## SOME MORE HOT SHOT FOR GOVERNMENT OF SCANDALS

It is a remarkable revelation to find at this late date that so many people knew of the buccaneering methods, knew of the graft that had been collected and the enormous levies made upon contractors and upon corporations, and Crown land licenses of the Government by the first man in the Province, Premier J. K. Flemming.

IF McLEOD KNEW ALL ABOUT FLEMMING'S GRAFT

WHY DID NOT THE OTHERS KNOW ABOUT IT?

The question naturally arises that if the Hon. H. F. McLeod, who but a month before had left the Provincial Government to become a candidate for Ottawa, knew of all of these things, did not his colleagues in the Government also know of them, and if they did, what then becomes of the attitude they assumed when L. A. Dugal made his charges in the House, when each and every one of them protested their innocence and their entire ignorance of anything that had been transpiring?

The note for \$5,000, which it will be remembered was referred to by Colonel P. A. Guthrie in the House of Assembly this winter, the reason why it was given, the circumstances surrounding it, and the revelations made by the Hon. H. F. McLeod in his endeavor to secure the money to pay it, are but another striking chapter in the history of what has been going on in New Brunswick under this present Government. The solemn declaration which gives all the particulars was used at Opposition meetings in the County of Westmorland tonight, and reads as follows:

AFFIDAVIT GIVES HISTORY OF BIG NOTE AND  
TELLS HOW BOODLE FUND WAS RAISED

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK, COUNTY OF YORK.

I, Harry M. Blair, of the City of Fredericton, in the County of York, accountant, do solemnly declare:

(1) That in the month of February, 1914, an election was held in the County of York for the purpose of filling a vacancy in the representation in the House of Assembly caused by the resignation of the Honorable H. F. McLeod.

(2) That Mr. Percy A. Guthrie was nominated to contest the said election as a supporter of the Government then led by the Honorable J. K. Flemming, and Mr. James M. Scott was nominated to contest the said election as an independent supporter of the same Government. The Opposition did not nominate a candidate.

(3) That the committee handling the campaign in the interests of the said Percy A. Guthrie decided that it was necessary to have for use in the said election a campaign fund of considerable size. It had been understood that there was a large fund in the hands of the Honorable James F. Flemming, remaining after the general election of 1912, and the said committee decided to try to obtain a portion of this fund.

(4) Several members of the committee, including the Hon. H. F. McLeod and myself, saw Mr. A. R. Gould concerning this, and he agreed to see the Honorable J. K. Flemming and to tell him that the committee, in addition to what they could otherwise raise, wanted a contribution of \$10,000 from Mr. Flemming. The said Mr. Gould informed us later that he had seen Mr. Flemming and that the said Mr. Flemming would provide the money. A little later the committee received a remittance, but it contained only \$5,000. The committee then pressed for the other \$5,000 as being absolutely necessary. Mr. Flemming promised to send it. A package came, purporting to be for the remaining \$5,000. When opened it contained only \$1,900.

At this the Hon. H. F. McLeod was very angry, and said he would bring Mr. Flemming to time. He said he knew all about him. Mr. McLeod then told me to take a paper and pencil and write as he dictated. I did so in the presence and hearing of the following gentlemen, namely: Harry A. Smith, Terence V. Monahan, Percy Gerow, Charles K. Howard, Albert Smith, John A. Young, M. P. P., Norman P. McLeod, Percy A. Guthrie.

## BATTERY'S ADVANCE PARTY LEFT FOR PETEWAWA

Doubtful When Battery Will Leave--  
140th Inspected Yesterday.

Major C. M. P. Fisher, officer commanding the 58th Howitzer Battery, stated this morning that the time of departure of his unit for Petewawa was not yet settled. The advanced party of the Battery, consisting of the Battery quartermaster sergeant and four men, left by I.R.C. last night for Petewawa. It had been expected that the Battery would leave some time Monday. Lt. Col. A. H. Anderson, C.O.C., is here from St. John today checking over the Battery's stores. The 58th will take gun teams and other equipment, a special train being provided.

Col. H. H. McLean, officer commanding the New Brunswick District, inspected C Company, 140th Battalion, in Wilnot Park Thursday. This morning C Company, 140th Battalion, marched out for tactical exercises. The battalion brass band played the troops out. It is not known definitely when the infantry units will leave Fredericton.

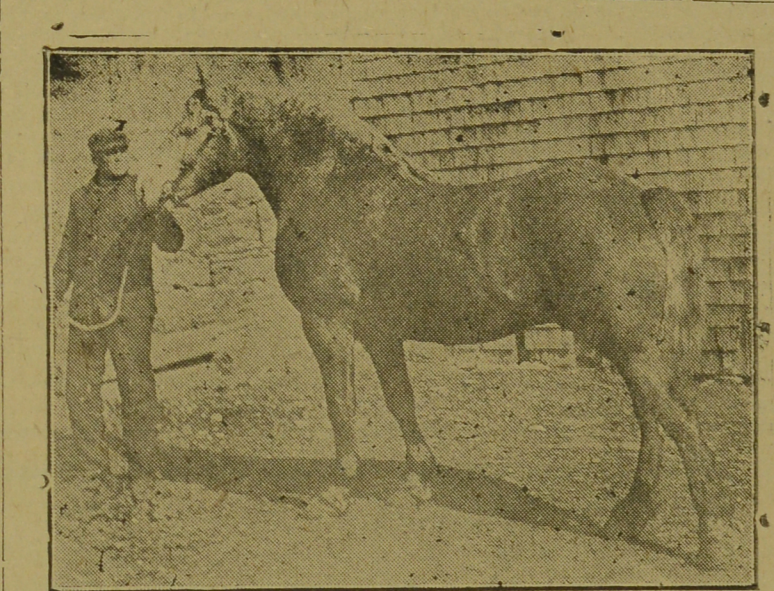
