COWS AND HENS CAN BE PROFITABLE

Farmer's Wife Feeds and Clothes the
Family With By-Products.

(Chicago News.)

Mrs. W. D. Leard, of near Hugo, has
a record that many a woman in the
supposed better agricultural districts
of the United States might well envy.
Beginning with Jan. 1, 1916, Mrs. Leard
has kept a record of her two cows and
40 hens up until October 31. Of these
articles sold and cash received the fol-
lowing is the list:

Butter	\$141.00
Milk	46.50
Eggs	54.20
Chickens	18.70
Vegetables	33.30
One calf	10.00

Total

The next list shows the amount of
stock on hand and invested:

Milk to hogs	\$25.00
Chickens	25.00
Calves on hand	30.00

Total

The amount of eggs, butter and milk
used at home plus \$25 equals the feed
bill for this period, or, as Mrs. Leard
puts it, her net cash is \$339.10. This
money has easily kept the entire family
clothed and fed. What amount Mr.
Leard made from his regular crops is
hence "velvet" to him.

be made a money maker if properly
handled."

CANADIAN COLONELS ARE TO RETURN HOME

Offered a Chance to go to the Front
As Lieutenants—M. P.'s Among
The Number.

Ottawa, Dec. 11.—Conservative mem-
bers of the Canadian House, it is an-
nounced in the Conservative press, will
return to Canada for the session, be-
cause they have been refused pairs by
the Liberal House management. It is
learned that they are coming home, but
not for the reason assigned. Several
members of parliament left Canada in
uniform. Some of them are back and
most of the rest are coming because
they have been given the option of tak-
ing a reduction in rank to lieutenant or
taking off their colonels' or majors' uniforms and taking tickets back to the
Dominion.

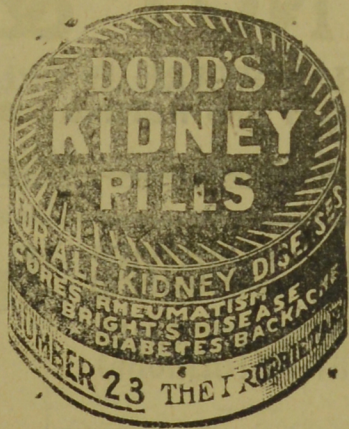
The officials at headquarters here,
as has been announced, have decided
that no men of higher rank than lieu-
tenant shall hereafter go to the front,
unless they have had trench experi-
ence. Many batallions have gone over
during the past year, some under the
command of members of parliament,
and some under other more or less prom-
inent Canadians. The regiments have
been sent to France without the
freshly arrived colonels and majors
who have been left in England in uni-
form and on pay, but without com-
mands. It is estimated that the pay
of such Canadian officers in England
amounts to almost \$100,000 a month.

Under the new regulations most of
these men are to be sent home and cut
off the pay list. This will save money
and return men to useful vocations.

Liberal Member a Private.
The only military member of parlia-
ment who will not be sent home prob-
ably is Private W. F. Carroll, the Lib-
eral representative of Cape Breton,
who enlisted in the ranks to fight with
a rifle and bayonet. He has crossed
the Atlantic and will stay there until
he returns as a casualty or as a vet-
eran when the war is over.

The only other members of parlia-
ment who have seen actual active ser-
vice are: Colonel Harry Baker, Conser-
vative, who was killed in action; Col.
John Currie, who fought bravely at
Ypres, was gassed and returned to re-
cuperate, and Dr. H. S. Beland, Liberal,
who gave his medical skill to the Bel-
gians and is now a prisoner in German
hands.

secretary to the Canadian Pacific
Company, and assistant to the presi-
dent, has at his own request been re-
lieved from his duties and placed on the
retired list.

Mr. E. Alexander, formerly assistant
secretary to the company, succeeds
Mr. Baker.

Mr. Baker's association with the
company dates from its inception in
1831. From 1883 to 1900 he was gen-
eral manager of the Manitoba and
Northwestern Railway, but returned to
the C. P. R. when that road was ac-
quired by the big railway.

LORD MILNER IN FREDERICTON.

Addressed Undergraduates of U. N. B.
Four Years Ago.

Lord Milner, who has been taken in-
to the British cabinet by Hon. David
Lloyd George as Minister without port-
folio, was in Fredericton a little more
than four years ago. The occasion
was during the tour of Canada which
followed his return from South Africa,
where he had been High Commissioner
during the troublous settlement times
following the Boer war. Prof. Kiley,
of Toronto, acted as his secretary dur-
ing his lordship's stay in Canada, and
it was at his suggestion that he visited
Fredericton.

While in this city Lord Milner visit-
ed the University of New Brunswick
and there delivered an address to the
undergraduates. The address was an
impressive one and well displayed Lord
Milner's unusual talents.
