PARTINGTON DRIVE
ON NASHWAAK
PRACTICALLY OUT

Will be in To-Night or To-Morrow
Early--Corporation Drive Making
Satisfactory Progress--Saw-
ing at English Lake.

The Partington Pulp & Paper Company's drive on the Nashwaak River will be in either tonight or by "first lunch" tomorrow morning. Last night the drive was below Nashwaak Village, the tail of the drive having passed that place. Conditions on the Nashwaak have been good this spring as far as the drives are concerned. The logs are now being rafted at the mouth of the Nashwaak and are being towed to St. John. The Nashwaak stream now is practically clear of lumber, except about half a million feet on Tay Creek. A heavy rain will bring that out safely.

In Main River.

There has been a rise of water in the St. John River which has helped the Corporation Drive considerably. The lower drive is now approaching the lower limits. Mr. G. C. Grant, who is in charge of the driving operations below Grand Falls, telephoned from Hartland this morning that the drive there would be clear of Florenceville bridge tomorrow. Driving on the main river has been hard, but conditions look very favorable at the present time.

At English Lake

Mr. John Kilburn of this city, is still at English Lake, Que., where about two and a half million feet of lumber were left by him to be sawed for Murray & Gregory of St. John. National Transcontinental Railway

PRIVATE OF 104TH
IN POLICE COURT
AS DESERTER

Liable to Sentence of Two Years--
Three Recruits Enlisted Yesterday
--Infantry Still Awaiting Orders
To Move.

Private William Miller of C Company, 140th Battalion, has been handed over to the civil authorities by Major F. A. Good, officer commanding the company. He is charged with desertion, an offense which makes him liable to two years' imprisonment. Miller appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning and was remanded until Tuesday of next week.

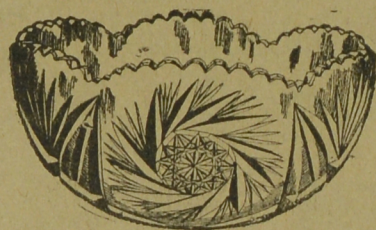
