

CITY SCHOOLS
GIVEN LEVY FOR
THE YEAR

Amount Was \$115,000; Trustees Had Asked for More—Held Special Meeting School Board and City Council.

The appropriation to the city schools this year from the city, was settled at a special meeting last night between the City Council, and the Board of School Trustees, at \$115,000. The School Trustee had asked for \$118,000. The amount appropriated this year for the schools is \$5,000 more than last, when the figure was \$110,000. The City Council after acceding to the amount for the schools, passed their entire appropriation for the year which was \$279,000. Last year the total was \$272,000.

Met With Board

Last night's meeting, was the result of a disagreement over the school levy when the city council met last week, and they decided to meet with the School Trustees to decide on a figure. The meeting was well attended, and after some little discussion on the matter, the amount was passed.

It was mentioned that the city high school was the only one in the province, which was entirely supported by the city. Other high schools were aided by county grants.

For Defendant

A verdict for the defendant in the case of LeBlanc Crowley vs. Edward Feeney, a land trespass action, was brought in yesterday by the jury in the case, after they had been in retirement for about two hours. The case was before the Court of King's Bench. Mr. Justice LeBlanc presiding, and had been adjourned several times since January. The plaintiff had brought action against Feeney for cutting pulpwood on his land. The action concerns the boundaries of lots at Newmarket and vicinity.

On A Visit Here

D. Leo Dolan of Halifax, a former Fredericton newspaper man, was a visitor to the city yesterday and received a hearty welcome from many old friends. Mr. Dolan was for several years employed as Liberal organizer in the sister province, but having failed to organize a majority of the seats into the Liberal column at the late election he pitched the job and joined the staff of the Halifax Herald, a staunch Tory newspaper. He says that Hon. Mr. Harrington, the new Premier of Nova Scotia is making good.

To Operate Mill

The indications are that the saw mill of the River Valley Lumber Company of Oromocto, of which the late R. B. Smith was manager, will be operated as usual next season. The acting manager is Kenneth Golding, a brother of the president of the River Valley Lumber Company, and he is now looking after lumber shipments. Gabriel F. Smith of Blissville is in charge of the woods operations of the company. Work in the woods has been completed, and the logs have been browed ready for stream driving. The season's cut is in the vicinity of four millions and about one million feet has been purchased from jobbers.
