## LORD KITCHENER HECKLED BY CRITICS OF WAR OFFICE

LONDON, June 2.—Earl Kitchener had today what was for him the unique experience of being heckled by parliamentary critics of the War Office. Complying with the promise made on his behalf in the House of Commons, the parliamentary under secretary for war, Harold J. Tennant, in response to complaints of members that they had not had opportunity to question the Secretary of War, the famous General went to one of the committee rooms of the House, prepared to make a statement on the conduct of the war and reply to questions.

The War Secretary faced some 200 members, including what are known as the "ginger groups," composed of men who demand a more vigorous prosecution of the war. The public was excluded rigorously; indeed the whole of Westminster Palace was shut off to avoid leakage of any secret information that might be elicited.

### ROUMANIA AND TURKEY.

BERLIN, June 2 (by wireless to Sayville).—According to reports from Bucharest, says the Overseas News Agency today, the representatives of the Roumanian importation committee in Constantinople have reached a general understanding with the Turkish officials regarding the proposed commercial treaty between Roumania and Turkey, negotiations regarding which were begun on the understanding it would follow lines of the German and Austro-Hungarian commercial treaties with the Balkan kingdom. The treaty, advices state, will be signed when prices have been established at which products shall be exported from Turkey.

### FRENCH AIRMEN BRING DOWN GERMANS.

PARIS, June 2.—A squadron of French aeroplanes, pursuing a group of German machines, which had just bombarded Ber le Duc, brought down two machines, one of which was a Fokker. The raid referred to probably is one mentioned in last night's French official statement, which said that eighteen civilians in Bar le Duc were killed by German bombs.

### A SETTLEMENT OF THE IRISH QUESTION.

LONDON, June 2.—The Evening Standard makes the statement that a basis of agreement has been arrived at for the settlement of the Irish question, and that the proposed Irish parliament will be set up immediately, Ulster being excluded.

## MORE BIG TALK FROM GERMAN CHANCELLOR

London, June 2.—"The present war map must form the basis of peace. Let the statesmen of the Entente powers look at the facts as presented by this map, and they will know Germany's terms."

Thus spoke Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German Imperial Chancellor, in the course of an interview with the correspondent of the Berlin Nues Nachrichten, during a visit to Munich, says Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent. The Chancellor's words, says the correspondent, have attracted the widest attention. The Lokal Anzeiger, in commenting on the interview, says: "We interpret the Chancellor's words to mean that the trenches which the Central Powers have erected, east and west, are an impenetrable German wall of soldiers, which must be the frontiers of a peace treaty. In no war yet has this been the case, but a military achievement which has been gained with so much blood must form the starting point for any negotiations for peace."

## ANOTHER ACCOUNT OF THE BIG SEA FIGHT

BERLIN (by wireless to Sayville), June 2.—During an enterprise directed to the northward, our high sea fleet on May 31 encountered the main part of the British fighting fleet, which was considerably superior to our forces.

During the afternoon, between Skagerrack and Horn Riff, a heavy engagement developed which was successful for us, and which continued during the whole night.

In this engagement, so far as known up to the present, there were destroyed by us the large battleship War-spide, the battle cruisers Queen Mary and Indefatigable, two armored cruisers apparently of the Achilles type, one small cruiser, a new flagship of destroyers, the Turbanant, Nestor and Al-caster, a large number of torpedo boat destroyers and one submarine.

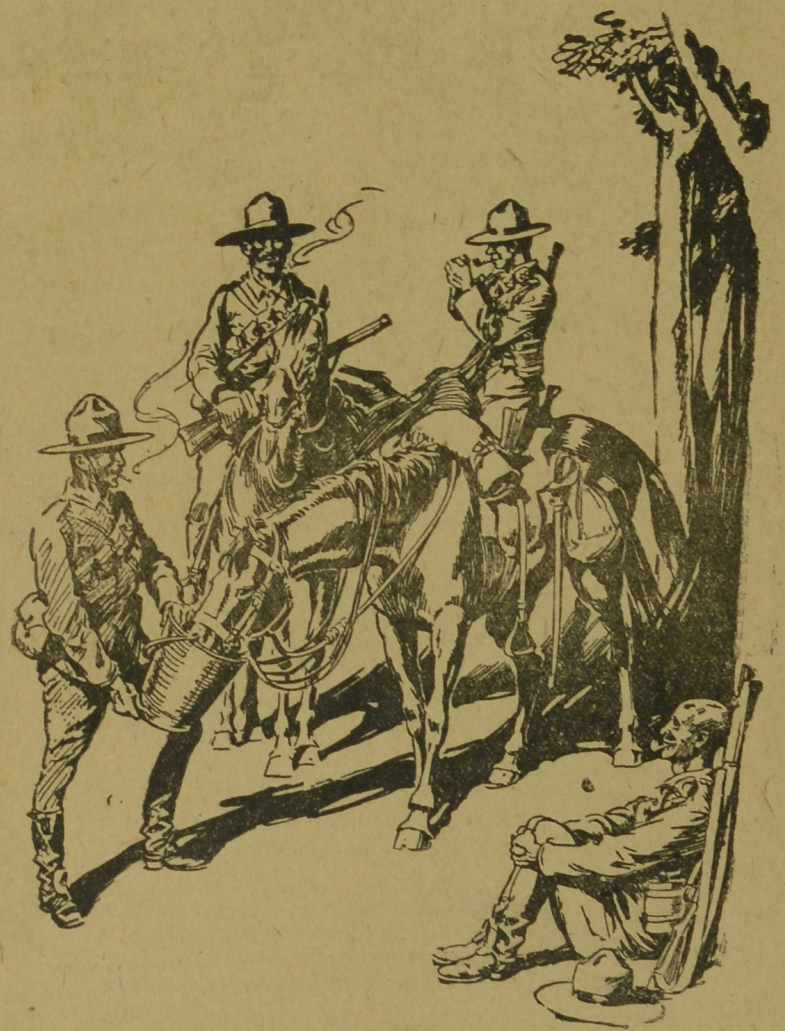
