PRaises FOSTER'S HORSES.

The minister stated that, so far as
the horses in Kings county, N.S.,
particularly referred to by Mr. Hughes,
were concerned, he would like to
point out that they had cost \$71, as
compared with \$225 paid in New Brun-
swick; \$174 in Prince Edward Island
and \$185 in Cape Breton, near Syd-
ney. Some of the best horses he had
seen at Valcartier Camp came from
Kings county, one specimen of them
in particular being, with the excep-
tion of four, which he was sure had
been substituted during shipment, and
twenty-two which had suffered from
the effects of careless transportation,
the best he had inspected.

"I am prepared to enter into the
details of this matter any time,"
said the minister. "I am prepared to
make it a political issue, if the hon-
orable gentlemen wish, or a business
issue, if they wish that. I am pre-
pared to say the horses purchased in
Kings county were the cheapest
bought in the Maritime Provinces,
and better horses than were secured
for greater prices in Westmorland or
Sydney."

SHIPMENT OF FISH TO CANADIAN TROOPS

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—The first big con-
signment of Canadian fish for Cana-
dian soldiers now overseas is now be-
ing dispatched to England. About
forty tons of lake and sea fish will be
sent weekly henceforth. The first
load is made up of salmon and halibut
from the Pacific Coast, and cod,
soles, smoked haddock and filets
from the Maritime Provinces. Later
shipments will contain lake white fish
from western lakes and herrings from
Lake Superior.

In this way, the whole fishing in-
terests of the dominion will be re-
presented in the new fish diet for the
boys at the front. Special cold stor-
age space has been reserved by the
militia department for the fish in the
transport crassing weekly.

At present, fish prices are away up
in England, and the militia depart-
