GIVEN ONE MONTH IN GAOL FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Otly M. Thorne Convicted For Shoot-
ing Conn. Ackerly at Wickham
Last Autumn.

Otly M. Thorne was sentenced to one month's imprisonment in the Queen's county gaol by Mr. Justice Crockett at Gagetown late last night for manslaughter. Thorne was found guilty by the jury of manslaughter in connection with the shooting of Coun. Ackerly at Wickham on November 5 last. Coun. Ackerly had been out hunting deer. He failed to return home and his wife searched all night without finding him. Next day a searching party found the body in a sitting position with a bullet through it. Thorne, who was a deserter from the 26th Battalion, was known to have been in the vicinity. He was arrested shortly afterwards and has been in gaol ever since.

In bringing in the verdict yesterday, the jury made a strong recommendation for mercy, which the judge evidently acted upon. Mr. R. B. Hanson acted for the crown, the attorney general not being present, and Mr. B. L. Gerow of St. John, appeared for the defence.

N. S. Legislature Prorogued Today

Halifax, May 17.—The Nova Scotia Legislature closed this afternoon.

One hundred and thirty acts were passed during the session, including amendments to extend the temperance act to Halifax, which makes prohibition throughout the province. The election act was amended in keeping with the Federal act allowing soldiers leave of absence to go to their homes to vote at the coming elections.

Two new legislative councillors were appointed today to fill vacancies: Fulton J. Logan, M. P. P. for Halifax, and Dr. A. M. Covert, M. P. P. for Kings.

Express Drivers Out on Strike

(Canadian Press.)
 Chicago, Ill., May 17.—Railroad stations and the depots of eight express companies, whose seven hundred wagon drivers are on strike, were guarded by police today so prevent another outbreak of violence. One man was probably fatally injured yesterday and several arrests were made, when the drivers picketed the streets surrounding the depots and express teams and attempted to stop all express deliveries.

Trucks were turned back and not allowed to deliver their loads. No wagons operated in the residence section of the city and only little business was moved in the downtown district.




