Infantile Paralysis.

The Provincial Board of Health, at a meeting in St. John yesterday, decided to adopt vigorous methods to keep that dread disease, infantile paralysis, out of New Brunswick. So far there have been three cases in New Brunswick, two in Charlotte county and one in Queens county, and all but one proved fatal. All local boards of health have been given authority to place infantile paralysis under quarantine. Persons coming to the province from places where the disease is known to exist are liable to quarantine.

The Late L. D. Cowie.

The remains of the late Private L. D. Cowie, of Parker's Ridge, were taken to his home by I. C. R. last night and interment took place there this morning. The funeral was with full military honors and was witnessed by several hundred people. The procession formed at Adams' undertaking rooms and proceeded to the I. C. R. station. One of the motors of the 236th Highlanders was placed at the disposal of the relatives of the deceased. The Fredericton Brass Band furnished music and a firing party and pall-bearers were furnished by the 236th Battalion. Officers and men of the unit attended the funeral. The firing party and the pall-bearers accompanied the remains to Parker's Ridge.

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ONE SHELL KILLED

**MURRAY McADAM
AND TOM GORMAN**

Bombardier Karl Walker Wounded by Same Shell--Writes to His Father of Tragic Incident at Front.

One German shell bursting on a gunpit of a New Brunswick field battery in France killed Gunner Murray McAdam of Fredericton and Gunner Thos. Gorman of St. John, and wounded Bombardier Karl Walker of Fredericton.

A letter to Mr. Harry Walker, father of Bombardier Walker, from the latter states that the three artillerymen named were at work placing shells in a gun pit. Bombardier Walker and Gunner Gorman were outside and Gunner McAdam was inside the gunpit stowing away the shells as they were handed in.

The shells had been brought up by the ammunition column during the night. The German gunners evidently had the range of the Canadian battery as three shells burst on the slope in front of this gunpit while the three men were working. A fourth wiped the party out.

Bombardier Walker was stooping at the time it burst, and to that fact he believes he owes his life. Both McAdam and Gorman were killed and Walker was knocked senseless. When he came to he found his hair had been burned off, his face and head cut and his body injured. He was taken to a dressing station and according to the letter did not know positively the fate of his two companions.

The letter was written from Cardiff, Wales, where the writer is in hospital. He writes that he is doing well, although considerably disfigured.

UNUSUAL MOTION

**MADE IN C.T.A. CASE
IN POLICE COURT**

Counsel Moves to Amend Information Confining Time of Offense to One Day--Decision This Afternoon.

The Canada Temperance Act case against a local hotel, which resulted from a raid by the city police early in the morning of October 28th, was continued in the police court this morning. The search warrant was admitted and Mr. P. J. Hughes, counsel for the prosecution, moved to have the information amended so as to apply only to October 28th. The original information alleged an offence during a period extending over three months. Mr. Hughes argued that the evidence of the prosecution showed that the alleged offence of keeping liquor for sale was on October 28th, and that the information should be confined to that day.

Mr. R. B. Hanson for the prosecution opposed the motion, stating that to grant it would amount to a "public scandal," and that an attempt was being made to defeat the ends of justice.

Such a motion as that of Mr. Hughes is unusual in Canada Temperance Act cases, but is quite common in legal procedure in other matters.

Adjournment was made until 2.30 this afternoon, when the police magistrate will give his decision.

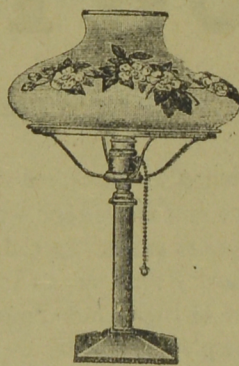
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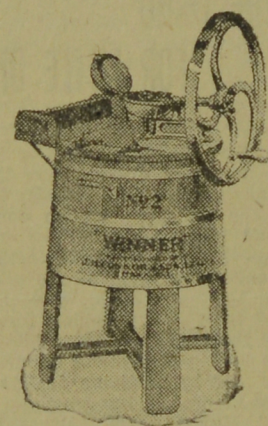
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
