SIR SAM HUGHES QUILTS THE BORDEN CABINET

(Continued from page one.)

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Sir Sam Hughes and the Government have finally broken. As the culmination of long continued and steadily increasing friction between the Minister of Militia and his cabinet colleagues over questions of appointments, patronage, political expediency and joint ministerial responsibility, General Hughes today accepted the Prime Minister's suggestion that the resignation of the Minister of Militia might be forthcoming, and shortly after noon the resignation was placed in Sir Robert's hands.

The writing of the resignation followed an exchange of letters between the two containing charges and counter charges.

Although it was suspected in the capital that the resignation was coming, it was thought right up to the last moment that the quarrel again might be patched up. Finally, however, Sir Sam took the plunge, wrote the letter of resignation and sent it by a trusted friend and official to the Prime Minister's office.

Sir Robert accepted the resignation and his first official business with the new Governor General this afternoon was to formally place before him the resignation of one of his advisers—the one who should have been the most important in time of war. It was, perhaps, not a very auspicious introduction for the Duke of Devonshire to Canada's administration.

Four Names Suggested.

No successor has yet been named for the portfolio. Four names are suggested:

Hon. A. E. Kemp, at present chairman of the war purchasing commission; a former acting Minister of Militia, and minister without portfolio in the cabinet.

Sir Jas. Lougheed, Government leader in the Senate, formerly acting Minister of Militia and at present chairman of the Dominion Hospitals Commission.

F. B. McCurdy, the Parliamentary Secretary for the Militia Department, who has been more or less in control of the department for the past three months.

Col. Hugh Clark, parliamentary under secretary of state for external affairs, and Sir Robert Borden's confidential handy man.

The Premier is keeping his own counsel as yet. Even his cabinet colleagues profess ignorance as to the choice. It may be that no new minister will be appointed at all, in view of the fact that the duties of the portfolio have already been divided up among four or five men.

Furthermore, if a new minister is sworn in and takes the salary of the portfolio, there would have to be a by-election. The government does not want any by-elections at the present moment, as witness the fact that there are now sixteen vacancies in the Commons and no move is contemplated towards filling any of them.

The quarrel between Sir Sam and the rest of the government has been rapidly coming to a head ever since the former returned from England two months ago. As has been public property for months past, a section of the Conservative party has been out after Sir Sam's scalp almost since the outbreak of the war. He has been his own master in the Militia Department and his brusque manner of turning down members of his own party, who thought they had a right to exercise political patronage, his refusal to consult his cabinet colleagues on the details of his departmental administration, his occupancy of the centre of the stage when they too wanted a place in the spotlight, and his riding roughshod over all and sundry who tried to interfere with him, made him many enemies, although at the same time it gave him a unique prestige in Canada as the man in the cabinet who did things.

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Late tonight the following statement was given out from the Prime Minister's office:

"It is announced that the Prime Minister has requested and has received the resignation of the Minister of Militia and Defence.

"The retirement of Sir Sam Hughes is in part the outcome of the establishment of the ministry of overseas forces and in part is due to the assumption by Sir Sam of powers which in the judgment of the Prime Minister, can be exercised only by the Government as a whole.

"It is anticipated that the correspondence which brought about the request for the Minister's resignation will be made public immediately. It must first be submitted to the Governor General."

After reading the brief statement Sir Sam Hughes made the following statement:

"The correspondence will show that Sir Robert Borden asked for my resignation on account of the tone of a letter written Nov. 1 by the Minister of Militia showing that the Prime Minister had made misstatements which the Minister of Militia promptly proved to be incorrect, and had made criticisms which were shown to be unwarranted when all the facts were considered."

Sir Sam added: "Accompanying my resignation was a request that all the correspondence might be published promptly. I feel quite happy. There is a load off my back that has been on for years.

"In leaving the department I feel I have nothing special to regret in the way of work or men. In Great Britain during the first year of the war, Canada had practically no control; the British system was followed. We have since reorganized the pay and medical department and have of course improved the training of the men to meet the changed conditions of the war.

"Last year for nine straight months our soldiers got no rest from service in the trenches. This year I planned extra divisions so that fully one-quarter of the men could be resting at a time. But perhaps the most important development of all has been the growth of perfect harmony with the War Office."

"What are you going to do now?" the General was asked.

"My intention is to go on with recruiting just as in the past, only more so," said Sir Sam, and the interview came to a close.

It Had to Come.

The Toronto Star (Liberal) says the resignation is a sensation, although it has probably been inevitable for a long time. Three rival ministers of militia in one cabinet—Hughes, McCurdy and Perley—could not all flourish for any great length of time.
