## -Woman's Column-

### TO REMOVE STAINS.

For fresh tea and coffee stains  
use boiling water. Place the linen  
stained over a large bowl and pour  
through it boiling water from the  
teakettle, held at a height to in-  
sure force. Old tea and coffee  
stains which have become set  
should be soaked in cold water  
first, then in boiling water.

For peach stains, a weak solu-  
tion of chloride of lime.

For scorch, hang or spread ar-  
ticle in the sunshine.

For mildew, lemon juice and  
sunshine, or if obstinate, dissolve  
one tablespoon of chloride of lime  
in four quarts of cold water, and  
soak the article until mildew dis-  
appears. Rinse thoroughly to avoid  
chemical action upon the linen.

### TO LENGTHEN CLOTHES.

When you are making clothes  
for the children, which you know  
will need letting down in a month  
or two, try putting a tuck on the  
wrong side of the hem. When this  
is ripped there will be hardly any  
trace of the makeshift and there  
will be no time wasted in ripping  
the hem, rehanging the garment  
and restitching the hem.

Another good way to prepare  
future lengthening of a dress is to  
make rather a wide hem, leaving  
it unstitched, and folding it up so  
that a second hem is formed. This  
is stitched, and when the dress be-  
comes short is let out and the first  
hem stitched. This is a time-sav-  
ing method of shortening a night  
dress or apron where very careful  
work would not be needed. An  
even length is kept without rip-  
ping or cutting.

In cutting flannel skirts for a  
baby I found that if I laid the pat-  
tern upon the goods, neck to neck,  
the pieces which were left at the  
sides were large enough for the  
first straight flannel bands.

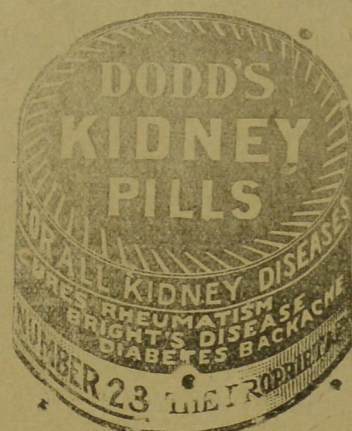
### OIL YOUR CASTERS.

Oil the casters of your furniture  
occasionally and see how much  
easier it will move. Be sure to  
wipe off all superfluous oil. If you  
are annoyed by casters slipping  
out of the furniture, wind a rub-  
ber band around the shank of the  
caster before slipping it into its  
place. A good rubber band will

last a long time.

### ORANGE SHORT CAKE.

Make a pastry shell of rich pie  
crust, prick in several places and  
bake a delicious brown. Meantime  
pare and cut in small pieces two  
large or four small oranges and  
sprinkle with plenty of sugar. Let  
stand in a very cold place till want-  
ed. the pastry should be cold when  
the pie is put together. Then fill  
with the oranges and dot with  
maraschino cherries. If liked, cov-  
er with a meringue of the whites  
of two eggs whipped stiffly with  
four tablespoons of powdered sug-  
ar and browned in a very moder-  
ate oven.
