THE GERMANS PLACE NEW RESTRICTIONS ON SHIPPING

COPENHAGEN, June 30, via London.—An official announcement signed by Vice Admiral Bachmann, Governor of the Kiel district, placing further restrictions on vessels running between Germany and foreign ports, is printed in the Kiel Zeitung. The only ports henceforth open to traffic on the east coast of Schleswig-Holstein are the commercial harbors of Kiel and Laboe. Ship's crews will be allowed ashore only within a limited space facing the vessels when loading or unloading.

Visits aboard other ships are strictly forbidden. Captains and seamen will be permitted up town only when guarded by policeman or soldiers, except by special permission of the governor. Discharged neutral seamen must leave Germany forthwith. All ships departing from Laboe or Kiel must have a military guard aboard to a certain distance off shore.

CANADIANS REACH ENGLAND.

OTTAWA, June 30.—It is officially announced through the chief press censor's office that the following troops have arrived safely in England: 65th Battalion, Saskatoon; 84th Battalion, Toronto; 102nd Battalion, Comox, B. C.; 77th Battalion, Ottawa. Engineers and signal corps draft, Ottawa; Medical Corps, Halifax and Winnipeg, drafts and details.

VALLEY RAILWAY TRAIN STRUCK BOY AT REGENT ST.

Harold Sypher, a boy aged 9 years, residing on Regent street beyond the C. P. R. tracks, was struck at about noon today by an I. C. R. train on the St. John & Quebec Railway, and seriously injured. The accident occurred near the Regent street crossing.

The little boy was walking on the track with his sister. On account of a severe illness some years ago, his hearing is poor. The engineer, by bell and whistle, gave alarm, but the boy did not hear.

He was struck by the engine and knocked over. When picked up by the train crew the boy was unconscious.

After some minutes he revived and was taken to his home.

He was severely cut about the head and the physician who attended him said he was seriously injured.
