

ANNIVERSARY OF JESSE POMEROY

Massachusetts Boy Fiend Has Completed Forty Years of Solitary Confinement.

Boston, Sept. 6.—Jesse Pomeroy, serving a life sentence for murder, today completed his fortieth year in solitary confinement at the State prison in Charleston. Pomeroy is said to have served in solitary confinement longer than any other prisoner in this country, and unless the commitment order is changed, he will have to be kept in that manner until he dies.

He began his sentence at the age of 16 years, after having been convicted of diabolical attacks on several children. In recent years numerous efforts have been made to secure for him the privileges of a "trustee," but all of these have been unavailing.

Numerous attempts at escape have been made by the notorious prisoner, and these, together with his known predilection for taking human life, have influenced the authorities in adhering strictly to the conditions of the original sentence, which prescribed solitary imprisonment.

While solitary imprisonment is the name given to the punishment Pomeroy is undergoing, it does not mean that he never leaves his cell. He goes out in the yard every day in charge of a guard and spends an hour there. But that is while the other prisoners are at work in the shops.

During the forty years that he has been confined Pomeroy has seldom seen the face of a human being other than of his keepers and of his aged mother, who died several years ago.

GROCERY CLERKS ON STRIKE.

N. Y. and N. J. Clerks are Demanding Shorter Hours.

New York, Sept. 6.—Three thousand grocery clerks went on strike in this city, Jersey City, Newark and outlying towns today.

Leaders claim that the number of strikers will be augmented to 6,000 within the next 24 hours.

The strike was voted after owners of chains of stores refused the demand of the union for shorter hours, a minimum salary of \$15 a week, and 1 per cent of the store receipts.

SHACKLETON HAS RESCUED MEN

Famous Antarctic Explorer Succeeds In Dash to Reach Them.

Punta Arenas, Chile, Sept. 5.—Lieut. Sir Ernest H. Shackleton has rescued the members of his Antarctic expedition who were marooned on Elephant Island. He returned here today with his men safe and well on the rescue ship *Yelcho*.

The men were left on Elephant Island on April 24, when Shackleton left in a small boat for South Georgia with Capt. Worsley and some seamen.

Sir Ernest left Punta Arenas on the 26th of August with the ship *Yelcho*, in a third attempt to rescue his men. Success seems to have come this time very promptly.

Twenty-two men were on Elephant Island. The first attempt to rescue them was made in June and the second in July, both failing owing to the quantity of ice.

TO FLY OVER EASTERN CANADA.

Aeroplane Will Sail From Buffalo to Toronto, Ottawa, etc.

Ottawa, Sept. 6.—An aeroplane flight over eastern Canada is projected by the Curtiss people, who have secured the requisite authority. The plane will leave Buffalo this week, sail to Toronto, then to Camp Borden, and from there to Ottawa and Valcartier.

Toronto, Sept. 6.—A farewell was given to the H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught and family by the City Council this afternoon.

The Duke was presented with an address at the City Hall.

London, Sept. 6.—A great crowd gathered today to witness the funeral of 16 members of the crew of the *Zepelin* which was brought down during Saturday night's raid.

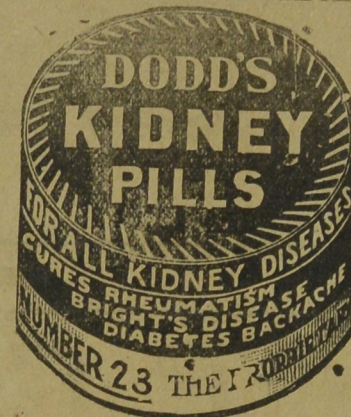
In view of the strong protests which have been made against the burial of the German airmen with military honors, a strong force of police was on duty to maintain order.
