## PREMIER CLARKE

SEIZED BY ILLNESS  
LAST EVENING

Considerably Improved This Afternoon  
—Acute Indigestion the Cause—  
Government Session Will be  
Continued Next Week.

Hon. George J. Clarke, premier of New Brunswick, was seized at the Barker House last night by an attack of acute indigestion, being subject to such attacks. Medical aid was summoned and his condition for a time caused anxiety. This afternoon he is reported to be considerably improved, having passed a good night. His wife arrived from St. Stephen at noon. Hon. Mr. Clarke will rest for some days before resuming his governmental duties.

The seizure last evening took Premier Clarke while he was at dinner. He was taken to his room and Dr. A. B. Atherton and Dr. G. O. VanWart were summoned. A trained nurse also was secured to attend him.

Premier Clarke has had several seizures of this kind within the past few years and has been treated by specialists. It is understood that within his own party there is a movement afoot to have him resign the leadership of the government on account of ill health.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, attorney general, and Hon. J. A. Murray, minister of agriculture, left for their homes last night, the session of the government being suspended. It will be resumed on Monday next.

## SUNDAY NIGHT MEETING.

Another recruiting meeting will be held in the City Opera House on Sunday night. Dr. F. W. Barbour will be the chairman. Very Rev. Dean Neales is to be one of the speakers. Lieut. 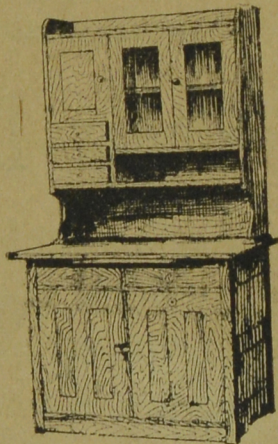
