HOLDERS OF U. N. B.  
TRACK AND FIELD  
RECORDS IN ARMY

Major A. N. Vince, Major A. E. G. McKenzie and Capt. E. J. Ryan all hold Records.

In connection with the U.N.B. track and field events, which were run off last Saturday, it is a noticeable fact that three holders of records who have had their names in the record list for many years, are now in the forces of the empire, fighting against Germany and her supporters. They are Major A. N. Vince, '98, Major A. E. G. McKenzie, '02, and Capt. E. J. Ryan, for some time a member of the class of 1904.

Major Vince's record of five feet, six inches in the running high jump, has stood for eighteen years. It has been approached closely on several occasions but never tied or surpassed. Major Vince, after graduating from the U.N.B., attended the Royal Military College at Kingston, and joined the King's Liverpool Regiment of the Imperial Army. He was seconded for service in India with the 1st Burma Regt., and after being there some years, returned to Woodstock, N.B., his native town. He was admitted to the New Brunswick Bar and was appointed a major in the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons on organization. On the outbreak of the war he volunteered and went with the 1st Contingent. In spite of his military experience, he could not get an appointment with the Canadian forces and rejoined his old corps the Liverpool, and is with them now. He is a South African veteran.

Major A. E. G. McKenzie of Campbellton, has a record for the standing broad jump that has stood for fourteen years and will probably stand much longer. He also holds the hammer-throw record. Major McKenzie is now second-in-command of the 25th Battalion in France, and during the sickness of Lt. Col. McAvity is actually in command of the corps.

Capt. E. J. Ryan left Canada with the Army Medical Corps in 1914 but afterward joined the Imperial forces. He has served in Egypt with a field hospital. His hop, step and a jump of upwards of forty-five feet was a remarkable performance and his mark has stood for fourteen years. In his day he was the best athletic U.N.B. had ever seen and when he left college his name stood after the records in almost all sprints and jumps. But one mark it left now,

FRED MOLLWITZ  
GOES TO WHITE SOX  
FROM CINCINNATI.

Moriarty Let go to Make Room-- Mollwitz Refused to Play in Out-field for Chicago.

Chicago, May 15.—George Moriarty, veteran third baseman, is to be released to the Memphis Southern Association club by the Chicago Association, it was announced today. He is slated to manage the club. His release will make room on the White Sox roster for Fred Mollwitz, Cincinnati first baseman, for whom negotiations were reported in progress last week, and for the return of Jess Ness, a first baseman released to Baltimore.

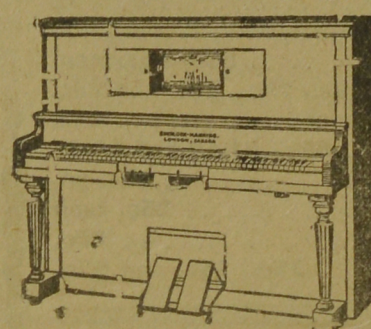

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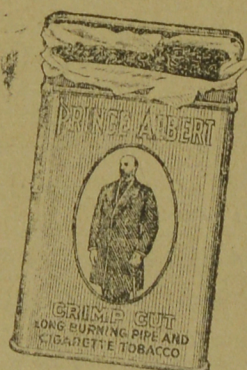
