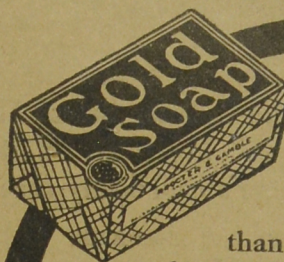

Woman's Column

SOME NEW RECIPES

Ham Toast—Take a quarter of
a pound of either boiled or fried
ham, chop it fine, mix with the
yolks of two eggs well beaten, a
teaspoonful of butter, and enough
cream or rich milk to make it soft,
dash of pepper. Stir it over the
fire until it thickens. Dip the
toast for an instant in hot salt
water: Spread over it some melted
butter, then turn over it the ham
mixture. Serve hot. This is a nice
way to utilize bits of left-over ham.

Tomato Salad with Tung Scraps

Cut large round tomatoes of uni-
form size in halves; scoop out the
pulp without breaking the skin.
Cut several slices of cold tongue
into small dice; mix them with the
tomato pulp and juice, adding a
little salt, cayenne, oil, and lemon
juice. Fill the tomato skins and
keep them on ice. Serve on crisp
lettuce leaves.

Vegetable Oysters—Wash bunch
of salsify and cook in boiling wa-
ter till the skin will peel easily.
Remove skin and cut into inch
pieces. Put a layer of buttered
cracker crumbs in a scallop dish, a
sprinkle of salt and pepper, then a
layer of salsify, with milk enough
to cover; then crumbs and season-
ing on top. Bake until brown.

Bran Bread—Two cups graham
orentire wheat flour, 1½ cups
bran, 1 cup chopped raisins, 1 cup
chopped raisins, 1 cup sour milk,
1 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoonful
salt, ½ cup molasses. Bake in a
slow oven about 1 1-2 hours.

Bread made by the above rules
is excellent to correct constipation
as well as being very palatable.
Especially good for children.
