BREAD WILL BE
NINE CENTS PER
LOAF NEXT WEEK

Increase in Cost of Materials Compels Bakers to Advance Price--
--Same Has Been Done in Other Places.

Announcement is made today that bread will advance one cent per loaf after Saturday next, Sept. 9th.

All the Fredericton bakers are concerned in the increase, and it is said that heavy increases in the cost of flour, sugar and lard, are responsible for the raise in the price of the "staff of life."

Up to the present time the price of bread has been eight cents per loaf. Beginning with next week, the price will be nine cents per loaf.

Local bakers say that they are only following the course of bakers in other places, some of whom increased their prices some time ago.

The increase in the price of flour is the principal reason for the increase. Flour is now retailing for about ten dollars per barrel.

Resigns at Newcastle.

A despatch from Newcastle says that William H. Finley has resigned as Chief of Police and Scott Act Inspector and his resignation accepted with regret by the town council. The resignation is to go into effect September 19th, when he will come to Fredericton as chief of police here.

RECRUITING TOOK
BIG JUMP HERE
TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Seven Men Signed on--Two Men Wounded in France Re-Enlist--
Army Medical Corps Gets Three.

Seven recruits were enlisted at the local recruiting office yesterday afternoon. This is the best day's work in some time. Three of the recruits were for the 236th Highlanders, three for the Army Medical Corps, and one for the 140th Battalion.

The recruits were W. F. Godfrey, 25, Chatham; John H. Price, 18, Canterbury; Hugh A. Hamilton, 21, Canterbury; George B. Fisher, 18, Sussex; James King, 24, Fredericton; George W. Bird, 42, Burt's Corner; George F. Rossborough, 19, Prince William.

Bird is for the 140th, Godfrey, King and Rossborough for the 236th, and Price, Hamilton and Fisher for the Army Medical Corps.

Rossborough served in France with the 26th Battalion, and was invalided home. He was shot through the body, the bullet entering one shoulder and coming out the other, narrowly missing the spine.

King served with the 12th and 13th Battalions. He was three times wounded in France. He re-enlisted some few days ago, but was attested only yesterday.

Godfrey is the well known hockey player. He is a former Mount Allison student.

Thomas George Ballantyne, 21, of St. John, and Ernest W. Willis, 19, of Woodstock, have reported to the 236th Battalion here.
