## KING CONSTANTINE'S VIEWS

tune to any Greek fisherman—for information leading to the detection of a submarine base, but never yet received any news about a submarine base in Greece, and never yet have any submarines been supplied from Greece.

"The history of the Balkan politics of the Allies is a record of one mistake after another, and now, through pique over the failure of their every Balkan calculation, they try to unload on Greece the result of their own stupidity. We warned them that the Gallipoli enterprise was bound to fail; that negotiations with Bulgaria would be fruitless, and that the Austro-Germans would certainly crush Serbia. They would not believe it, and now, like angry, unreasoning children, the Entente Powers turn upon Greece.

### CLAIMS THAT THE ALLIES ARE RAPIDLY ALIENATING THE SYMPATHIES OF GREECE

"They have deliberately thrown away every advantage they ever had of Greek sympathy. At the beginning of the war 80 per cent. of the Greeks were favorable to the Entente. Today not 40, no not 20 per cent., would turn their hand to aid the Allies."

"Why does your Majesty not demobilize?" asked the correspondent.

"Perhaps I shall, but I do not feel I can afford to disarm before the fate of Saloniki is decided. The Allies evacuated Gallipoli after a year. One day they may change their mind about Saloniki, and leave the place at the mercy of the first comer.

"Saloniki is Greek. I propose that it shall remain Greek."

"Does your Majesty believe that Germany can be victorious?" asked the correspondent.

"That depends," replied the King, "on what is meant by victorious. If you mean take London, Paris and Pe-

trograd, probably not; but I believe that the Teutons can defend themselves where they are for a very long time. If economic exhaustion does not force Germany to sue for peace, I believe it would be very difficult, if not impossible, to conquer her in a military way."

"Then what does your Majesty believe as to the outcome of the war?"

The King replied: "A draw—don't you?"

By royal order the above interview was countersigned by Count Marshall Mercati.

### LAVERGNE DENOUNCES CONSERVATIVE ALLIES

Quebec, Jan. 17—Cheers and applause from the crowded galleries, as well as more moderate applause from several Liberal members of the House greeted Mr. Armand Lavergne, the Nationalist member for Montmagny, in the Quebec Assembly tonight, when he followed up his speech of last Thursday night by a more lengthy one, in which he denounced the Conservatives who had shared his views in 1910 and 1911 and who now turned away from him when he opposed Canada's participation in the wars of the empire.

Armed with newspaper files and other documents, he quoted from speeches delivered by Hon. Messrs. Patenaude, minister of inland revenue, Casgrain, postmaster general, Blondin, former deputy speaker of the Commons, now secretary of state and minister of mines, Sevigny, speaker of the Commons, and others at Athabasca in 1910 and during the election campaign of 1911 and declared that if he were a traitor there were many others like him. His views on the war at the present time were exactly the same as those expressed by Bourassa and himself in 1911 and the Conservatives, far from being scandalized, had offered both of them portfolios.

The member for Montmagny pointed to Sir Edward Carson and Lord Northcliffe and said if they were called Bourassa or Lavergne the English press of this province would cry out to shoot them down.

He did not want to be called a traitor by those who were traitors with him in 1911 and he invited any one of them to come before the electorate.

### VALLEY RAILWAY DIRECTORS.

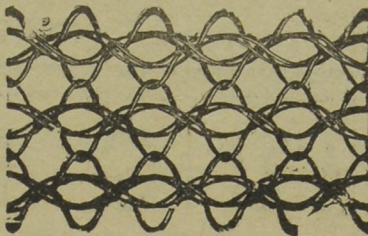
