Chief Justice Landry, who recently returned from Baltimore, is reported to be seriously ill at his home in Dorchester. His early retirement from the bench at full salary is forecasted.

Ex-Warden John Scott, who will celebrate his eighty-fifth birthday in the course of a few days, will leave tomorrow for Vancouver, B.C., to be absent some time. He will be accompanied by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Wm. J. Scott. Mr. Scott intends visiting his two daughters, who reside in Vancouver.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The tern schooner Moana, which has been discharging hard coal here for Mr. S. L. Morrison, left for St. John Saturday night in tow of the tug Hero. She is one of the largest schooners which ever visited this port. Another schooner of 525 tons has been chartered to load coal for Fredericton at \$4 per ton. The schooner Pochasset is also on her way here with hard coal.

GOING TO CALIFORNIA.

Dr. A. B. Atherton has disposed of his residence on Church street, to Mr. W. D. Gunter, and will leave about the middle of the month with Mrs. Atherton, for California, where they will reside in future. The doctor has long been recognized as one of New Brunswick's foremost surgeons and his departure will be a distinct loss to the province.

CASE RE LIQUOR SEIZURE.

Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared in the police court this morning on behalf of a local druggist who is called on to show cause why liquor seized under the Canada Temperance Act should not be destroyed. Mr. Hughes presented affidavits to which Mr. R. B. Hanson, for the city, objected. Ad-ournment was made until tomorrow to permit of the service of the affidavits on Mr. Hanson.

TO OPEN A CAFE.

Mr. G. Fred Crowley, who has been employed as night porter at the Queen Hotel for many years, severed his connection with that hostelry today. It is Mr. Crowley's intention to open a cafe in the store on Carleton street lately fitted up by Ald. McLellan. He expects to be ready for business on Saturday next. He will conduct a first class cafe and will be in a position to serve meals and luncheons at all hours. Its central location will make his cafe most convenient for business men. Mr. Crowley will also make a specialty of providing lunches for fishing and outing parties.

HON. A. T. DUNN DEAD.

Hon. A. T. Dunn, collector of customs at the port of St. John, died on Sunday, after a few days' illness. The deceased was a native of St. John and had been prominent in public life for thirty-five years. After serving in the Municipal Council he was elected to the Legislature in 1892 and in 1896 was appointed surveyor general. He retired about ten years ago to become collector of the port of St. John. He was a member of the firm of Dunn Bros., which carried on a pork packing business at Musquash for many years. The deceased was about seventy-five years of age and a bachelor.

MR. GLASIER HONORED.

Prior to the prorogation of the House on Saturday, Mr. Parker Glasier, M.P.P. for Sunbury, was presented with a gold headed cane, suitably engraved. The presentation was made by Premier Clarke in a happy speech. Mr. Glasier is regarded as the senior member of the House, having been a member continuously for seventeen years. He does not participate in the debates and finds it easy to keep out of trouble. Although regarded as a tame follower of the government, Mr. Glasier enjoys the respect of friend and opponent. Other members of the House who have been in public life longer than Mr. Glasier, but not continuously held membership in the House, are: Hon. Bohn Morrissy first elected in 1888, Hon. O. M. Melanson, first elected in 1890, Mr. J. K. Pinder, first elected in 1892, Mr. C. B. Lockhart and Mr. W. F. Humphrey, first elected in 1895.

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G. ALEX. MURRAY
APPOINTED TO CITY
POLICE FORCE

William Duncan Terminated His Service Last Night--New Officer Placed on Probation For One Month.

The Police Commission this morning appointed G. Alex. Murray of this city, a member of the Fredericton Police Force, on one month's probation. He will go on duty tonight. The appointment was made to fill the vacancy caused by the dismissal of William Duncan, police sergeant, whose term of service expired last night. Ex-Sergt. Duncan had served on the force since July 15, 1912. Mr. William McKay, chairman of the Police Commission, stated to a reporter of The Mail this morning that for the present no sergeant would be appointed for the force.

New Policeman.

The new policeman is well known in this city and vicinity. He was a resident of Kingsclear for the greater part of his life but removed to Fredericton about four years ago after selling his farm. Since that time he has had experience in railroad construction. He was connected for a considerable number of years with the militia, being commanding officer of the Keswick company of the 71st York Regt. for the greater part of that time. At present he is a captain in the corps reserve of that regiment. The new member of the force is a man of good physique and is over six feet in height.

Nothing Re Investigation.

Chairman McKay was asked if there was any date set for the investigation of the charges preferred against Chief McCollom and Policeman Marshall by ex-Sergt. Duncan and ex-Policeman Saunders. He said there was not and that there was nothing new in the case.

CAMP AT SUSSEX
TO OPEN MIDDLE
OF NEXT WEEK

Local Detachment of 104th Battalion To Leave Fredericton Soon-- "Daylight Saving" For Troops Has Disadvantages.

It is announced that a camp will be organized at Sussex next week for the overseas battalions of infantry now in New Brunswick. The 10th inst. is mentioned as the probable opening date. It is expected that S Company, 104th Battalion, will leave for Sussex to join the rest of the battalion within a short time. Sunday next is said to be the last the company will spend in Fredericton. This company was largely recruited in this section and its members have made many friends while quartered here and its departure will be regretted.

Pipe Band Coming.

The pipe band of the 104th Battalion is expected to arrive here tonight. The band will remain here as long as C Company does. The band is composed of six pipers and three drummers.

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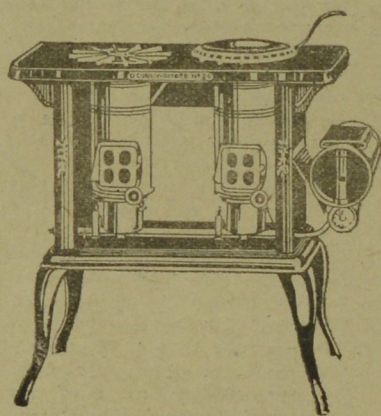
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
