RAFTING BEGAN
AT DOUGLAS BOOM
ON THURSDAY

Good Progress on Lower Section of Corporation Drive—Conditions on The Nashwaak are Satisfactory.

Rafting operations of the St. John River Log Driving Company began at the Douglas Boom yesterday. According to the information given Mr. Walter Jackson, manager for the company, eighty-seven men were at work there this morning. Rafting operations are hardly in full swing yet.

Mr. G. C. Grant, who is in charge of the company's driving operations below Grand Falls, stated last night that one drive was below Ardover and another below Meductic. The water is low for this season of the year but is not yet down to summer level.

On the Nashwaak.

On the Nashwaak River the drive of the Partington Pulp & Paper is about one mile below Stanley. The drive is now in a difficult part of the river and the water is falling. It is not anticipated, however, that the drive will be hung. So far good progress has been made when conditions are considered.

SENTENCED TO SIX MONTHS.

Clarence Brewer of Burt's Corner, who was charged with raising a cheque of the Partington Pulp & Paper Company, was sentenced to six months in gaol this morning by Police Magistrate Limerick. Sentence was suspended on account of the youth of the prisoner. The latter acknowledged the offense.

LIQUOR BEING
BROUGHT INTO CITY
SEIZED LAST NIGHT

Wagon-Load From Station on C. P. R. Intercepted by Police—The Second Seizure in Few Days.

The Scott Act activity displayed by the police within the past week was continued last night when a large seizure of liquor was made while the liquor was in transit to the city after being unloaded at a way station on the C.P.R. line between Fredericton Junction and this city.

The liquor was in a wagon in charge of a teamster who was bringing the consignment to Fredericton. Chief McCollom and Policeman Marshall were waiting for it below the city and made the teamster drive to the police station, where the liquor was unloaded and placed in the vault used as a place of safe keeping. Five barrels of ale, one barrel of gin, five cases of whiskey and one packing box of whiskey were seized.

This is the second seizure made within a few days by the police while liquor was in transit. On Tuesday night a consignment which arrived by steamer was seized while being delivered by a local teamster.

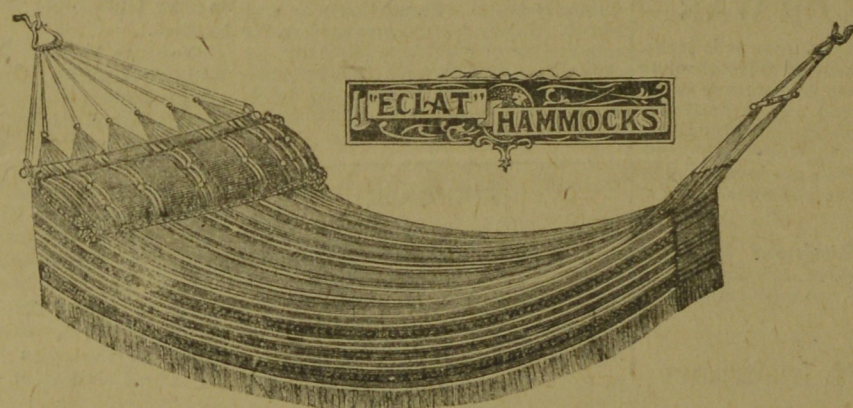
