THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

Sir Herbert Ames, M.P., Honorary Secretary of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, recently told a Toronto newspaper that he anticipated no difficulty in raising \$8,000,000 to meet the requirements of the fund for the year 1916. He expected the Province of Ontario to contribute one-half of the required amount, and looks to the other provinces to provide the remainder. Some statistics which Sir Herbert gave out in regard to the fund are of interest. He stated that up to December 31st last a total of \$6,618,055.99 had been pledged for the fund, of which the sum of \$4,648,938 had been advanced. The province of Ontario had contributed \$2,812,027.84; Quebec, \$1,982,228.46; British Columbia, \$411,304.08; Alberta, \$370,540.73; Saskatchewan, \$368,313.43; New Brunswick, \$281,210.72; and Nova Scotia, \$269,782.57. Montreal was the largest contributor among the cities of the Dominion, its total being \$1,484,341.69. Toronto was second, with \$830,483.74. Contributions from other cities were: Ottawa, \$358,288; Hamilton, \$220,434; Halifax (city and county), \$155,759; St. John and adjoining counties, \$149,266; Kingston, \$42,058; Sherbrooke, \$27,758; Belleville, \$27,000; Fredericton, \$21,769; Chatham, \$15,381.

Sir Herbert also gave some interesting figures in regard to the per capita enlistment in the different provinces, which up to December 31st was as follows: Albert and British Columbia, 1.23; Manitoba and Saskatchewan, 1.28; Ontario, 1.32; Maritime Provinces, 1.43; and Quebec, 1.83.

A statement published by Mr. D. P. Kingsley, President of the New York Life Assurance Company, gives some interesting information in regard to death losses sustained by the company during the year. It shows that the "white plague" accounted for 950 more than double the number killed in the war now raging in Europe. Deaths from pneumonia were 772, deaths from cancer, 707; deaths from accidents, 448, and killed in war, 409. The President says: "A modern war cannot be localized. Electricity, steam, and the partial conquest of the air have made the world so small that a great international upheaval shocks the whole of civilization. Life insurance isn't designed merely for times of peace. It would confess its inability highly to serve humanity if it did not measurably cover all the risk naturally incurred by healthy men."

Dr. Michael Clark, the eloquent member for Red Deer, had some fun at the expense of Hon. Bob Rogers and the House of Commons on Monday. He pointed out that during the middle of last session the Hon. Bob had made the discovery that "the electors were frothing at the mouth to tear the Senate to pieces." He subsequently learned that so far as his own province was concerned it was something other than the Senate that the electors were so eager to tear to pieces. "Mr. Rogers had evidently been convinced," he went on, "that the ferocious fangs of the electors of Manitoba at least had been whetting themselves for different prey."

Anticipating an increase in the customs duties, it is said that many wholesale merchants throughout the Dominion have of late been making heavy importations. The Government can get ahead of these enterprising merchants by making tariff increases retroactive. There would, of course, be no saving to the consumer, but the increased duty, instead of going into the pockets of the importers, would find its way into the revenue.

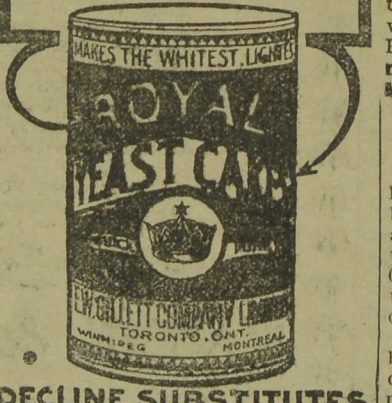
