Quebec, Aug. 30.—At five o'clock this morning a general strike of all the members of the Carmen's Union came into force, following the refusal of the Quebec Railway to recognize the union. The carmen some time asked for a raise of wages and delegated a committee of the union officers to meet the railway officials.

EXPONENTS OF HONEST GOVERNMENT MEET HERE

Politicians and Royal Commission Heroes In Secret Conclave -- Ways and Means For the Carleton County By-Election Considered---Treasurer Teed reports on Present Status of Timberland Boodle Fund---Organizer Woods and George B. Jones, M. P. P., Also Heard From.

There was a gathering of provincial politicians and Royal Commission heroes at the Barker House on Tuesday.

Some thought it had been called to wrestle with the problem of providing employment for returning soldiers after the war, but this was evidently an error.

It was merely a gathering of the exponents of honest and business-like government, assembled to deal with matters pertaining to the approaching by-election in Carleton county, and to provide ways and means for the same.

The notables present included Premier Clarke, Hon. J. A. Murray, Hon. B. Franklin Smith, representing the government; Mr. J. W. Brankley and Mr. E. R. Teed, representing the timberland boodle fund; Mr. Harry Woods, government organizer; Dr. Rankine, prospective government candidate in Carleton county; Mr. George B. Jones, M. P. P. for Kings and would-be railway magnate; and Mayor W. S. Sutton, of Woodstock.

Mr. Willard H. Berry, of Oak Bay, was expected, but did not put in an appearance.

A secret conclave was held on the previous night, lasting until a late hour. The Carleton campaign, particularly the "ways and means" feature of the same was fully discussed.

"Patriotic potatoes," a most prolific subject, also came in for some attention, and Hon. Mr. Smith explained that owing to a refund which he had been called upon to make, the party would have to look elsewhere for a campaign fund.

This statement naturally diverted attention to Treasurer Teed, who rose promptly to his feet and explained that much of the timber land boodle fund had been invested in stocks which had since slumped, and it was not an opportune time to realize on the same.

He also explained that there had been refunds which had reduced the amount of available cash. Mr. Teed also gave the gathering to understand that ex-Premier Flemming was anxious to know where he was to get off before throwing the weight of his influence into the Carleton campaign on behalf of the government candidate.

Mr. Harry Woods, after swapping winks with Mr. Brankley, stated that

he had interviewed certain of the lumber lords and found them not disposed to come across to any great extent at the present stage of the game.

Mr. Jones, who is always optimistic, assured the gathering that the Valley Railway contractors, although they had already been stung, were disposed to do their bit in the present crisis, providing they were given a square deal.

Hon. Mr. Murray, a committee to interview the graft organ and find out what it meant when it stated that Mr. Smith had already brought trouble enough upon the party, reported that he had not been able to secure the desired information. He asked for an extension of time and leave to make a further report, which was granted.

At a late hour the meeting adjourned to reconvene at Woodstock Thursday evening after the convention.

A NEW AUCTION

BRIDGE COUNT

The New York Whist Club has issued a new count in auction bridge which will be accepted as the standard throughout the country. In bidding any numerically higher declaration overcalls a lower. For example, three clubs overcalls two no trump. The new score and regulations are as follows:

	Clubs	Diamonds	Hearts	Spades	No trumps
Each trick over 6...	6	7	8	9	10
3 honors (simple).....	12	14	16	18	30
4 honors	24	28	32	36	40
5 honors	30	35	40	45	...
4 in one hand....	48	56	64	72	100
4 in one hand, 5th in partner's	54	63	72	81	...
5 in one hand....	60	70	80	90	...
Little slam	50	50	50	50	50
Grand slam.....	100	100	100	100	50

It will be noticed that the most significant change is the counting of only 50 for a grand slam in no trumps, which previously has brought 100.

Penalties, with slight exceptions, follow the old score. They are:

Penalties for Adversaries—Fifty for each lacking trick of declarant's bid. Doubled, 100; redoubled, 200.

Bonus for Declarant—Doubled—50 for fulfilling contract, 50 for each trick over contract and two times the value of the suit for each trick over the book. Redoubled—100 for fulfilling contract, 100 for each trick over contract and four times the value of the suit for each trick over the book.

Adversaries score 100 in honor column when declarant revokes.

Declarants score 100 in honor column or claim three tricks toward fulfilling contract when adversary revokes.

One hundred can be secured for each subsequent revoke during one deal. A revoking side cannot score except for honors.

If a player's bids except to pass or doubles out of turn, either adversary may demand new deal.

The Albanians have already disembarked here. They will be commanded by Essad Pasha, chief of the Albanian government, who arrived at Saloniki yesterday.

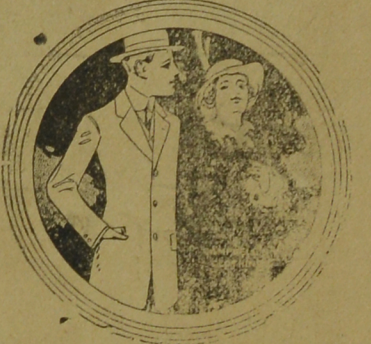

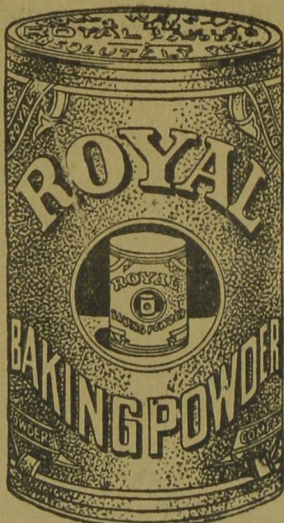
