### ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

(Canadian Press.)

London, Jan. 20—Again the attention of the public has been called to the danger of St. Paul's Cathedral collapsing through "senile decay" and an appeal for funds is made by the Dean to heat and an appeal for funds is made by the Dean to hasten the repairs.
