That is not an extravagant statement. It's a fact and I think that Plank will retain his effectiveness again this season."

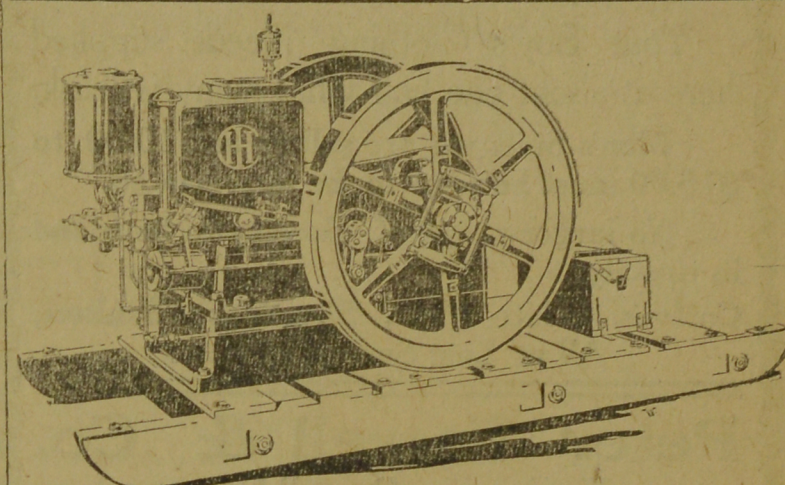
