

INCREASED ACTIVITY ALONG BRITISH FRONT

British Headquarters in France, June 29, via London.—Activity continues and increases along the whole British front, the initiative, as hitherto, resting almost entirely with the British. Besides a heavy bombardment of the enemy positions which in some places did material damage, a dozen local raids have been executed since yesterday, nearly all of which, in addition to inflicting casualties, succeeded in the capture of prisoners.

Troops officially mentioned as doing especially well include the Highland Light Infantry, the Australians, the Lancashire Fusiliers and the Liverpool. The Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry also had a stiff and successful fight in "No Man's Land" where the Germans advanced to meet them, but were driven back to the trenches with loss.

The German reply to the British bombardment is still generally ineffective, though in places the German guns have been very active, using large numbers of lacrymatory shells and a large number of British offensives is keeping the enemy everywhere nervous and alert.

Russian Drive Continues.

Petrograd, June 29.—Russian troops fighting in Volhynia and Galicia yesterday took prisoner 221 officers and 10,285 men, says the official statement.

BERLIN POOR KITCHENS TO BE KEPT OPEN

The Hague, via London, June 29.—The Municipality of Berlin has decided to keep open indefinitely the municipal poor kitchens which in previous years were open during the winter months, closing at the end of March.

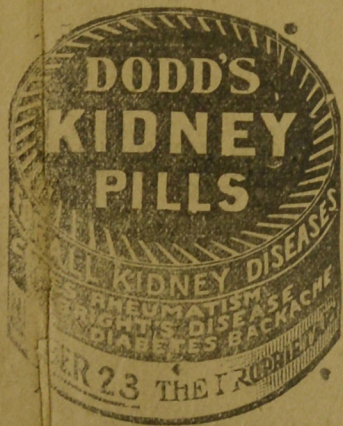

VOCATIONAL TRAINING FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

Ottawa, June 29.—The military hospitals commission is arranging a scale of pay for convalescent soldiers who have recovered sufficiently to enter upon a course of vocational training for work suitable to their condition. While with the completion of this training the soldier will have learned a trade from which a livelihood can be derived, it is recognized that provision must be made for his family while he is taking the course, and a scale of pay will therefore be drawn up making a reasonable allowance for the families of such men. It will be sufficient to ensure a livelihood for the man's dependents until he is able to look after them himself.

The statement continues: "Yesterday Gen. Letchitzky, after artillery preparation, inflicted upon the enemy, despite his desperate resistance, a great defeat in the region between the rivers Dniester and Pruth, and took possession of three lines of trenches."

"On the Dvina front enemy artillery has bombarded the region of Sakovitch, Sellze and the Bogouschinsk wood, northwest of Kievo. The enemy then proceeded to attack, but we repulsed him by our machine gun fire."

GASEMENT WILL APPEAL FROM VERDICT

London, June 29.—Sir Roger Casement this afternoon was found guilty of high treason and sentenced to death. The jury was out only about an hour.

The prisoner shook hands with a friend who was sitting below the dock while the usher placed the black cloths over the heads of the judges. The voice of the Chief Justice was firm, but his face was pale as he spoke the few words in pronouncing the sentence. He began:

"Roger David Casement, you have been found guilty by a jury of your own people of high treason, the highest crime known to law," and concluded by sentencing him "to be hanged by the neck until you are dead."

As the Judge pronounced the sentence the prisoner, who was leaning on the inner railing of the dock, smiled. Then a warder touched his arm and he withdrew behind the green curtain from what may be his last appearance before the public, which during the trial has regarded him without animosity, if not with some degree of sympathy.

Michael Francis Doyle, of counsel for Sir Roger, gave out the following statement:

"The verdict, though regrettable to us, was not a surprise. We will take an immediate appeal to the criminal court of appeals and then to the House of Lords, if necessary, because we feel that the point of law involving a statute 500 years old, under which Sir Roger was tried, never has been legally tested."

Mrs. Brankley's Death.
