ELMER MYERS IS FEATURE RECRUIT OF MACK'S TEAM

**Right-Handed Pitcher is
Doing Great Work--
Won three Nine-Inning
Games Lately**

New York, May 31—The sensational pitching of Elmer Myers, Mack's lanky, right-handed recruit, has been one of the big features of the present season. Myers won three full nine-inning contests recently, and did not allow more than five hits in any game. In turning the trick, Myers conquered three of the best hurlers in the American League, and was just as strong in the ninth inning as when he started his duel with Walter Johnson.

Washington got four hits, Detroit three and St. Louis five, making a total of twelve hits made off the recruit in twenty-seven innings. This is one of the most sensational records ever compiled by a recruit pitcher.

HORSE WON EIGHTEEN THOUSAND IN SIX YEARS

The turf career of Amalfi has come to an end. The eight-year-old thoroughbred is now in stud. Amalfi never was ranked better than a high class selling plater but his record is a remarkable one. His performances have been the most consistent in recent turf history.

Amalfi won \$17,895 during his six campaigns. He faced the barrier 105 times. He won 28 races, finished second on 29 occasions and was third 30 times—a total of 77 brackets in 105 starts, a splendid record.

WELSH DECISION CAUSES BAD BREAK —IN UNITED STATES

**Wisconsin Boxing Com-
mission Has Broken
Away From New York
Body--Welsh Case.**

Milwaukee, Wis., May 31—The Wisconsin Boxing Commission broke away from a working agreement with the New York Boxing Commission. The action was taken following the refusal of the New York body to observe the ruling made recently, whereby Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion, was suspended for four months from taking part in a contest in Wisconsin, for delaying the recent contest with Ever Hammer.

The two boards had agreed to recognize suspensions inflicted by the other.

The suspension of Welsh followed his bout with Hammer here, when Welsh kept spectators waiting half an hour before appearing in the ring. Welsh's explanation was that upon asking for the stipulated purse of \$1,500 he found that the amount totalled only \$1,100.

Welsh was found guilty of violating the rule which requires contestants and clubs to enter into written contracts and of having failed to post a forfeit.

Cambridge, Mass., May 31—Ora G. Kirkpatrick, the champion heavyweight boxer of Harvard, is considering an offer from John L. Sullivan to turn professional. On the invitation of the former champion, Kirkpatrick and his college trainer went to Sullivan's farm at West Abington and the matter was discussed. Sullivan proposed to Kirkpatrick that he put himself under his direction for from three to five months, after which the big fellow thought that the college boy would be ready to give Frank Moran a battle.

Sullivan told the collegian that he thought he could beat the Pittsburgher and he believed Willard only had one or two good fights in him.

Dime was also asked to take with Chip, a good welterweight, lightweight and a feather. Dime said: "I thought he could make the trip, leaving some time before June 15."

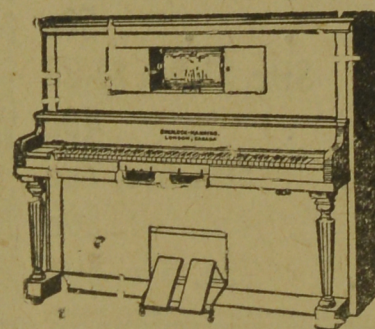

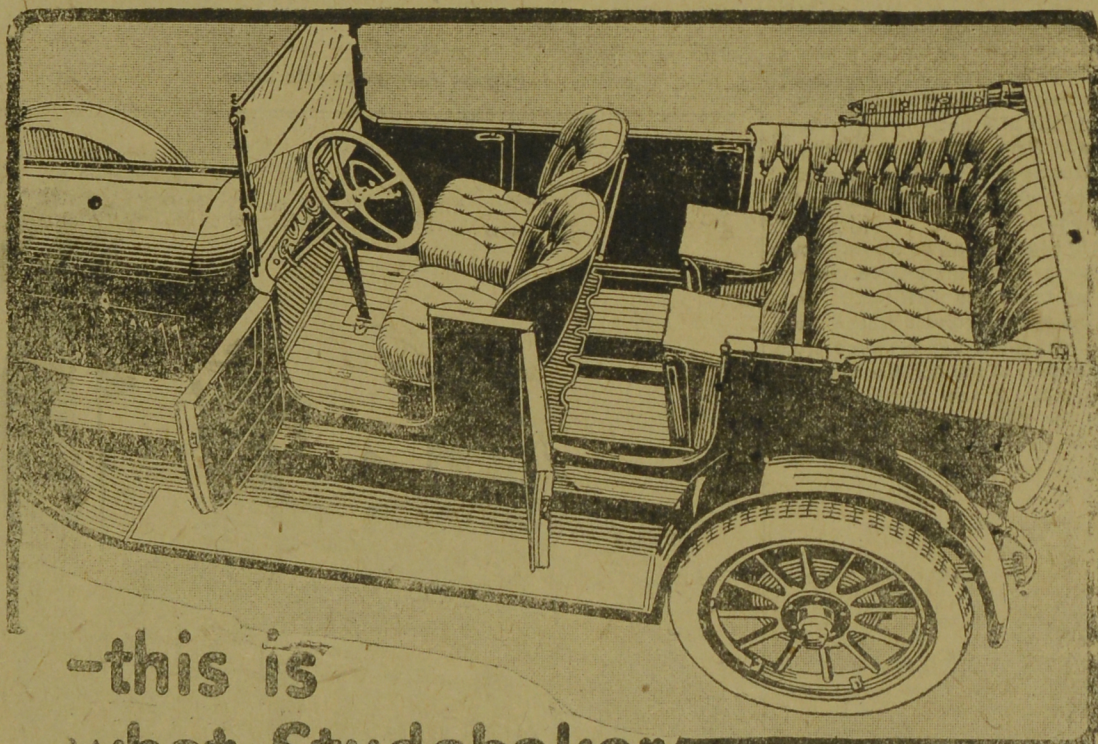
