his companion was cleared.

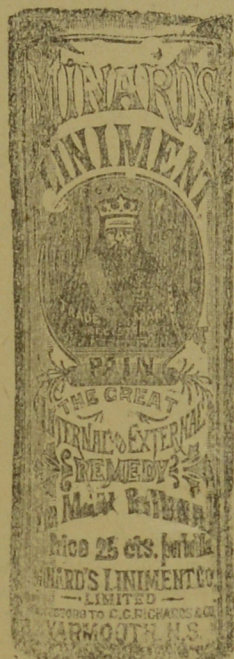
For a moment the wild idea of run-

## -Woman's Column-

### PUDDING RECIPES

#### Pineapple Pudding.

Cook together a cup of pineapple  
juice drained from a can of the fruit  
and a cup of water, when boiling add  
two tablespoons of cornstarch mixed  
to a smooth paste with cold water,  
also a tiny pinch of salt. Simmer for  
a few moments over hot water, then  
fold in the stiffly beaten whites of two  
eggs, pour into a wet mold and chill;  
turn out and garnish with the pine-  
apple slices cut in dice. Serve with  
custard made of the yolks of the eggs  
and a half-pint of milk. Sweeten and  
flavor to taste.

#### Cocoanut Mountain.

Heat a pint of milk to the boiling  
point and add three heaping table-  
spoons of granulated sugar. Blend  
two tablespoons of cornstarch with a  
little cold milk and add it carefully  
to the milk. Stir till smooth, and sim-  
mer over boiling water for fifteen min-  
utes. Add a cup of shredded cocoanut  
and the stiffly whipped whites of two  
eggs. Flavor with almond or vanilla.  
Pour into a deep mold and chill. Turn  
out and sprinkle with cocoanut. Serve  
with custard.

#### Dolly Varden Pudding.

Make a cornstarch blanc mange,  
using a pint of scalded milk, half a  
cup of sugar, and three tablespoons of  
cornstarch blended with half a cup of  
cold milk. Simmer over hot water till  
smooth. Then divide into three por-  
tions. Flavor one portion with vanil-  
la; melt a square of bitter chocolate  
and add to it a second portion, flavor-  
ing it also with vanilla and color the  
third portion pink with a little vege-  
table coloring. Flavor with rose. Wet  
a mold and pour the chocolate corn-  
starch in it, pressing it down smoothly  
and evenly, chill slightly, then place  
the white cornstarch on the chocolate  
and lastly pour in the pink. Chill for  
several hours, then turn out and gar-  
nish with whipped cream and mara-  
schino cherries.

#### Norwegian Pudding

Pick over, wash and soak half a  
pound of prunes, simmer till soft in the  
same water. Cool and pit the prunes  
and crack a few of them, adding the  
pits to the prunes and juice. Add a  
cup of sugar, a one-inch piece of cinn-  
amon, and a cup and a half of boiling  
water. Cook for a few moments, then  
add three tablespoonfuls of cornstarch  
blended with a little cold water. Cook  
till smooth, then add a tablespoon of  
lemon juice, remove the cinnamon and  
pour into a mold. Chill and serve with  
cream. Add the whites of two eggs  
beaten to a stiff froth and half a cup  
of walnut meats if you wish to make  
your pudding especially nice.

#### Turkish Pudding.

Bring a pint of water to the boiling  
point with a cup of brown sugar and  
cook for ten minutes, or until slightly  
thick. Then stir in two spoonfuls of  
cornstarch blended with a little cold  
milk and a cup of coarsely chopped  
walnut or pecan meats. Cook for 5  
or 10 minutes then pour into a wet  
mold. Serve very cold with cream.

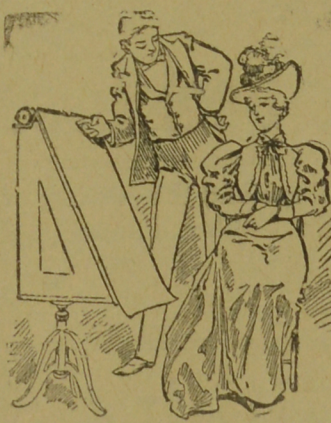
