FLOUR GOES UP.

Bread flour today had a further advance of twenty cents per barrel. The retail price of the best brands is now \$0.30 per barrel. Rolled oats have advanced 75 cents per barrel and oats have gone up eight cents a bushel.

DIED IN ST. JOHN.

Mr. John A. Wheaton of St. John, a well known railroad contractor, died suddenly yesterday at his home at the age of seventy-eight years. He had built railways in all parts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and also Northern Maine.

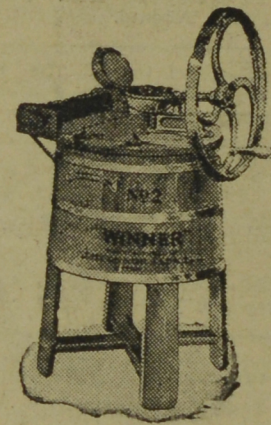
