## MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR MEN FALLEN ON WESTERN FRONT

Very Rev. Dean Neales Preached Eloquent Sermon --Veterans of European and South African Wars and of Fenian Raids Present--Boy Scouts Also Turned Out.

The Memorial Service at Christ-church Cathedral yesterday afternoon for the Canadian troops who fell in France and Belgium was attended by a large congregation which heard an eloquent sermon from Very Rev. Dean Neales. The service was attended by the European War Veterans' Association, veterans of the South African War and Fenian Raids and the Boy Scouts Patrols of Fredericton. The Fredericton Brass Band and the Boy Scouts' Bugle Band furnished music for the march. The procession formed at the Barracks' Square at three o'clock and marched to the Cathedral, where service began at 3.30.

#### The Sermon.

The Dean preached from the following text—Psalms 112:6; "The righteous shall be held in everlasting remembrance."

The preacher said the congregation had gathered to honor the brave men who had given their lives in the war, the men who had laid down all they held dear. Conditions had become such that each life lost on the field of battle was a sacrifice for God and man. The war had brought forth as fine a display of heroism as history ever had known and in the particular case in reference added lustre had been shed upon the name of Canada.

Those soldiers who had gone across the sea had not been professional soldiers. They had not been attracted by military life but had followed the occupations of civilian life. They had heard the call of country and had sprung to arms. The triple cross of Britain's flag had appealed to them and they had responded from homes of probity, piety and patriotism where they had learned the meaning of true citizenship. No sacrifice was considered too great by them.

#### First Anniversary.

During the week just past the first anniversary of that magnificent fight had been observed, in which the Canadians are said to have won the day. At Ypres and at St. Julien they had written the name of Canada in letters of fire across the banner of the empire. Because Canadian heroes, trusting in God, gave their lives, the British lines were holding today. Those who had fallen had been more concerned in duty bravely done than in life itself. To Canada they

had bequeathed their name of glory. The land which had become the adopted home of the United Empire Loyalists had proven worthy of that choice.

Speaking of the sacrifice of Canadian troops at St. Julien, the Bishop of London had said:

"Canada will be bound to us closer than ever before . . . for greater love hath no man than that he lay down his life for his friend."

Never had an Eastertide looked darker than that which had just been celebrated but at the same time, never in the history of mankind had there been so great self-sacrifice. Six million men were under arms in the empire and every man was a volunteer. Men and women were giving of their very best—their skill, their powers, their effects and their lives. The war had produced in France, Russia and Britain a spiritual awakening which was wonderful. There were evidences that the spirit of Jesus Christ shall indeed govern the nations.

The example of the blessed dead should be emulated. Justice, Freedom, Righteousness and Truth were the watchwords. All honor to the men who had given their best.

#### The Program.

The service had a number of special musical features. The program was as follows:

Processional hymn 219, "For all the Saints who from their labors rest."

Psalms (as set) Day 30. Chants 28, 97, 128, 300.

Magnificat. Chant 46.

Hymn 358, "God of our Fathers." (After Third Collect).

Hymn 325, "How bright these glorious spirits shine." (After sermon.)

After Second Lesson, here followed modified form of burial service. Three sentences by Priest at Chancel steps.

Psalms 46. Chant 131 Psalm 121. Chant 165. (Each given out separately.)

Lesson, followed immediately by singing "Man that is born of woman." (Service book 372).

Prayers.

After prayer, "Grant, O Lord"—the Nunc Dimittis.

Recessional hymn 656, "Unto the hills around."

## U. S. SOCIALISTS NAME CANDIDATES

New York, May 1.—Arthur E. Reimer, of Boston, was nominated for President of the United States, and Caleb Harrison of Chicago was nominated for Vice-President, by the Socialist Labor party in session here last night. Both nominations were unanimous.

## LINCOLN MUST GO BACK TO ENGLAND

Washington, May 1.—The Supreme Court today held that Ignatius Timothy Tribich Lincoln, former member of the British parliament, and confessed spy, must go back to England for trial on a charge of forgery.

## CUSTOMS REVENUE SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Ottawa, May 1.—The customs revenue of Canada for April was \$4,070,194 greater than in the same month last year. Total receipts last month were \$10,346,572.

## DONOHUE CASE RESUMED BEFORE POLICE MAGISTRATE

The case of William Donahoe, of St. Marys, charged with rape upon Charlotte McCoy, of the same place, a girl aged 14 years, was continued before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning. The case was heard behind closed doors and was adjourned until three o'clock this afternoon, when it was resumed.

The witnesses this morning were Dr. C. P. Holden, who attended the girl, Constable Charles Barker, of St. Marys, to whom she complained of the assault, and Mrs. Elizabeth McCoy, her mother.

Donahoe appeared in military uniform and evidently realizes the seriousness of his position.

There was no counsel for either prosecution or defence.

#### MISS HANEY'S DEATH.

The death occurred this morning at her home on Brunswick street of Miss Mary Haney, after an illness of three weeks from heart trouble. She was a daughter of the late Patrick Haney, and is survived by two brothers, James of Bangor and Patrick of this city, and four sisters, Mrs. Hickey, of Coldbrook, Mass., Mrs. John Murphy of Melrose, Westmoreland county, Mrs. W. P. Granen and Mrs. Thomas Flanagan of this city. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, with High Mass of Requiem at St. Dunstan's Church.

#### RIVER FALLING SLIGHTLY.

The St. John River has fallen slightly from the height reached last week. Driving operations in this section of the province are interfered with by lack of rain.

#### TWO RECRUITS.

Two recruits were sworn in at the local recruiting station this morning. They are James Foster, 24, Lansdowne, Carleton county, and William D. Campbell, 44, Fredericton. The former has joined the 4th Pioneer Battalion and the latter the Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery.

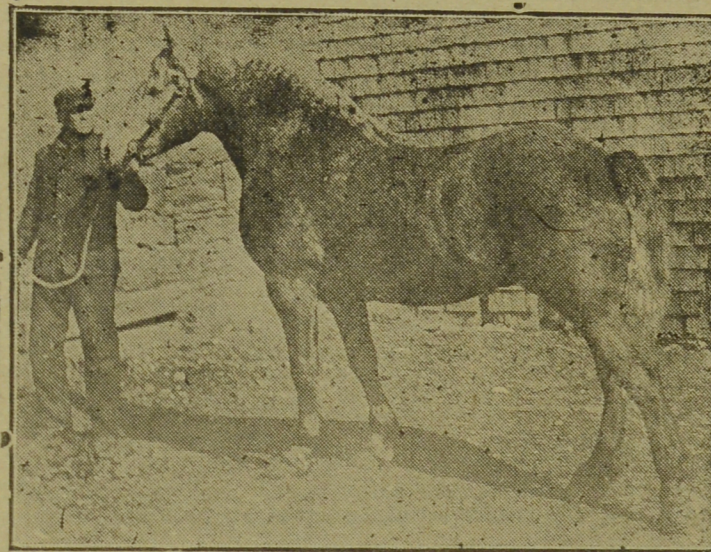
