## OVERSEAS TROOPS WRECK A RESTAURANT AT CALGARY

Calgary, Alberta, Feb. 11.—A mob of several hundred soldiers completely wrecked the White Lunch Restaurant on Eighth avenue east, last night, following up the work of destruction by wrecking the premises of the same concern on Fifth avenue. A rumor that the manager had dismissed returned soldiers who had been hired as waiters and had replaced them with Germans, was responsible for the attack.

The place was owned by the White Lunch Company and F. H. Naegel is the manager. Mr. Naegel denied that he had dismissed any returned soldier or that he had hired any Germans, but said he had occasion to dismiss a man who at one time had been a soldier, but was not now with the overseas forces. He declared that the affair was the result of a conspiracy.

### Would Not Disperse.

Soon after nine o'clock about five hundred soldiers from a battalion stationed here marched in a body along Ninth avenue to the White Lunch restaurant. Mr. Naegel had been warned of impending trouble and had notified both the police and military authorities. Chief of Police Cadely hastily collected half a dozen constables and plain clothes men and hurried to the place.

All customers were sent out and the doors locked. When the soldiers arrived the chief asked them to disperse and not to behave in an unlawful manner. His advice was disregarded, and as a preliminary a shower of missiles went crashing through the big plate-glass window. A woman cashier was slightly hurt and a police constable badly cut by flying glass. He was sent to the hospital.

### A Lively Fracas.

The policemen were swept aside like chips in a gale, and for an hour the mob did its will. The crowd was increased to 2,000 and the officers were helpless. The furniture, fixtures and cooking apparatus were smashed to fragments, marble counters and stands looked as though artillery shells had exploded. A cash register was broken open and looted. Coffee urns and gas stoves were torn from their places. Electric fixtures were pulled down.

The street outside was littered with wreckage. The safe was thrown down stairs into the basement, breaking the stairway.

The fire department was then called out. The firemen could only look on while the surging mob of men in khaki with a number of civilians, wrecked the restaurant in the most thorough manner. No arrests were made. General Cruickshanks, commanding Military District 13, says an investigation will be held.

The damage is in the vicinity of \$8,000.

### AUSTRIA DENIES REPORT.

VIENNA, Feb. 11 (via London).—An official statement issued here today declares that the reports that there has been an explosion in the Skoda armament factory in Bohemia are untrue.

### CAPTURED BY COSSACKS.

PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 11.—A despatch from Tcheran says that Assim Bey, Turkish ambassador to Persia, has been captured by a patrol of Cossacks near Keredji. Three companions who were taken prisoners at the same time as the ambassador have proved to be the Austrian military attaché and two Austrian prisoners of war who had escaped from the Russians some time ago.

## Norwegian Steamer Sunk By a Mine

(Canadian Press.)  
London, Feb. 11.—A Reuter despatch from Rotterdam reports the arrival at the Hook of Holland of a pilot steamer carrying ten men from the Norwegian steamship Vaarlie, which struck a mine near Terschoelling a Dutch island in the North Sea, and sank. The captain, chief engineer and second mate are believed to have been drowned. The Vaarlie, 244 feet long, was built in 1882 and was owned in Christiania.

### SUMMER HOTEL BURNED.

Kennebunkport, Me., Feb. 11.—Mineral Springs House, a summer hotel at Kennebunkport Beach, was burned today. The loss was estimated at \$15,000.

### OFFICIAL REPORTS.

Paris, Feb. 11.—The official communication issued this afternoon by the French War Department says: "In the course of the night there was no event of importance to report."

Berlin, Feb. 11 (via London).—The repulse of four successive attacks by the French in efforts to recapture trenches they had lost northwest of Vimy, in the Artois, was announced today by German army headquarters. The French also failed in assaults to the south of the Somme.

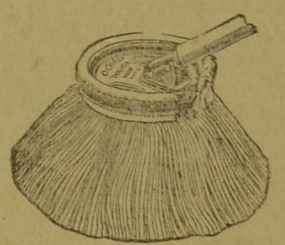
