New York, March 21—Miss Gertrude McAuley, a society girl of Montreal, daughter of a life insurance president who won the Cuisine Cross de Pudding, the highest military honor conferred on civilians by inviolated British soldiers at present, returned today broken in health on the Cunard liner Orduna, which got in with 190 passengers from Liverpool. She was the only woman passenger in the first cabin.

For the last eight months Miss McAuley has been making seven hundred puddings de luxe for the wounded "Tommys" in the Mary L. Gerhardt Hospital in London. Her health gave out under the strain. The effect was more wholesome on the invalids who recuperated rapidly on the Canadian belle's diet. She said she had made one hundred puddings a day.

Miss McAuley grew mysterious when asked about the secret processes of her puddings that robbed war of its trench stings.

## WILLARD AND MORAN IN PRIME CONDITION

## Italian Troops In Greek Territory

Paris, March 21—Italian troops entered Greek territory in Epirus, but retired after a day's time, when notified by the commander of the Greek forces that the continued presence of the Italians could not be permitted, according to a statement by Premier Skouloudis in the Greek Chamber of Deputies, reported by the correspondent of the Havas News Agency at Athens.

## PREMIER BOWSER IS AGAIN HEARD FROM

Victoria, B. C., March 21.—Premier Bowser declared in a speech in the Legislature yesterday afternoon that M. A. Macdonald, member for Vancouver, had suggested a way out of the prohibition problem for hotel keepers.

Premier Bowser quoted an alleged interview with Macdonald, in which he was reported as saying that if prohibition were passed by the Legislature the liquor men could move in court to have it nullified as having been passed by a defunct parliament.

Macdonald denied giving the interview.

## ASQUITH ATTENDS THE WAR COUNCIL

London, March 21—Premier Asquith, who has been suffering from bronchial catarrh, has recovered to such an extent that he was able to preside at the war council this morning. It is doubtful, however, whether he is well enough to attend parliament this week.

## STEAMSHIP HANDS GO OUT ON STRIKE

Seattle, Wash., March 21—Four hundred men employed on steamers plying between Seattle and other Puget Sound ports, went on strike last night, demanding higher wages and improved working conditions.

Two jury cases go over until Wednesday of next week. Judgment in the case of Boyce vs Hanson is to be given tomorrow by His Honor Judge Wilson.

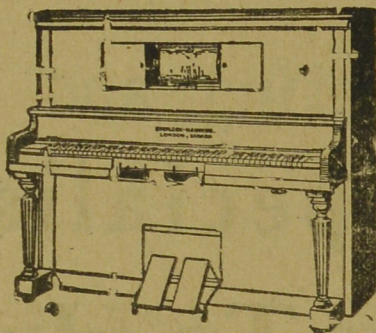
