## MR. SMITH HEARD FROM.

The report of the Public Accounts Committee was brought down in the Legislature this morning and it gave Mr. B. Frank Smith an opportunity to deliver a speech on the subject of patriotic potatoes. He admitted that he sold 42,331 barrels of potatoes to the Government, but claimed that the interests of the province had not suffered thereby. He made an attack on Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., but ignored the recent attack made upon him by the Fredericton organ of his own party. Mr. Dugal, Hon. Dr. Landry and others took part in the discussion.

## VALUABLE HORSE DROWNED.

Two young men belonging to Marys ville hired a horse and carriage from Mr. George B. Moore's livery stable last night with the intention of driving to Marysville. Near McConnell's Crossing, while the two young men were out of the carriage the horse started for Fredericton. The men tried to overtake it but failed and thinking the animal would go to its stable went home. The next heard of the horse was this morning, when a telephone message from Gibson stated that it was drowned in the St. John River where the winter road to Marysville crosses the river. Mr. Moore at once had the carriage and harness recovered from the river. The animal was a valuable one and his loss will be considerable. It is thought that the horse, through force of habit, turned at the place where the winter road crosses on the ice. It had swam out a considerable distance.

SUPT. H. C. GROUT SAYS  
PROPOSED CHANGE  
IS NOT OPPOSED

Early Train for St. John to be Withdrawn June 4—First Departure From This City Will be at 7.20 am.

Mr. H. C. Grout of St. John, superintendent of the Atlantic Division of the C.P.R., is in the city today, interviewing merchants and other citizens with regard to the proposed withdrawal of the early morning train between this city and St. John. Speaking to a reporter of The Mail at noon, (Mr. Grout said that he had come to the opinion that there was no opposition in Fredericton to the suggested changes, in fact the opinion was that the proposed arrangement was the best that could be made under the circumstances.

On account of the adoption of the Daylight Saving scheme in St. John, it will be necessary for the train now leaving Fredericton at 6.10 to leave at 5.10 in order to accommodate suburban traffic between Welsford and St. John. Mr. Grout says that this train carries very few through passengers from St. John and it is advisable to withdraw it from Fredericton, making it start in the morning from Fredericton Junction and arrive in St. John shortly before nine. The traffic from Fredericton in the morning for points west is to be taken care of by a train leaving this city at 7.20 and connecting at Fredericton Junction with the train for Boston. The evening train for Fredericton will leave St. John at the same Atlantic time as at present, arriving at Fredericton at the usual time. It will leave for Fredericton

Many Here to Attend Tweedie-Lottimer Nuptials--Ceremony to Take Place at 6.30 at St. Paul's Church.

Tweedie of Chatham, formerly lieutenant governor of New Brunswick, and the bride is a daughter of Mrs. W. T. Chestnut of this city. Capt. P. M. 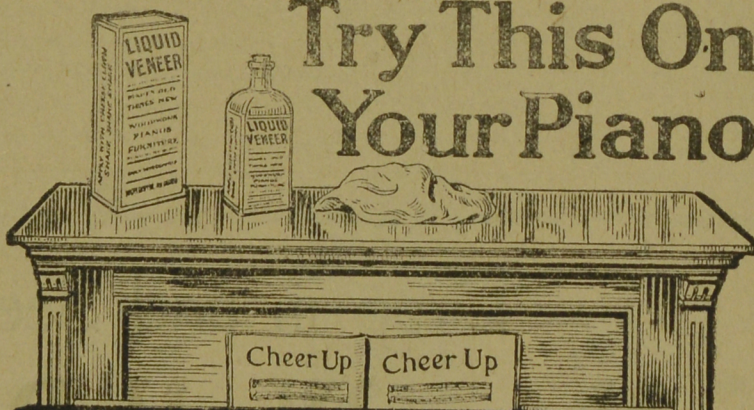
