jake Gleague, Western bandit, who was shot to death at Brandon, Mo., several months ago.

The boys refused to divulge the location of their cache. Clyde Chapman, a railroad station agent here, said his son was one of those who found the nuggets. A test proved the nuggets are gold.

At the time Gleague was killed by officers there was much speculation here as to the cache in which it was believed he had hidden the loot taken in a number of robberies.

Chapman said there was as much as a double handful of the nuggets in possession of the boys.

ALIMONY CLUB HAVE LITTLE TO WORRY ABOUT

Chicago, Dec. 26—"Ho hum!" That said one of the veterans of Chicago's "Alimony Club" of 35, doing his second six months' term in the county jail, was his reaction to the business depression he said he "understood was going on outside."

TRADITIONS CAST OFF BY TALKIES

Los Angeles, Dec. 27—Excitement and lights and the new experience of talking pictures give the singer an entirely new technique and change traditional ideas of song, according to Grace Moore, beautiful opera star.

"In opera," says Miss Moore, "every song has a tradition behind it, and every opera a tradition method of presentation. But in pictures, under lights, with new ideas crowding into the story every minute, traditions are swept entirely aside. In fact, directors seem to want to avoid any traditional methods and instead strike out on new ideas and new technique in every picture."

"Hence the singer finds that preconceived rules of song must be abandoned in what is really dramatization of music."

What effect this will ultimately have on opera, she says, is problematical. "It is possible," she ventures, "that opera singers coming to the screen will carry back with them some of the screen's ideas and may eventually inspire in opera the progressiveness of the screen. At any rate, pictures will be a great benefit in giving the artist a new slant, so to speak."

THE PREMIER GOING TO REGINA NEXT WEEK

Ottawa, Dec. 26—Returning from a Christmas holiday spent at Sackville, N. B., Premier R. B. Bennett reached the Capital shortly before midnight.

Mr. Bennett said he had no appointment to meet Hon. Parker Moloney, Australian Minister of Markets, in the Capital; although it is possible that if Mr. Moloney arrives from Quebec City tomorrow the Premier and the Australian Minister may have a brief conference.

Intimation was made officially earlier today that Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce, now on his way from Vancouver to Ottawa, will meet Mr. Moloney in the Capital for a further discussion respecting the new Canada-Australian trade agreement.

On Sunday, Mr. Bennett will depart for Regina, where he will speak on December 30. Following the meeting, he will leave for Calgary to spend New Year's and will likely be back in Ottawa within 10 days.

A Noted British Industrialist Died Early Today

Lord Melchett Closes a Brilliant Career After a Brief Illness—An Attack of Phlebitis the Cause of His Demise—Tin Producers Reach an Agreement.

LONDON, Dec. 27—Lord Melchett, noted British industrialist, died today after a brief illness. He was sixty-two years old. The powerful industrialist who formerly was Sir Alfred Mond, was stricken with phlebitis.

London, Dec. 27 (Earlier Bulletin)—The condition of Lord Melchett, noted British industrialist, became grave today. Lord Melchett has been ill at his London residence for several days suffering from phlebitis. He lost strength last night. Lord Melchett is a director of many British industrial concerns, including Mond Nickel and Imperial Chemical Industries. He is the former Sir Alfred Mond.

Quota Fixed on Tin

London, Dec. 27—The executive committee of the Tin Producers Association has notified its members that an agreement has practically been reached for fixing international production quotas affecting 90 per cent of the world's tin output.

The agreement, it was said, will continue for two years and will be sufficiently elastic to meet fluctuations in the world demand.

TEXAS WOMAN POISONS SELF AND TWO SONS

Taylor, Tex., Dec. 26—Mrs. Fritz Heise, 61 a widowed mother, was dead and her two sons, Fritz and Rudolph, were dying tonight of poison which she apparently administered.

Mrs. Heise died late today. The three victims were found at their farm home near here suffering with arsenic poisoning.

A third son, Adolph, found his mother and brothers in a critical condition. Mrs. Heise had selected burial clothes for the boys and picked out a bouquet of flowers for their graves.

Adolph said his mother had been despondent for some time. She left a note telling of her troubles.

THE LONDON FLAPPERS LIKE OLDER HUBBIES

London, Dec. 27—London flappers "like 'em older," for marriage purposes, at least. Figures from the marriage bureaus show that of the 47,500 brides under 21, the majority of them picked boys from 21 to 23 as life partners; one girl of 17 married a man of 64, however, and one bride of 141 was 64, however, and a girl of 15 became the bride of a man 70.

Romance apparently is flourishing among England's younger women. An average of slightly less than one bride in six was under 21. And the fact that they very often choose their husbands from those older than themselves is attributed to the increased earning power of the men.

PEIPING TIRES OF TAX ON COSMETICS

Peiping, Dec. 27—Merchants of Peiping are again attempting to persuade authorities to abolish the Hatamen octrol tax, established to buy cosmetics for the Empress-Dowager Tsu Hsi.

During the Taiping rebellion the Manchu imperial house was short of funds. So a special tax was put on all goods for the benefit of the Empress-dowager, with the announced purpose of buying her cosmetics.

The tax is still being collected, and there seems no immediate prospect that it will be stopped, even though there is no longer an Empress-dowager.

A Fair Market

Merchants of Fredericton may cut prices following the Christmas rush, but not so the farmers. Chicken was still buyers at 25 cents per lb. and other farm commodities showed little or no slump in price. A few geese presumably for New Year's dinner, were going at 40 cent per lb.; beef was 7 and 9 cents a pound and pork 15 cents per lb. Potatoes sold at \$1.50 a barrel and cooking apples at \$1.25 per barrel. Butter brought 35 cents and eggs 55 cents. A good sized market is looked for Wednesday the last day of the old year.
