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## ROUMANIANS WON A VICTORY OVER GERMANS AND BULGARS

### French Troops Hold Ground On Somme Against Huns

#### Violent German Assaults Broken by French Quick Firers--- Russians Capture a Fortified Position Along With Many Prisoners---British Make Gains.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 6.—Russian troops yesterday captured a Teutonic fortified position in the region of the lower Gorodenka, in the direction of Halicz, Galicia, and drove the Austro-Germans toward the northwest, says the Russian official statement issued today.

The number of prisoners taken in fighting on the lower Gorodenka, the statement adds, so far amounts to 4,500 men, among whom were about 2,000 Germans. Much war material was also taken.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—Violent artillery actions are in progress in the region of Lake Doiran and the Struma river, on the Macedonian front, in the sector held by the Serbians, the War Office announced today. No infantry engagements occurred on that front yesterday.

The positions newly won by the French south of the Somme were attacked several times by the Germans last night. Their assaults, the War Office announced today, were broken by the French fire. The German assaults were delivered in the region of Denicourt and Berny.

In the Verdun sector the Germans yesterday directed an intense bombardment against Fleury, but the French quick-firers prevented the German infantry from advancing. The rest of the front was quiet.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—The British again pushed forward on the Somme front last night. They gained possession of all of Leuze Wood, the War Office announced today. Fighting continues between Leuze Wood and the village of Combles and in the vicinity of Ginchy.

#### British Troops Have Gained Possession of Leuze Wood—Gas Was Used Successfully

The text of the British official statement follows:  
“The artillery on both sides has been active north of Pozieres and in the neighborhood of Moquet Farm. Last night we discharged gas successfully opposite Gommecourt.

“During the night our troops gained possession of the whole of Leuze wood. Fighting continues between the wood and Combles village, and around Ginchy.

“Yesterday afternoon our heavy artillery effectively shelled the enemy's buttments in Holygon wood, east of Ypres.”

#### German Naval Officer Tells How Cruiser Karlsruhe Met Her Fate Early in the War

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Captain Aust, second officer in command of the German cruiser Karlsruhe, has published a book entitled “War Adventures of Karlsruhe,” stating that in November, 1914, when the Karlsruhe was lying in latitude 10.7 north, long. 55.2 west, she was torpedoed by an invisible craft. The ship broke in two and sank immediately with her commander and many of the crew.

The Karlsruhe was accompanied by the steamers Indriani and Rio Negro as colliers, which rescued many of the crew. The Indriani reached Norway and the Rio Negro arrived in a German harbor later.

#### Greek Authorities Undertake to Deal With German Agents in the Greek Capital

LONDON, Sept. 6.—A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from its Athens correspondent says:

“From no on no arrests will be effected here by the English or French secret police, but only by the Greek authorities. Among those already arrested is Prince Aliriza, German cousin of the Khedive of Egypt. Baron Schnecht has not been to the British legation to surrender himself, as has been reported. He stands to be treated by the Greek authorities like other persons whose expulsion is demanded. The Baron's right-hand man, Hoffman, one of the most redoubtable German agents, and a major in the German army, was arrested yesterday evening.

#### PROPAGANDIST TO QUIT GREECE.

ATHENS, Sept. 6 (via London).—Baron Von Schenk, chief director of the German propaganda in Greece, who was arrested last week in connection with the rounding up of German agents by the French and British, had an interview today with a British official, with the result that he will be permitted to leave Greece tomorrow. Provision has been made for his safe conduct.

### OFFICER'S CAS- UALTY LIST WAS HEAVY

London, Aug. 25.—(Correspondence) Casualties for the first two weeks of August show that the British army lost 600 officers killed, 1,702 wounded and 204 missing, a total of 2,506. This brings up the losses since the beginning of the war to 38,922 officers, of whom 11,342 have been killed or died of wounds, 24,680 wounded, and 2,800 missing.

In the fortnight six Lieutenant Colonels were killed.

### Chicago Woman Shoots Husband

Chicago, Sept. 6.—Mrs. Iva Barnes confessed today, the police said, that she shot and killed her husband, Jas. R. Barnes, while they were strolling in Washington Park last night.

The woman, who has been estranged from her husband, told the police he had attempted to strangle her and that she fired the shots to save her own life.

#### STILL TAKING PRISONERS.

Russians Report a Haul of Nearly Five Thousand Teutons.

Petrograd, Sept. 5.—In the direction of Vladimir Volynski, on the upper Sereth, Russian troops in battles lasting from Thursday to Saturday, captured 115 Teuton officers and 4,515 men.

They also took six cannon, 35 machine guns and four mine throwers.

This information was contained in the Russian official statement issued today.

### SESSION OF HUNGARIAN DIET WAS A VERY STORMY ONE

#### Premier Tisza Greeted With Derisive Shouts--- Premier Still Thinks That Huns Will Win the War---Government's Methods Criticized.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—According to a Budapest telegram, says Reuter's correspondent at Amsterdam, yesterday's session of the Hungarian diet was an extremely stormy one. When Premier Tisza entered the House he was greeted with loud shouts of “resign” from the party of Count Michael Karolyi. The three other opposition parties remained quiet.

When order was restored, Tisza, who was repeatedly interrupted, said that the attitude of the Roumanians was without precedent in the history of the world, and that he hoped measures which had been taken would shortly bear fruit.

“Roumania will not escape her fate,” the Premier is quoted as declaring. “I am confident that we will win this war on all frontiers. Our duty is to maintain the unity of Hungary in its fight for existence.”

Ex-Premier Count Julius Andrápy agreed that the entire energy of the nation should be exerted in the fight which was in self-defence, but he criticized the manner in which the government carried on its business and its lack of foresight.

The position of the country, the ex-Premier said, was serious, but not critical, and while he had confidence in the outcome, there must be a new leadership.

#### DANISH STEAMER GOES DOWN.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—The Danish steamship Jeanne, of 1,170 tons gross, has been sunk, according to a despatch from Weymouth to Lloyd's Shipping Agency. The captain and crew of the vessel have been landed. The Jeanne was 232 feet long, built at Newcastle, Eng., and owned in Copenhagen.

#### A TEUTONIC CONFERENCE.

BERLIN, Sept. 6 (by wireless to Sayville).—Delegates representing Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey have met at Budapest for a conference in regard to the extension of traffic on the Danube.

### ROUMANIAN FORCES HAVE REPULSED AN ENEMY INVASION

#### Our New Ally Now in Possession of the Frontier East of the Danube---Rou- mania Invasion of Austria Meeting With Success.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Official announcement is made by the Roumanian War Office that attempts of the Germans and Bulgarians to invade Eastern Roumania have been defeated and that Roumanians are in possession of all the frontier east of the Danube, along which the attack was directed.

The Roumanian invasion of Austria is being carried on with further success. After spirited fighting in the region of Borzeckel, the Roumanians captured heights west of that point.

The announcement follows:  
“On our northern and northeastern fronts, after spirited fighting in the region of Borzeckel, the heights to the west of that district were occupied by us. We captured four officers and one hundred and fifty men.

#### Roumanians are Now in Possession of All Of the Frontier East of the River Danube

“We possess all the Dobrudja frontier, Bulgarian and Roumanian, east of the Danube. An attack south of Basardjik was repulsed. The battle continues on the remainder of the frontier. The enemy bombarded Isalox and Calafak, on the banks of the Danube.

“In an aerial attack on Constanta, Kustendje, by three hydro-aeroplanes, bombs were dropped and several civilians, including children, were wounded.”

#### Official Communication Tells of Further Success by Roumanians on Northern Front

BUCHAREST, via London, Sept. 6.—Capture of prisoners and supplies and the repulse of attacks against their positions are announced in an official communication issued by the Roumanian War Office. The statement reads:

“Small encounters have occurred along the whole of the northern and northwestern front. We repulsed two hostile attacks in the Merizor Valley.

“We captured at Sepsizent more than 500 wagons containing food stuffs and forage, and a completely equipped hospital. “In the upper Maros valley the enemy used dum-dum bullets. We captured 7 officers and 620 men.

“On the southern front superior enemy forces attacked the bridgehead of Tutrakan ten times, but each time was repulsed.”

#### Intrepid Aviator Tells How He Destroyed A Raiding Zeppelin and Won Victoria Cross

LONDON, Sept. 6.—Lieut. W. L. Robinson, the aviator, who has been awarded the Victoria Cross for bringing down a Zeppelin in the attack on London Saturday night, tells how he “got” his quarry, as follows:

“I had been up something over an hour when I first saw a Zeppelin. She was flying high. I followed, climbed to get a position above her, but in the heavy fog she escaped me.

“I fired at her at long range, but she made off before I could see if any damage had been done. I determined that the next ship I saw I would attack from the first position I found. I met her just after two o'clock. Soon she appeared to catch fire forward on her petrol tank. The flames spread rapidly along the whole body. She made off to the eastward afire. In a few minutes she dipped by the nose and dived slowly to the earth. I was so pleased that in my excitement I looped-the-loop several times and then showed my signal to stop firing, and came back to the landing place.”

#### BRITISH STEAMER KELVINA SUNK.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Sept. 6.—Cable advices received here from London state that the British steamer Kelvina, from Avonmouth to this port, had been sunk. There were no casualties. The cable did not state the manner in which the steamship met her end. The Kelvina left here August 17 with a cargo of mules and general merchandise.
