HAROLD BROAD GETS TWO YEARS REFORMATORY

Suspended Sentence Put Into Effect
By Police Magistrate.

Harold Bailey Broad was sentenced to two years in the Boys' Industrial Home by Police Magistrate Limerick this morning. The boy is nine years of age and had a two-year sentence hanging over his head for setting fire to the city warehouse on the wharf at the foot of Regent street a couple of years ago.

On Friday last he entered an I. C. R. car on a siding in this city and stole tickets and other property belonging to Conductor David Hanson, of the suburban train.

Broad induced two younger boys named Grant to accompany him. They were let go on account of their tender age, but the suspended sentence was put into effect against young Broad.

decided upon, but it is understood one of the present staff will have charge.

Repairs Being Made.

Some plans and suggestions were received from Architect Fairweather in connection with the better heating of the Smythe Street School building. As a complete set of double windows has been fitted on the north side of the building, it was decided not to incur further expense until the present plan is tested.

Considerable repairs are in progress at the different schools and the several committees were able to report the expenditure of certain amounts considered necessary upon the different buildings. Hardwood floors have been laid in the halls and in two class rooms, and the walls of several rooms of the High School have been brightened with paint. Some expenditure has also to be made upon the roof of this building.

A large amount of work is also being done upon the Charlotte Street School, and when completed this will be second to none of the other school buildings of Fredericton. The excellently appointed and equipped Regent street building is being brightened up to receive teachers and pupils. Mr. Weddall reported the character of some proposed work planned to be done in the schools at Morrison Mill and Doak Settlement.

After correspondence was dealt and accounts ordered paid, arrangements were made for a later meeting to prepare for the reopening of the schools on August 28th.

School Census.

Criticism has been directed against the recent census of children of school age taken in the city recently. The enumerators reported 1,478 children of school age. The attendance at the city schools last term was 1,405, making only about 70 children discovered by the enumerators who were not already attending school.

Many citizens say, however, that numbers of children were not enumerated and that the city's school population is much larger than is indicated.

Left For St. John.

Chief of Police McCollom left this morning for St. John, having been enlisted by Lieut. Col. W. H. Gray for the 2nd Siege Battery. He expects to return tomorrow on leave. His tenure of office as chief of police will expire on Monday, and he has received an excellent recommendation from the Police Commission. It is not likely that a chief of police will be appointed to succeed him for some time at least.

Sergt. A. B. McNeill and Private W. T. Ross Flemington, of No. 8 Field Ambulance, which is being raised in St. John, are here after recruits for that unit. Two recruits were sent to St. John this morning to join the Field Ambulance, and two were sent yesterday. One hundred men are needed for this unit. Many of the recruits already secured have been students.

Sergt. McNeill is well known in Fredericton, having been in charge of the military hospital here for some time and prior to that was with the 2nd Divisional Ammunition Column here.

Private Flemington is a son of Rev. Chas. Flemington, late of Gibson.

Capt. W. H. Irvine of this city is to be one of the officers of No. 8 Field Ambulance.

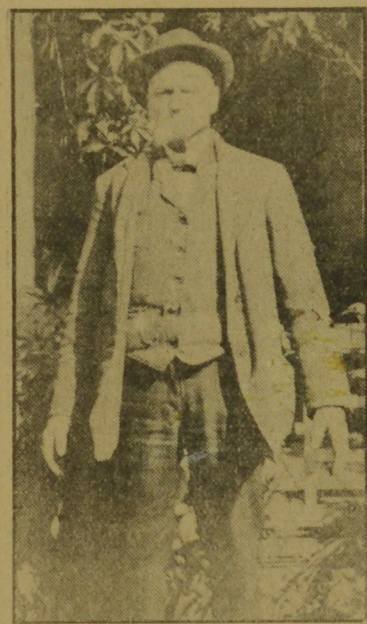
VISITS THE CITY

Municipal Veteran From the Miramichi
Talks on the War and Other Topics.

Ex-Warden John Hinchey, of Parker's Ridge, is among the visitors to the city today and is being heartily welcomed by many old friends.

Mr. Hinchey, as usual, made the Mail office a pleasant call and chatted entertainingly on current events.

"I take a great interest in the war," he said, and follow the news closely in the Mail. I see that Lloyd George is quoted as saying that the Allies have crossed the divide. There is no need of telling an old Miramichi resident like myself what that means. The Germans are going to get all that is

coming to them and they will get it sooner than most people expect. I have a grandson in the trenches and I am proud of it. If I were a young man I would be in the trenches myself. I am seventy-eight years old now, and of course too old for active service, but I sometimes feel as if I would like to take a whack at the Germans."

Mr. Hinchey, in reply to a question, said that crop were doing well in his section, and farmers were looking forward to a big yield.

He said that salmon fishing on the Southwest Miramichi is excellent at the present time and a good many non-resident anglers have visited the stream during the past month.

Asked to give his views on politics, Mr. Hinchey said that the Opposition are picking up many recruits in his section. The people, he said, are disgusted with the Governments, both local and federal, and will vote to turn the rascals out at the first opportunity.

"There is too much boodling going on for the good of the country," he said in conclusion, and it must be stopped."

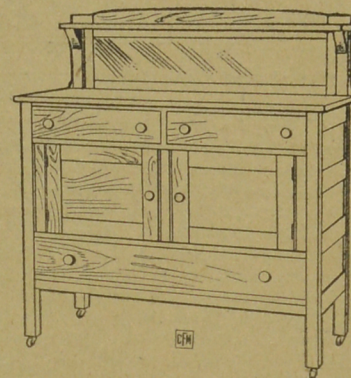
Mr. Hinchey will return home by the I. C. R. express this evening.

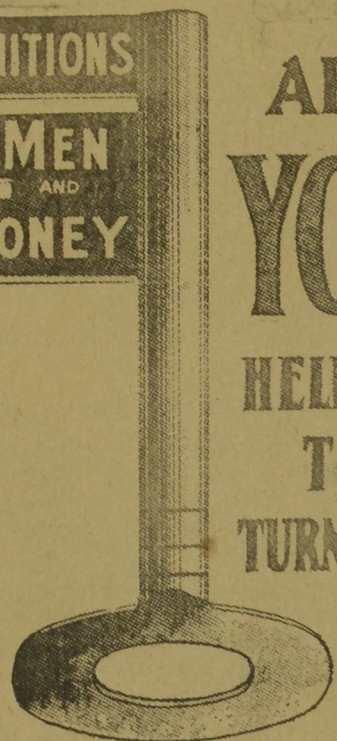
