HOPE TO HAVE ST. JOHN RIVER SEALED TOMORROW

It is expected that the St. John River Log Driving Company will have the St. John River sealed at Lincoln by noon tomorrow. Tugs and crews have been at work since Monday morning but yesterday the heavy run of ice seriously hampered operations. Low water is also keeping back the work of hanging the booms. The booms intended for Kingsclear cannot get any farther than Springhill unless the river raises at least one foot. It will take that much more water to enable the tugs to get up. Mr. Walter Jackson, boom manager for the company, however, says that good progress has been made in getting out the sheerybooms, considering conditions. The river is slowly rising and some odd logs are running.

On the Nashwaak the Partington Company's driving crews started yesterday morning. They will get logs off the landings for some days. At the end of that time it is thought the weather will be warm enough to cause a rise in the water. Prospects for driving are considered good.

All the ice is not out of the Southwest Miramichi but the Miramichi Lumber Company has had crews driving on Cain's River for a week.

Rome, April 18.—The ancient cathedral at Andria, near Bari, was damaged by fire today. The fire began in residence of the bishop, from which Monsignor Seidl was rescued with difficulty. Andria in the thirteenth century was a favorite residence of Emperor Frederick II, two of whose wives were buried in the Cathedral.

RUSSIAN BARK SUNK.

LONDON, April 18.—According to a despatch to Lloyd's the Russian bark Schwanden, which left Greenock, Scotland, March 23 for Mobile, Ala., has been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine. The crew of the bark was saved.

GERMAN PIRATES CAPTURED.

LONDON, April 18.—"The French have captured the submarine which torpedoed the Sussex, and have made prisoners of the captain and crew," says the Daily Mail.

BRITISH LINES FORCED BACK.

LONDON, April 18.—British lines on the south bank of the Tigris in Mesopotamia have been forced back by the Turks for a distance in some places of from 500 yards to 800 yards, says an official statement given out today by the official press bureau.

WARM PRAISE FOR 26TH BATTALION

Gallant N. B. Corps Lost 18
Killed and 30 Wounded in
Three Days--General Turner's Letter

The St. John Telegraph is in receipt of a letter from Lieut. Col. J. L. McAvity, O.C., 26th Battalion enclosing a copy of a letter recently received from Major General R. E. W. Turner, the officer commanding the 2nd Canadian Division. The correspondence is as follows:

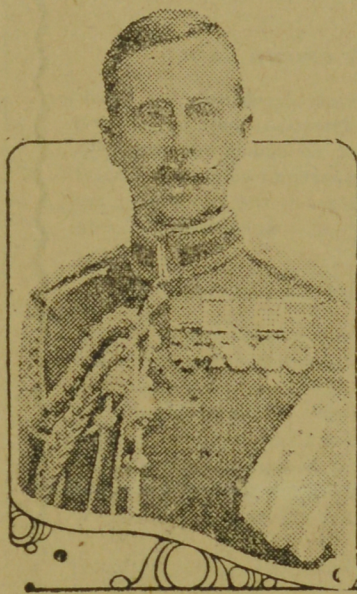
Gallant Work in the Trenches.

Headquarters 26th Battalion,
March 31, 1916.

To the Editor Telegraph,
St. John, N.B.

Sir,—It is with pleasure and with considerable pardonable pride that I attach hereto a copy of a personal letter written by Major General R. E. W. Turner, V.C., C.B., D.S.O., commanding 2nd Canadian Division.

This letter was written after we had passed through a trying winter campaign and immediately after a particularly hard tour in the trenches, a session during which we had eighteen killed and thirty wounded in three days. Only a week before that we lost two of our best officers, Major W. H. Belyea and Lieut. H. W. Ferguson.

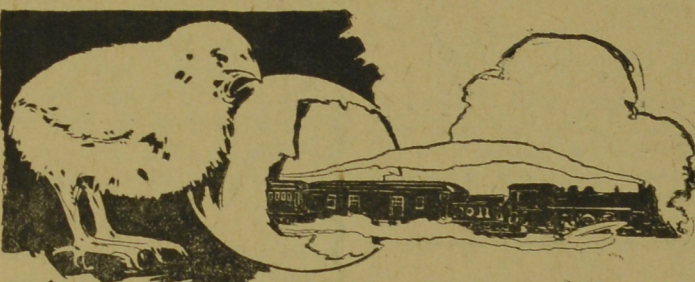

Naval Reservist

Lost His Life

Sydney, N. S., April 18.—Wm. Cross, a Newfoundland naval reservist, while on a hundred mile walk from his home at Hermit's Cove to St. John's, where he was to join H. M. S. Britain, was picked up dead near Green's Pond. Travelling across the bay, he fell through the ice. He made a gallant fight for life, breaking a path over half a mile to the shore, upon which he crawled and died from exposure.
