Indian Conference In its Final Stage; Big Flow of Oratory

Thirty-three Speakers Scheduled to Take Part in the Program—Gandhi's Day of Silence Ends—Government of India to Stamp Out Terrorism.

LONDON, Nov. 30—The Round Table Conference on India began its final sessions today, with thirty-three speeches scheduled. It was hoped to conclude all of them except Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald's by late tonight.

Mahatma Gandhi's weekly "day of silence" ended at 1 p.m., so that it was unnecessary for him to break his vow when he spoke this afternoon.

To Adopt Stern Measure

LONDON, Nov. 30—The Government of India is taking immediate measures to stamp out terrorism, Sir Samuel Hoare, Secretary of State for India, told a questioner in the House of Commons today.

He said the Governor-General of India was promulgating an ordinance today, empowering the authorities to facilitate operations against revolutionaries terrorizing the Chittagong district, and to expediate the trials of terrorists.

C.N.R. TRAFFIC RECORDS SHOW IMPROVEMENT

Moncton, N. B. November 30—An improvement of well over 200 per cent in the grain car unloadings of the Canadian National Railways in Montreal during the period Nov. 1-27 as compared with the same period of 1930 is shown by the Company's traffic records.

The figures show that during the period in question Canadian National grain cars unloaded here numbered 332, representing approximately 664,000 bushels as compared with only 152 cars or 304,000 bushels in the first twenty seven days of November last year.

MORATORIUM ON S.S. DEBTS IS EXTENDED

London, (Nov. 30)—Stockholders of the White Star line voted today to extend the moratorium on debts of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company to March 1, 1932, and conditional or presentation of a re-organization plan for Royal Mail by that time to re-extend the moratorium until July 1. The moratorium was to have expired tomorrow.

DIPLOMATIC OFFICER DEAD

Berlin, Nov. 30—Wilhelm Missmuss, aged 51, diplomatic officers who in 1915 organized warfare among South Persian tribes who opposed the British until the end of the world war died today.

RUSSIA PUTS BAN ON BARTER OF GOODS

Moscow, Russia, Nov. 30—The government has taken sharp measures to suppress a widespread form of direct barter between various state and co-operative organization which is interfering with planned economy. Individual enterprises have in many instances been arranging a direct exchange of goods giving up products of which they have an excess for those which they lack. This economic short-cut eliminating money banks and the authorized trading channels, has tended to upset official plans for the distribution of available goods.

FRISCO STARTS NEW BRIDGE

San Francisco, Nov. 30—Lowly barges will provide the work-rooms from which experts will seek a base for the new \$65,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland Bay bridge, with geologists and engineers scheduled to examine scores of "cores" drilled from the bay bottom.

Where the huge piers and anchorages, weighing thousands of tons, which will support the structure, will be placed will depend upon the findings of those experts.

Beginning the work, which is expected to require three months, the first drill was sent down Oct. 24.

Many things must be determined from the survey of the bay bottom. The depth of the rock encountered, the slope at which it lies, and its composition are among the main factors to be discovered.

"Cores" will be sent to the floating laboratory which will be installed on one of the barges, and there tested for the information sought. A drafting room will be maintained in connection with the laboratory, so that accurate charts may be kept.

TWO DROWNED WHEN TRUCK GOES OVER A WHARF

Distressing Accident at Saint John on Saturday—Driver Had Narrow Escape.

Saint John, Nov. 30—Trapped in the closed cab of a truck which plunged over North Wharf, at the foot of King street, into 12 feet of water, late Saturday afternoon, two boys met death by drowning.

They were James Henry Mullin, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel F. Mullin, 40 Brook street, and Charles Bernard McCarthy, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. McCarthy, 65 Sheriff street.

The driver of the truck, Russell London, 27, of 409 Chesley street, miraculously escaped the same fate. Able to extricate himself from the wreckage, he floated to the surface and was snatched from death by A. N. Cheney, of Grand Manan.

Cheney, first mate of the Enid Hazel, which was docked at the end of South Wharf, some 30 yards away, hurried to the rescue in a rowboat and lifted London into the small craft, just as the man was losing consciousness in the icy waters of the harbor.

Hurtled off Wharf

According to Charles Nordman, 9 Crown street, the truck hurtled off the wharf when London lost control of the vehicle in an effort to avoid striking a car driven by him.

"I was driving down North Wharf," Nordman said. "When I came to Smythe street, on my right side of the road, I saw London's truck flash around the corner, heading right for me.

"I jammed on my breaks and blew the horn. London, who seemed to be going at least 25 miles an hour, swerved away from me. His truck skidded, struck the raised edge of the wharf, bounced into the air and hurled into the water." Nordman added that London had tried to cut around the corner on the inside, and was on his wrong side of the street.

At the General Hospital yesterday, London, still suffering severely from shock, exposure and minor injuries, was unable to give a coherent account of what had happened. All he remembered, he said, was being unable to make the turn at the corner of North wharf.

He had no recollection, evidently, of the harrowing experience through which he passed after the truck plunged 15 feet off the dock into two fathoms of water.

Died at Nashwaak

W. Spafford Wade, aged 86, died at his home in Nashwaak after a lingering illness on Sunday morning. Deceased was a well known farmer, and had lived nearly all his life in that place. His wife had predeceased him in 1916. Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Manzer of Millville; Mrs. Mary O. Brown, of Stanley, also a number of nephews and nieces. The funeral took place this afternoon with service at the late home at two o'clock and later at the Penniac United Baptist church at 2.40 o'clock, conducted by Rev. E. R. MacWilliams. Interment was made in the United Baptist cemetery. A large number of friends and relatives gathered at the funeral, for the deceased was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him, who were many.

JAPANESE GOODS ARE BOYCOTTED IN TORONTO

Result of Demonstration In the Chinese Quarter

JAP STOCKS BURNED

Placards Posted That Described the Japs as Murderers

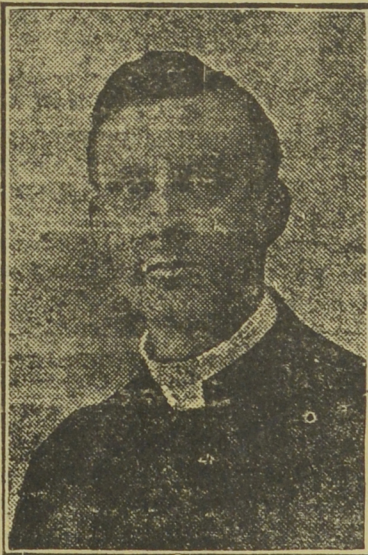

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 30—Anti-Japanese demonstrations in the Chinese quarters have resulted in virtually a complete boycott against Japanese goods, the British United Press learned today.

Recently Japanese stocks of teas, nuts, dried fish and other merchandise were piled high on a lot and burned. Placards were carried around calling the Japanese "murderers." The unofficial mayor of Chinatown is reported to have ordered the boycott and to have pledged men and money to China.

French Minister Will Confer With Board of Trade

Louis Rollin Will Leave Soon for London for a Discussion on Franco-British Economic Problems—Important Subjects on the Agenda.

PARIS, Nov. 30—Louis Rollin, Minister of Commerce, will leave soon for London to confer with the British Board of Trade as a part of the general Franco-British discussion of economic problems.

Pierre Etienne Flandin, the Finance Minister, returned from London today reporting sufficient progress to enable Rollin to take up the negotiations. The subjects will include customs duties, reparations and stabilization of the pound sterling. Flandin will consult with Premier Pierre Laval and then report to the Cabinet on Thursday.

HUNGRY TARPON MAKE FISHERMEN SOUTH HAPPY

Brownsville, Tex., Nov. 30—King Tarpon, game fish of the Gulf of Mexico, has been extremely hungry in these waters the past few weeks and fishermen have been happy.

Large catches are being made daily and the peak was reached when 16 large tarpon were hooked in a single day near Port Isabel.

The record for landing the largest tarpon is held by Charles Polhemus who hooked one measuring 7 feet 2 1/2 inches. A feature of this catch was that the hook lodged in the fish's belly instead of its mouth.

SECOND POTATO CROP IN OZARKS

Bethany, Mo., Nov. 30—Potato growers in the Ozarks mountain districts are getting a second crop free, this year. Gardeners dug their potatoes in August, but threw back the small ones, which would not sell because of prevailing low prices. The little "spuds" sprouted, and now there's a second crop coming up. Some of the potatoes are as large as a man's fist.

MRS. C. A. BURCHILL DIES IN HOSPITAL

The death occurred at the Victoria Hospital here on Sunday morning of Mrs. Mildred S. Burchill, wife of Charles A. Burchill, of this city, following an operation. Deceased had been in failing health for the past few months and an emergency operation performed on Saturday at the hospital failed to save her life. She was a daughter of Joseph E. and the late Mrs. McCutcheon, of this city. Surviving besides her father and husband, are two brothers, Charles and Lee, both of this city, and two sisters, Mrs. R. S. Wilby, and Mrs. William D. Boone of North Devon. The deceased who was Mr. Burchill's second wife was a young woman possessed of a happy and sociable disposition, was fond of outdoor sports, particularly motoring and fishing and was highly esteemed in the community. Her sad and untimely death is deeply regretted and there is universal sympathy for the husband and family in their great bereavement.

The funeral will be held on Tuesday from the residence, 127 George Street, with services to be conducted at 2.30 o'clock by Rev. G. W. Guilou. Interment will be made in the Rural cemetery.

ST. ANDREW'S DAY RECALLS OLD MEMORIES

A Street Parade Once Featured the Local Celebration—The Annual Dinner Was Always a Big Event.

Saint Andrews day, always joyously celebrated in this city, is certain to recall old and pleasant memories to a great many citizens. In the good old days winter had the habit of beginning earlier than is the case in the present age, and November 30th usually found snow on the ground and the river frozen over. A gathering of the local Scots would assemble quite early in the Barker House, then conducted by the late F. B. Coleman, who while not a Scot knew how to draw the long bow with the best of them. A delegation from Stanley, headed by the late Daniel Hossack, with his bag pipes, would put in an appearance, sleighs would be requisitioned and the party would set out on a fraternal tour of the city. A Regent Street hotel, of which the late Norman MacDonald was one of the proprietors, was usually the first stopping place. The Queen Hotel was next visited and the party always received a cordial welcome from mine host the late J. A. Edwards, who like Mr. MacDonald was an active member of the Society. Other calls would be made and the party would always wind up with a visit to the late James Tennant, a genial son of the old land, whose place of business was on the Woodstock road.

Dinner at Night

In the evening the members of the Society and their guests, which included men prominent in the business and professional life of the city, would assemble at one of the large hotels for the annual dinner. These functions were always highly successful in every way and were talked about for weeks afterwards. They would break up at an early hour next day, when the members would form a procession and escort the president to his home to the swirl of the bag pipes. The last celebration of this kind took place at the Barker House in 1925, when the 100th anniversary of the Society was fittingly observed.

Not Much Change

There was reported not much change in the condition of Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne today. He spent rather a restless night, and today he was about the same as Saturday.
