Death and Suffering From Heat Wave in The United States

A Scorching Sun Ran Up New Temperatures from the Atlantic Seaboard to the Rockies—Thermometers Showed from 90 to 100 Degrees—Death Toll May Exceed 100.

(Special to THE DAILY MAIL by the British United Press.)

NEW YORK, July 21—Promises of relief from a blistering heat wave brought faint cheer today to a nation from which was devastation toll of death and suffering over the week-end. Heat records of a quarter century were broken yesterday as hot winds, a searing sun ran up new high temperatures from the Atlantic seaboard to the Rockies. Temperatures of 100 were recorded in several states and readings of above 90 were common. Deaths from heat prostration and by drowning were expected to exceed one hundred. Livestock perished by the hundreds and crops throughout the midwest were scorched by the sun and withered by the lack of rain.

In this city there was a general exodus to Coney Island and other seaside resorts over the week-end. Prostrations from the heat in the city and suburbs were quite numerous.

TO HASTEN ANNULMENT OF DIVORCE

PRODUCTION OF SHOES IS FALLING OFF

Ottawa, July 21—Canada's production of leather footwear in May 1930 amounted to 1,524,938 pairs compared with 1,574,405 pairs in the preceding month and 1,638,350 in May, 1929, according to a report published by the Dominion Board of Statistics. Footwear for women accounted for 45 per cent of the total output and footwear for men for 26 per cent. The remaining 26 per cent was divided between children's models and boy's and girl's.

During May imports amounted to 105,306 pairs compared to 94,770 pairs in April and 85,108 pairs in May, 1929.

MONCTON IS SHOCKED BY A DOUBLE TRAGEDY

Two Women Shot by J. N. Wilbur and One Dies—Murderer Ends His Own Life With a Bullet.

Moncton, N. B., July 20—After fatally shooting Mrs. Etta Fitzsimmons, 60, a widow, and seriously wounding Mrs. Dolly Nester, 35, daughter of Mrs. Fitzsimmons in their home on Steadman street last night, I. Newton Wilbur, 37, turned a .32 revolver on himself as he was hastily making his exit from the upstairs residence of Mrs. Nester, put a bullet through his own temple and died in the back yard before medical aid arrived.

The murder and suicide were deliberately planned by Wilbur, according to information gained by the police. Mrs. Nester, who formerly lived in the United States near Boston, had of late been housekeeper for Wilbur, but the pair quarrelling and Mrs. Nester left the Wilbur home. Wilbur relented and Saturday night went to the home of Mrs. Nester and tried to induce her to return to his home.

Mrs. Nester's mother was with her daughter at the time. Wilbur it appears, talked with Mrs. Nester some twenty minutes, and, failing in his mission, pulled a revolver and began shooting.

Mrs. Fitzsimmons fell dead with a bullet through the breast and two shots were fired at Mrs. Nester, one striking her in the side of the face and the other in the wrist. Another woman in the house and two children, a nephew and niece of Mrs. Nester, fled from the house and gave the alarm.

Later tonight information from the hospital was that Mrs. Nester would recover.

The affair was one of the most sensational this area has ever heard. It is known that early this evening Wilbur endeavored to borrow a revolver from a resident of another section of the city.

The coroner's jury empanelled to enquire into the shootings met last evening and after viewing the bodies of Mrs. Fitzsimmons and Wilbur, adjourned until tomorrow evening at 10 o'clock when the evidence of a number of witnesses will be heard.

It is understood that Wilbur was seen in the vicinity of Lewis street, just a block away from where the shooting took place, about one-half hour previous. He had talked with several companions there and did not seem to be under the influence of liquor, nor did he say anything that would indicate that he had planned the affair.

Four shots were fired, three taking effect while the fourth was dug from the wall of the room by Police Officer Jack Randall.

Dr. Forbes, coroner, was notified. The bodies of Wilbur and Mrs. Fitzsimmons were conveyed to the morgue, while Mrs. Nester was rushed to the City Hospital for treatment. She is suffering from a bad wound in the neck and hospital authorities considered her condition critical.

PANIC WAS CREATED AT A MOVIE SHOW

Woman Killed and Many Children Hurt at Santiago

CRY OF FIRE WAS SHOUTED

Two Boys Outside of Place Caused the Trouble

Santiago, Chile, July 21—A woman was killed and a number of children were injured last night when a moving picture audience became panic stricken at the call of fire and rushed from the theatre. Two boys caused the panic, an investigation disclosed when they found a piece of film outside the theatre and set fire to it.

Walking to the theatre's entrance they shouted "Fire" and the audience fled. The theatre was located in a worker's section of Santiago.

A group led by Count Westarp left the party last week while the Gottfried Treviranus group seceded some months ago.

The City of Jarez Is Patrolled by Military Guards

Three Persons Were Killed in a Riot Which Attended the Chihuahua Gubernatorial Election Yesterday—Supporters of the Rival Candidates Clashed in 23 Precincts.

EL PASO, Texas, July 21—Military guards patrolled the streets of Juarez, Mexico, today, after three persons were killed in rioting attending the Chihuahua state gubernatorial election yesterday. Throughout the day supporters of the two candidates, Andres Ortiz, national revolutionist, and Manuel Prieto, Socialist clashed in the twenty-three precincts.

It was estimated that more than 50 persons were injured. Fifteen men were in hospitals today and numerous others had been discharged after receiving medical attention.

SHERIFF OF CHARLOTTE A VETERAN

St. Andrews, July 20—R. A. Stuart, High Sheriff of Charlotte county, observed his 90th birthday at his home here today and received scores of messages of congratulation. He received many callers, who extended the genial sheriff best wishes for many more birthdaydays.

Sheriff Stuart, who is still active in his office, has been sheriff for 47 years. He is said to be the oldest high sheriff in the province and to have held that office for the longest period of any in New Brunswick.

He moved to St. Andrews from St. George in 1883, when he was appointed sheriff.

Sargent, Jr., were at the Barker House last evening en route home from a fishing trip to Barachois, Gaspe County, P. Q. Mr. Currie gave them some valuable pointers in the art of fly fishing and they succeeded in landing eight salmon in one day. They greatly enjoyed the sport and plan to try their luck in New Brunswick next season.

Capt. L. R. Sargent, of Norfolk, Va., while motoring with his family north of Bathurst on Saturday struck a patch of new gravel and ditched their car. Fortunately it landed right side up and the occupants escaped injury. A road supervisor working near by went to the rescue with a crew of men, and as a result of their efforts the car was back on the road within an hour. Capt. Sargent in speaking of the accident, said that he had great difficulty in persuading the men to accept a pecuniary reward for their assistance.
