### At the Gaiety.

### Among the First.

Mr. Michael Ryan, a genial resident of St. Marys, was one of the first to adapt himself to winter conditions this morning. He arrived in town at nine o'clock with a horse and sleigh.

### Being Heard This Afternoon.

A Canada Temperance Act case from the city, which was adjourned from last week, is being heard this afternoon in the police court.

### Board of Health.

The Board of Health held no meeting last night, there not being a quorum. It is probable that there will be a meeting of the Board tonight.

### Four Thousand Received.

It is estimated that about \$4,000 has been received by the Education Office in contributions from the schools of the province to the Belgian Relief Fund. The total receipts will not be known for some weeks.

### Sporting Party Returned.

Mr. H. A. Saks and party, of New York, who have been hunting in the Miramichi woods, are at the Queen. They are on their way home after a successful outing.

### Case Postponed.

The case against Dr. Gerrard, on the information of Dr. F. A. Godsoe, representing the New Brunswick Dental Society, was before the police court this morning, and was adjourned until next Tuesday.

### First Snow Storm.

The first snow storm of the winter set in at about 11 o'clock last night. By this morning enough snow had fallen to make good sleighing. The storm took everyone by surprise. No snow ploughs were out, although the fall was about four inches at noon today. The railways were very little inconvenienced.

### Nova Scotia's Governor Dead.

Hon. David McKean, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, died last night after a brief illness from paralysis. He was the third Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia to die in office. Governor McKean was a native of Cape Breton and was 75 years of age. He represented Cape Breton in the House of Commons from 1887 until 1896, in which year he was called to the Senate. He was appointed Lieutenant Governor last year. The deceased was one of the organizers of the Dominion Coal Co., and was a man of wealth.

### Political Rumor.

The latest rumor in local political circles is that the Provincial Government has practically decided to go to the people during the month of February. The office of Lieutenant Governor becomes vacant in March, and Premier Clarke is slated to succeed Governor Wood. The arrangement, so it is said, is that he should first make an effort to secure a new mandate from the people. The Premier's own inclination is to abandon the waterlogged ship of state for the gubernatorial chair and leave his colleagues to sink or swim.

### New Pulp Mill at Van Buren.

Ground has been broken and machinery ordered for a \$500,000 pulp mill at Van Buren, Me., to be built and operated by the Aroostook Pulp Co. The principal stock holders are E. P. Lindsey, of Boston, Geo. Lewis, of Holyoke, Mass., and E. M. Blandin, of Bath, N. H., who own shares in other pulp mills in Maine. The plant will utilize saw mill waste from Northern Maine and Canadian mills for making coarse pulp, is planned for 75 to 100 tons of product a day and will employ about 100 men. The buildings will be mostly of brick, and Bangor machine shops will build some of the machinery.

### Seven Recruits.

Seven recruits had been enlisted at the Fredericton recruiting office for the present week up to noon today. This is one more than the total for last week. Two of the seven are for the 236th Highlanders. They are Sydney Brewer, 21, Zealand; John McFarlane, 44, Hartfield. Five are for the 10th Siege Battery. They are Lyman Alfred Richards, 18, Fredericton; Lee A. Kilburn, 18, Fredericton; James M. Adams, 21, Metapedia, Que.; Whitney Stevens, 18, Campbellton; Clarence E. Jones, 19, Newcastle. All those for the battery but the last are undergraduates of the University of New Brunswick.

## APPEAL REFUSED ON LOCAL C.T.A. CASE BY SUPREME COURT

November Sittings Began This Morning --Common Motions Heard--Attorneys to be Admitted on Thursday.

The Appeal Division of the Supreme Court met this morning, Chief Justice McLeod, Judge White and Judge Grimmer being present. Several common motions were made. One, which was of local interest, concerned a conviction for violation of the Canada Temperance Act made by Police Magistrate Limerick. In this the appeal was refused.

The motions were as follows: Alexander C. Jardine and D. Carleton Chinch vs. The Prescott Lumber Co. M. G. Teed, K.C., for the defendants, moved for time to file factum and enter appeal. Leave to enter was granted. Factum is to be filed by Monday next.

Lucy McIntosh vs. Felix Porier et al. Mr. J. P. Byrne for the plaintiff moved to dismiss the appeal with costs. Court considers.

Ex parte John Johnston. Mr. P. J. Hughes moved for a rule absolute for a certiorari and a rule nisi to quash a conviction made by the Police Magistrate of Fredericton for unlawfully keeping intoxicating liquor for sale, the conviction being for a third or subsequent offence. The grounds urged by Hughes were: 1st, that the conviction was for keeping for sale for a period of more than three months before the laying of the information as disclosed in the summons served; 2nd, that there was a variance between the summons and the information; 3rd, that the information was amended in

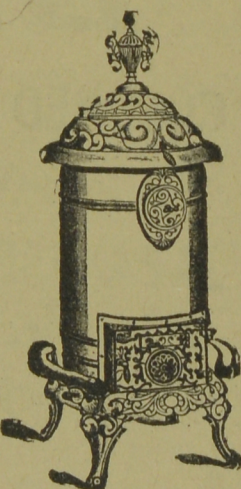

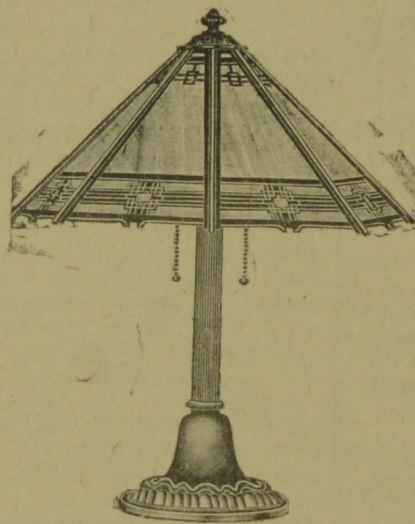
