GERMAN FLEETS BRITISH AND THE NORTH SEA IN CLASH

German Report Tells of Naval Fight in North Sea

German High Sea Fleet Reported to Have Engaged British Squadron---Forces Said to Have Been Heavy on Both Sides---Greatest Naval Battle of the War.

BERLIN, June 2.-The Admiralty statement reports a big naval battle on Tuesday. between the British North Sea fleet and the German main fleet, in which some eight British vessels were destroyed. The German losses are not definitely known, but it is believed that three large warships and a number of Dayton, Ohio, fuse maker, is to ar of torpedo boat destroyers are lost.

BERLIN (via Sayville), June 2.— The destruction of more than nine British warships by a German fleet in one of the biggest naval battles fought since the war began, was announced by the German Admiralty today. The fight took place between Skagerack and Henneriff. Two German men of war are known to have been sunk, and a third is missing. The May, when B. F. Yoakum took hold. BERLIN, June 2.—The following has been given out as the official 3 statement: The British ships destroyed were the Warspite and the battle Murderers GG cruisers Queen Mary and Indefatigable, two armored cruisers of the Argyle type, a small cruiser, the Durban, Nestor and Alcaster, a number of torpedo boat destroyers and a submarine.

The battle began on May 31st and raged for twenty-four hours. During the day the German ship Weisgen was sunk by gunfire, and during the night the battleship Pommern was torpedoed. The German transport Inlot is missing. The balance of the fleet returned to port.



EYE WITNESS TELLS SHOCKING AIRI BULGARIAN TROOPS

Scenes of Desolation Equaling in Horror the Exodus From Belgium Reported From Macedonia---The Panic Stricken Greeks Fleeing Before the Bulgars.

SALONIKI, Greece, June 2 .--- I have just returned from a visit to Demir-Hissar, and Seres, where I witnessed scenes of desolation equalling in horror the exodus from Belgium and Northern France. The roads of eastern Macedonia are choked with panic-stricken Greeks fleeing before the oncoming Bulgarian hordes. The refugees are driving their sheep and callle told of having nothing to do with before them, pushing hand carts containing their belongings, and carrying weeping children.

> Beneath the torrid sun the wretched homeless people struggled along, concealed in a choking cloud of dust. Demir-Hissar, when I arrived, was dense with refugees. They had been swarming into the little town since Sunday, clamoring for prolection and begging bread. But there were only forty sacks of flour for 30,000 persons, and the majority of the refugees are starving to death.

ABOMINATIONS BY THE BULGARIAN TROOPS

The same scenes occurred at Seres, where the authorities vainly tried to collect food. Every one of these wretched people tell harrowing stories of Bulgarian abominations. Led by pro-Bulgarian Greeks, the invading troops entered the frontier villages and seized all the available food, killing all the beasts and striking down with their rifle butts the civilians who attempted to interfere.
