CAMPAIGN IN CARLETON IS FAST WARMING UP

Shady Record of the Government is Damaging to Smith's Chances---Mr. Veniot Devotes Some Attention to Hon. Dr. Landry--Provincial Secretary Has Never Opened His Mouth to Encourage Compatriots to Enlist.

Woodstock, Sept. 6.—One feature of the Opposition meetings is the intense interest of the people. This has meant splendid audiences and earnest attention to the Opposition speakers. The record of the Government is even more damaging to Smith's chances than his own political sins, and some idea can be gleaned of what the Government candidates are up against. Already the Government workers are conceding the election of one Opposition man. They cling to the hope that Smith may survive the shock, but that hope will vanish as the campaign progresses. There was a splendid audience at Summerfield as well as Upper Woodstock last evening. Summerfield is on the Valley Railway route between Centreville and Andover, and the people there and in other parts of Wicklow parish have been simply fed on promises.

The Valley Railway.

Mr. Carter, addressing many Conservatives, gave the history of that part of the Valley Railway and why it had not been built, and the attempt last winter to cut off and connect with the Maine Central.

Mr. Veniot took up some of the remarks made by Hon. Dr. Landry at the Government convention touching the attitude of Mr. Carter and himself in urging the Opposition to contest by-elections during the war. Mr. Veniot expressed surprise at Dr. Landry giving expression to such deep interest in war matters, as he did not evidence

such interest in the past, because it is a notorious fact that this gentleman has never opened his mouth since the beginning of the war to encourage his compatriots to go forth and do their bit for the empire. His conduct in this respect is in keeping with that of his friend, Bourassa.

Sons Fighting in the Trenches.

"Dr. Landry," said Mr. Veniot, "should be the last man in the world to refer to Mr. Carter and myself in connection with these matters, as both of us have our sons in the trenches doing the fighting for such men as Landry. While our sons and the many sons of Carleton county are risking their lives on the battlefields, Dr. Landry is risking his reputation in upholding the corrupt administration at Fredericton. I am also very much surprised at seeing Dr. Landry on the same platform with Mr. Flemming. In my presence at Memramcook he told his audience: 'We recognize that Mr. Flemming has been guilty of wrongdoing, but so determined were we to clean the Legislature of the least taint of corruption that we forced him to resign.'"

Mr. Veniot then took up the road policy of the Opposition and very fully explained it. He also dealt with the patriotic potato purchase, showing from the records of Hansard and the public accounts committee the numerous contradictions between Mr. Smith, Mr. Daggett, Mr. Murray and the Auditor General's report.

Capt. J. R. Jago, R. C. E., who is in Campbellton today, will be here tomorrow to superintend the work of preparing buildings. The 236th Battalion is also authorized to enlist all the carpenters, painters, plumbers and other artisans that can be obtained.

MISS PALMER DISMISSED

FROM PUBLIC WORKS DEPT.

"What am I to do in the meantime?" was the rejoinder of Miss Palmer, and the Premier had no answer to make.

Sequel to the Blair Case.

From what can be learned from different sources, it seems that the dismissal of Miss Palmer comes as a sort of sequel to the Blair case. Ever since Mr. Blair was dismissed in May last from the position of Secretary of the Department the members of the Government have been on pins and needles and frightened of their own shadows. Fearing that Blair might turn burglar, they had all the locks of the doors of the department altered and the combination of the safe changed. They knew that Miss Palmer had been kindly treated by Mr. Blair and the former Minister, Hon. John Morrissey, and their great minds conceived the idea that possibly she might some time in the future furnish them with some information. It is said that representations were made to Hon. Mr. Mahoney with a view of having him dispense with her services, but for obvious reasons he refused to take any action. It remained for Hon. B. Franklin Smith to put in force the methods of the Kaiser.

Miss Palmer lost her position because B. Franklin Smith had suspicions, and because B. Franklin, like Brutus of old, is "an honorable man."

Causes Indignation.

The peremptory dismissal of Miss Palmer has caused much indignation among her friends and acquaintances in the city. She is a daughter of the late John Palmer, a man of wide acquaintance, and an ex-Mayor of the city, who in his day did much to give Fredericton a place on the industrial map.

AIR RAI DON THE TURKS.

"On Tuesday two of our aeroplanes raided the Turkish aerodrome and aeroplane repair section at El Arich. Twelve bombs were dropped, apparently all with good results."
