## TRIBUTE TO MR. CARTER.

The St. John Evening Times in a recent issue pays a well deserved tribute to Mr. E. S. Carter, the efficient Opposition organizer, who took such an active part in the recent by-election in Westmorland. It was Mr. Carter who started the ball rolling in Westmorland. It was while in Fredericton during the closing days of the session that he learned that the portfolio of Public Works was to be offered to Mr. Mahoney and that agents of the party were then at work trying to negotiate for him an election by acclamation. Mr. Carter immediately sat down and wrote a vigorous letter to Dr. E. A. Smith, the president of the Opposition Association (now M. P. P. for Westmorland), and forwarded a copy of the same to the St. John Telegraph. He strongly advised the Opposition forces in Westmorland to fight if the constituency were opened, and to fight hard. The suggestion contained in his message to Dr. Smith met with a hearty response. The portfolio went to Mr. Mahoney, as Mr. Carter had prophesied; the constituency was opened, with the result that the new minister failed to come back. Concerning Mr. Carter, the Times says:

"It is time for the friends of Mr. E. S. Carter to protest in the most vigorous and outspoken manner against the prolonged campaign of low abuse that has been levelled against him. Mr. Carter has brought about the downfall of the most corrupt government his native province has ever known—for its downfall is now only a question of a short time. For this the people of New Brunswick owe him a lasting debt. But for his ability, his tireless patience, his utter disregard of abuse and slander, and his relentless exposure of wrong-doing, Mr. J. K. Fleming would still be leading the government, and the riot of graft and corruption would have gone on without interruption. Mr. Carter has awakened the public conscience.

"What charges have been made against him? None at all. It has been the easy habit of his political enemies to appear shocked whenever his name was mentioned, as if he were an unspeakable wretch without honor and without reputation. They have pursued the policy of continually throwing mud, in the hope that some of it would stick, and that the public would be persuaded that Mr. Carter was a most depraved, unscrupulous and dangerous person.

"As a matter of fact, no charge of dishonesty has ever been made against Mr. Carter. He has, however, exposed dishonesty on a colossal scale. More than that, he has two sons fighting their country's battles, when some of his detractors are smugly taking their profits at home. Those who know him best know that his one desire in this whole wretched business has been and is to expose the wrong-doing and bring about a better administration of the affairs of the province. When he was libelled by the Standard and entered proceedings against that paper, it took advantage of a technicality to escape punishment, although its friends had, as a matter of fact, handed out such a jury list as to give very little hope of a verdict favorable to him. And this matter of political juries is one that will bear looking into when a better government comes into power. In the meantime, Mr. Carter's detractors and defamers have got the first instalment of the people's answer, and he has no reason to doubt that other constituencies will do when given the opportunity."

The Mail heartily endorses every word which the Times says of Mr. Carter. There is little that can be added except to point out in reply to slanderous statements by members of the hoodlums' brigade concerning him that he has never held a government office and that he was seldom or ever seen in Fredericton during the days of the old government. Mr. Carter has exposed the iniquities of the Flemming-Clarke-Baxter outfit and its satellites, and has been subjected to the vilest kind of abuse for doing so, but the verdict of Westmorland shows that honest men appreciate the work he has performed in behalf of clean politics.

Commenting on the result of the by-election in Westmorland, the Chatham World, Commodore Stewart's paper, says: "The public conscience of Westmorland has punished Mr. Mahoney for condoning public crimes. The public conscience of the province at the first opportunity it gets will condemn the government and all who profited by its deeds, and joined in condoning its offences, no matter

"whether they are still in office, or whether they have been kicked out of office."

Mr. William Chisholm, Liberal M. P. for Antigonish, N. S., has resigned his seat in the House of Commons and accepted a nomination for the Legislature. Antigonish is one of the Nova Scotia constituencies wiped out by the redistribution bill.

The trial has been in progress for sixteen days, during which time more than 800 prospective jurors have been examined.

## ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION ILL ADVISED

London, June 2.—All of the morning papers publish the story of Sir Ernest Shackleton's Antarctic expedition in full, with the exception of the Morning Post. The Post devotes two paragraphs to an account of the expedition and editorially denounces the undertaking as ill-advised in war time.

"A nation fighting for its life," says the editorial, "has other things to absorb its thoughts and energies than discovery, and when we remember all that is now at stake on the battlefields of Europe we cannot affect more than relief that the news from the Falklands is no worse."

## SCHOONER BURNED TO WATER'S EDGE

Oakland, Cal., June 2.—Fire which threatened last night to destroy Moore & Scott's shipyard and five vessels undergoing repairs at the plant, was confined to the schooner Callao, on which it originated. The schooner burned to the waterline with a loss estimated at \$100,000.

The explosion of a gas tank used for blow-torches, caused the fire.

The premier was asked by a reporter of The Mail if there was any announcement concerning the portfolio of public works, which is still vacant, owing to the defeat of Hon. P. G. Mahoney in the Westmorland by-election.

"That is a matter of administration," said Hon. Mr. Clarke, "and will be attended to in due time."

Mr. B. F. Smith, M.P.P. of East Florenceville, is here today. He is said to be pressing his claims for the portfolio.

## BROCKVILLE, ONT., HAS SERIOUS FIRE

Brockville, Ont., June 2—Fire this morning damaged the big block of the Senator Fulford estate and for a time threatened the heart of Brockville's business section, including the post office building and the custom house. The absence of any wind aided the fire brigade materially, although they had a hard fight to confine the blaze to the clock where it started. The entire building was practically gutted and what was not burned suffered from smoke and water. The loss is estimated at about \$100,000.
