ENQUIRIES ANSWERED IN THE LOCAL HOUSE

Matter of Compelling Kent County Boodlers to Disgorge is Under Consideration ---How Col. Sheridan Was Helped Out By a Bridge Foreman.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in reply to Mr. Pelletier in the House, on Thursday, said:

1. The Department of Public Works having replied to a question on Wednesday last, that "The question of taking proceedings against Fabien Savoy is now under consideration," is the department aware that Commissioner Chandler's report does not implicate Fabien Savoy in any wrong-doing, that the report shows that Fabien Savoy did no work and that the amount in question "was simply put for the benefit of John Sheridan, who was then a representative?"

2. Does the department know that "Fabien Savoy's name was forged to the evidence discloses the fact that the endorsement of the cheque in question, that the cheque was cashed and the proceeds thereof given to John Sheridan, the member?"

3. Does the department know that the above facts were sworn to by Timothy Boudreau, the foreman of the Buctouche bridge?

4. With the facts before the department is disclosed by the evidence and the report of Commissioner Chandler, does the department intend to consider proceeding against Fabien Savoy alone, or against John Sheridan for whose benefit, according to the evidence, Savoy's name was padded on the pay sheet and forged on the back of the cheque?

Ans. Answers to Numbers 2, 2, 3 and 4. The department has Commissioner Chandler's report re above matters under consideration and already action has been taken to recover money claimed to have been earned by Fabien Savoy and paid to John Sheridan.

The Supt. of Scalers.

Hon. Mr. Murray, in reply to Mr. Dugal, said:

1. For what reason were services of J. Patterson, acting chief superintending of scalers, dispensed with?

Ans. Mr. Patterson's appointment was a temporary one during the logging season of 1914-15 and his engagement ended with the close of that season.

2. Did not the minister of lands and mines assure Mr. Patterson that he was giving every satisfaction?

Ans. The minister of lands and mines has no recollection of such assurance but has no doubt that satisfaction was expressed with the work done by Mr. Patterson.

3. Why did the government think it necessary to follow up Mr. Patterson's operations by private inspection by Mr. Frank Curran?

Ans. As a means by which a better settlement of stumpage accounts should be obtained.

4. What amount has been paid to Mr. Curran since the close of the fiscal year for his services and is he still in the employ of the department?

Ans. Nothing has been paid. Mr. Curran is not now employed by the government.

Colonel Sheridan's Case.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in reply to Mr. Pelletier, said:

1. Commissioner Chandler having reported that "Timothy Boudreau, the foreman (of Little Buctouche bridge), admitted that \$40 appearing to the credit of John K. Sheridan was not really earned by him and that he did no work for this amount, the amount of \$40 was put in by the foreman for the benefit of Mr. Sheridan, the representative," does the department of public works intend to take any steps to recover this amount paid for work which was never done?

Ans. The report of Commissioner Chandler is not fully set out in the question. The commissioner continues, "The foreman explained that he had himself done a good deal of work looking after this bridge at night and keeping a lantern lit on a temporary bridge that was put in. The foreman claims that he practically acted as night watchman for nearly five months on this temporary bridge and charged nothing for his services. He says that if he had employed a foreman he would have had to pay at least one dollar per night. Being anxious to do something for Mr."

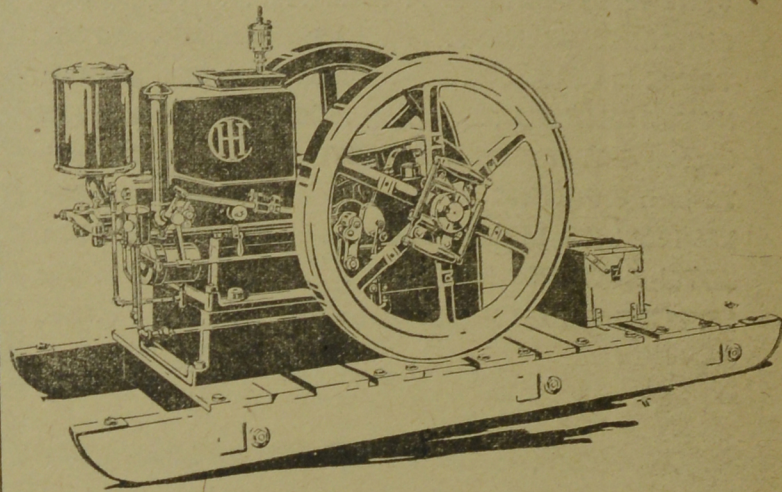

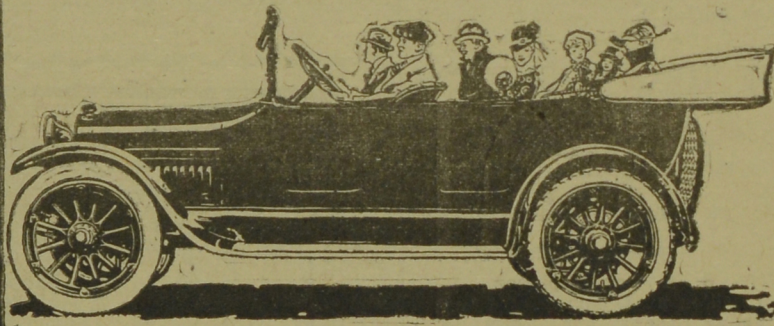

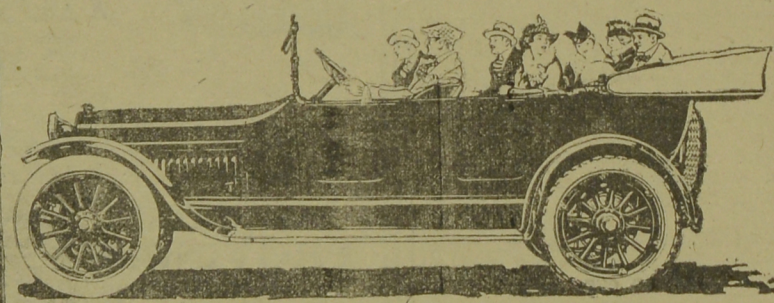
