Lord Fisher At War Council

London, March 8.—For the first time since he left the Admiralty, Lord Fisher, former First Sea Lord, today attended a full meeting of the war council, presided over by Premier Asquith.

The invitation to Lord Fisher to attend the council was expected more than a week ago and had nothing to do with the speech in the House of Commons yesterday of Col. Winston Spencer Churchill, former First Lord of the Admiralty, who said Lord Fisher should be brought back to be at the head of the Admiralty administration.

It is understood that Lord Fisher was invited to join the war council temporarily, to give his advice on important matters in regard to which his experience would be useful. It is not believed to be likely that he will return to the Admiralty as a prominent member.

Renfrew Factory Destroyed By Fire

Renfrew, Ont., March 8.—A fire that started from a lead burner in the hands of a workman destroyed the still-house of the new O'Brien Manufacturing Co.'s plant here this morning. It contained considerable machinery and supplies and will delay operations, but the main plant is not materially affected.

Early estimates of the damage place it at \$100,000.

Australia Sets A Good Example

Sydney, N. S. W., March 8 (via London).—The cabinet has decided to disenfranchise all German-born electors for the duration of the war, following the arrest and internment of several hundred aliens, who are considered of hostile disposition.

ALLOWED TO GO ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE

Berlin, Ont., March 8.—Sergeant Major Blood and Private Schaefer, the two soldiers convicted of assault upon Rev. B. C. Tappert, Lutheran minister, were this morning allowed to go on suspended sentence by Magistrate Weir.

CITY ELECTION

The Election for Mayor and for Aldermen for the City of Fredericton

FOR THE ENSUING YEAR, WILL BE HOLDEN ON

**MONDAY, The 13th
Day of March, 1916**

At the Polling Places as Follows:
Division No. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the northwest centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall, in the said City.

Division No. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, at or near the County Court House, in the said City.

NOMINATIONS.
Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated, and shall be nominated in writing by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is nominated.

Every nomination paper with the certificate of the City Treasurer shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office and not later than Four o'clock on the Afternoon of MONDAY, the sixth day of March, 1916, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate and the signatures of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by a witness by affidavit attached to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector shall be entitled to vote for ONE candidate for Mayor, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Wellington Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for St. Ann's Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Queens Ward (Alderman Wm. J. Osborne having resigned), and for ONE candidate for Alderman for Kings Ward.

The British Navy Stronger Than Ever

London, March 7.—A. J. Balfour, first lord of the admiralty, stated in the House of Commons this afternoon that the tonnage of the British navy had been increased by one million since the outbreak of the war, while the strength of the air division of the navy had grown ten fold.

Mr. Balfour told the House that never before in Great Britain's history had there been so much naval construction as in the last nineteen months. He asserted the fleet was far stronger than at the outbreak of the war, except in regard to armored cruisers. Many of the cruisers which had been lost had not been replaced.

TASK OF GREAT MAGNITUDE.

Mr. Balfour emphasized the magnitude of the task Great Britain had taken upon herself since the operations in the Mediterranean began, in transporting, feeding and supplying the forces there. Moreover, the appearance of German submarines not only in home waters but in the Mediterranean had added to the responsibilities already undertaken.

He said about one million combatants, one million horses, two million tons of stores and twenty-seven million gallons of oil for the British and their allies had been transported.

CHURCHILL SOUNDS WARNING.

Winston Spencer Churchill, the former first lord of the admiralty, began his speech with a warning.

"I am sorry I must strike a jarring note," he said, "not of reproach or panic, but of warning. While Jellicoe commands the grand fleet it will be manoeuvred in the presence of the enemy with the utmost professional skill. We must not believe that Germany will be content to allow her fleet to be impotent and derided in Kiel Canal. We must assume that something has happened in the German naval yards and that Germany has completed her program."

"Lord Fisher," said Col. Churchill "must be brought back to the admiralty, where there exists a lack of driving power and energy which cannot be allowed to continue. The admiralty would be vitalized and animated by the recalling of Lord Fisher."

"I desire to have placed on record that an attitude of pure strategic attitude of the board of the admiralty would not have been the duty during 1915."

RECEPTION TOMORROW

B. Black, M.P.P., who will not arrive until Monday. Among the officers who will attend His Honor upon the floor of the House will be Brigadier General McLean, Lt. Col. Powell, Lt. Col. G. W. The guards at the entrances to the Parliament Buildings will be doubled tomorrow. Both the day and night guards, composed of returned soldiers, will be on duty. Civil police who have been used for this purpose before will not be used this year.

Lt. Col. Beer, officer commanding the 140th Battalion, and Lt. Col. P. A. Guthrie of this city, are to be the principal speakers at the recruiting rally at Nashwaaksis tonight. Col. Beer has just returned from fourteen months' service in France with the Lord Strathcona's Horse. He is a most interesting speaker.
