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National Victory May Help to Restore General Stability

The Imperial Government Will Embark On An Extensive Program at a Cabinet Meeting Today
Empire Conference Included in the Program.

LONDON, Oct. 29—The overwhelming victory of the National Government in the general election was seen today as a most important step toward restoration of the world's general economic stability..
The Government, in a cabinet meeting today, was to begin work on a program expected to include stabilization of the pound sterling, a tariff program, an Empire conference, international reparations conferences and other measures of international importance.

May Establish Credit Bank
PARIS, Oct. 29—Plans for creation of an international credit bank to transform the immense total of short term credits invested in Germany into credits of from three to five years were revealed here today.
The British United Press learned that Emile Francqui, Belgian financier, who discussed the plan with President Hoover at Washington, had accepted an invitation to proceed to Paris from the United States and confer on the proposal with Premier Pierre Laval and Minister of Finance, Pierre Etienne Flandin.

THE PREMIER IS GRATEFUL TO THE PEOPLE

Expresses His Thanks to Those Who Made Possible Such a Great Victory in Election.

London, Oct. 28—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald tonight issued a message to the nation thanking "millions of persons of all parties who for the moment subordinated party feelings and issues to the pressing national needs."
"A majority, unique as it is gratifying, which was given today must convince the whole world that when this country calls for assistance willing hands and devoted minds will always respond heartily," the message said.
"We appealed for a demonstration of national unity. The response has been far beyond the dreams of the most enthusiastic of us."

Gives Assurance
"To my political friends who have suffered such unusual reverses, and especially to those of them who with splendid faith and courage backed our appeal and helped to swell our victory, I give assurance that our triumph will in no way mean that either the interests or the point of view of the working classes will be overlooked in the performance of the task before us."
With a sprig of heather as a boutonniere, MacDonald stepped into No. 10 Downing Street today to begin another remarkable chapter in his remarkable political career. Facing serious problems at home and abroad but with the resounding approval of his countrymen fresh in his ears, the head of the victorious National Government, tired but happy, had flown from Seaham Harbor to London to save precious time in getting to work.

OUTLOOK FOR POULTRY TRADE VERY BRIGHT

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 29—The prospects for the poultry business in the Maritime Provinces is very encouraging to the Maritime Cooperative Egg and Poultry Exchange, according to a bulletin of the Agricultural Dept. of the Canadian National Railways, it expects an increase of about 30,000 chicks in 1932 over the record hatch of this year of 120,000. The new equipment is being installed including electrically operated automatic humidifiers and separate hatchery compartments all to be in readiness for the opening of the hatching season in February.

PASSENGER ON THE EMPRESS MADE FAST TRIP

Beat Out An Aquitania Passenger One Day to Chicago

Veteran Traveller Likes the St. Lawrence Route

Quebec, Oct. 29—"I beat Aquitania Passengers a full twenty-four hours, Southampton to Chicago, on my last trip to Canada aboard the Empress of Britain," said Major H. Nicholson, passenger on the Empress of Britain, which left here this afternoon. The Aquitania of the Cunard line sailed an hour and a half before the Britain on the Wednesday and I was in Chicago at 9 p.m. the following Tuesday, while a lady on the Aquitania arrived there a day later."
Major Nicholson is a frequent traveller on business between England and the United States, but stated that he always chose the St. Lawrence route in preference to sailing direct to New York.

ECONOMIES MAY CUT THE DOG PATROL

Detroit, Oct. 29—The police dog detail of the Detroit police department seems likely to be disbanded because of economies.
The eight dogs, which have been trained to watch for prowlers in the Palmer Park residential district, eat \$131.16 worth of food a year, and this appropriation has been slashed from the police budget.
Police heads said the dogs were very efficient in their patrol work, but that they would have to be disposed of unless the appropriation was reinstated.

RADIO, AIRPLANE SAVE BOY'S LIFE

Los Angeles, Oct. 28—Two-year-old Allen Taplin owes his chance to get well to a lot of strangers, an airplane and radio, as well as to medical science. His father, summoned from Las Vegas for a blood transfusion, missed the Los Angeles plane. A radio message asking the passengers if they were willing to turn back, brought unanimous consent. The plane landed Allen's daddy in time.

HOME TO BE PRESERVED

New York, Oct. 29—John Audubon naturalist, built himself a house 96 years ago at a spot which he thought was "far from that crazy city." Reginald P. Bolton, historian, and a group of associates have started a movement to save the house, which now stands in the shadow of towering apartment houses at West 153rd street and Riverside drive.

JUNIPER TREES 2,000 YEARS OLD

Bend, Or., Oct. 29—Puny, gnarled juniper trees, abundant in Central Oregon, rival the giant California redwoods in age. Trees 2000 years old have been cut. In some trees, 75 rings were found within the breadth of an inch, revealing a growth of an inch in 75 years.

Ancient Colony Suffering From Over Borrowing

Member of Legislative Council Says That There Must Be Economy All Around in the Future—Scattered Population Makes Relief Work Difficult.

QUEBEC, Oct. 29—Conditions are no worse in Newfoundland than they are in Quebec, but the island is suffering financially from a period of over-borrowing and must economize all around in the future, was the view expressed by Hon. Mr. Job, member of the Newfoundland Legislative Council, interviewed aboard the Empress of Britain on that vessel's last trip of the season from Quebec today.
Mr. Job added that the population of the island scattered along its thousand-mile coast line formed a difficult problem in the matter of relief work, but he had no doubt that the problem would be satisfactorily handled this winter. Mr. Job is spending a few weeks in England visiting relatives.

SURCHARGE IS IMPOSED ON EXPRESS RATES

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 28—A surcharge amounting to 60 per cent of the rate of exchange between Canadian and United States currency has been imposed upon the ordinary express rates by the Board of Railway Commissioners. The order becomes effective today. This brings the express rates into line with the freight rates on traffic to the United States, a surcharge having been placed on these several weeks ago.
Refusal of the United States express companies to accept payment in anything but United States funds was the reason given for the imposition of the surcharge.

LAYS BLAME ON U.S. TARIFF

AN ECONOMIC CONFERENCE IS COMING SOON

Canadian Government Will Submit Proposal to the Other Dominions

Ottawa, Oct. 28—The Canadian Government will propose to the various Governments of the Empire that the Imperial Economic Conference, the assembling of which last August was postponed, meet at Ottawa "at the earliest possible date." This was the statement issued to the press tonight by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, the prime Minister.
In his statement the Prime Minister expressed the hope that former difficulties surrounding the plan for holding the Conference in the Canadian Capital "have now been removed."
Mr. Bennett was asked whether in his opinion the return of the National Government in Great Britain would mean an early meeting of the Imperial Conference which, on motion by Canada at the London Conference a years ago, was unanimously adjourned to meet at Ottawa "with the succeeding 12 months."

Issues Statement
In reply the Prime Minister authorized the following statement:
"As the suggested date of meeting was later found to be inconvenient to several of the Governments concerned, a postponement became necessary. The Canadian Government earnestly hopes that the difficulties heretofore prevailing have now been removed; and it will immediately propose to the Governments of the Empire that the conference meet at Ottawa at the earliest possible date."
"This Government is confident," continued the Prime Minister, "that the conference will achieve an enduring plan of closer Empire economic association. The need for such an association was never more urgent; its benefits never more apparent. Canada will do its full share to bring it about."
