ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

GETTING SHAKY

(Canadian Press.)

London, Jan. 26.—Again the attention of the public has been called to the danger of St. Paul's Cathedral collapsing through "senile decay" and an appeal for funds is made by the Dean to hasten the repairs. Two years ago the sum of \$350,000 was asked by the Cathedral Preservation Board and of this only about \$150,000 has so far been subscribed. It was then stated by the examining engineers that the original architect, the great Wren, had been very sparing in his use of materials. The constant jarring of the building by motor bus and other heavy traffic had, of course not been anticipated.

INSURANCE MERGER

MAY FALL THROUGH

(Canadian Press.)

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 26.—It is not the intention of the minister of finance to make public, for the present at least, the report of G. D. Finlayson, superintendent of insurance, whose findings are adverse to the projected merger of the Sun Life and Manufacturers Life Insurance Companies. The report was specially asked for by the Treasury Board and so far is a confidential document, the conclusion of it being that the proposed re-insurance agreement is not of advantage to the policyholders of the Manufacturers Life. While it is not so stated officially, the opinion at Ottawa is that little more will be heard of the merger. If the report and the public announcement of it mean anything, it means a straight tip to the companies interested not to go further. They have been advised not to make any changes in the agency forces.

ONE OF FIVE BROTHERS KILLED IN FRANCE

Bombardier DeVere Jack, clerk in the office of the 36th Field Battery, received the sad intelligence yesterday that his youngest brother, Private Edward Jack of C Company, 25th Battalion, C.E.F., had been killed in action in France on January 14. The casualty list issued from Ottawa last night contains Private Jack's name.

The death is the first amongst five brothers all serving in the Canadian army. Another brother, Douglas, is serving in the 25th Battalion and still another, Reginald, is with the 16th Battalion, having enlisted out of the 59th Winnipeg Rifles. In addition to Bombardier Jack with the 45th Battery in this city, there is another brother, Keith, who is with the 161st Battalion at Winnipeg.

The five brothers are sons of the late R. Melville Jack, who was in the employ of the New Brunswick Crown Land Department during the administration of the late Hon. James Mitchell, and a resident of Fredericton.

Bombardier Jack has many friends in this city and vicinity who will sympathize with him in his bereavement.

Windsor, Jan. 27.—Rev. W. S. Bullock, who is a captain of the American Legion being trained at Toronto, announced yesterday that the Legion was at full strength and that an order had been made to the Canadian Militia Department to raise a brigade of 6,000 men, made up exclusively of American citizens.

CORONER'S JURY CENSURES CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY

Brandon, Man., Jan. 26.—The jury investigating the collision between a snow train and a stock train in the Brandon yards, has given a verdict that it was caused by the negligence of the Canadian Pacific Railway in not safeguarding trains working in the yards, and that the inclemency of the weather contributed to a considerable extent.

MANITOBA GOVERNMENT. OWNED TELEPHONE SYSTEM

Winnipeg, Jan. 26.—The Manitoba Government telephones for the last fiscal year had a total revenue of \$1,769,539.20. Expenses were \$1,328,545.50, and interest charges \$416,502.91, leaving \$22,540 surplus.
