36TH BATTERY KEEPS UP ITS RECORD OF VICTORIES

Beat Gibson 9 to 3 Last Night--Mike Murphy Played One Period For Gibson But Was in Poor Form--Many Shifts Made by Both Teams.

The 36th Field Battery put another mark in the win column last night, when they trimmed Gibson 9 to 3 in the Fredericton Hockey League. It looks as if the Battery would go through the league series with an unbroken record of victories. There was a fair sized crowd at the Arctic Rink last night to see the match, with the sympathies of the ladies strongly in favor of the Battery. Mike Murphy, the erstwhile "pro", emerged from his retirement and was used by Gibson as a substitute. Mike played at point for the second period. He was given a hearty reception from the crowd but failed to make a good showing, being in no condition to stand the pace. He was the object of some few attentions on the part of the artillerymen. On some of his dashes down the side he showed his old-time skill with the stick, but the dashes were few and far between. Mike was not used in the last period.

MANY SUBS PUT ON.

Both teams used subs galore. In addition to Murphy, Gibson had A. N. Sewell, "Ted" Burke and "Bonny" Ferguson on at various times. For the Battery the subs were Archibald, Burgey, Hutchinson and "Sammy" Wilson. Hutchinson is an old Truro player and Wilson is from Glace Bay. The third period was the time when most of the shifts were made.

THE GAME.

Gibson started out hard and put the Gunners' net in danger, but the Battery relieved the pressure. The first goal was scored by DeMont after nine minutes' play. DeMont by the way, scored five of the Battery goals. H. Harrison tied the

score two minutes later. Patterson and DeMont then each scored, the period ending, 36th Battery 3, Gibson 1.

In the second period Gibson again displayed lots of ginger but failed to score. The Battery was held off for eight minutes, when DeMont scored. A minute later he repeated the trick and Patterson scored his second goal later in the period.

The third period saw Gibson as lively as ever and when the losing team scored twice in quick succession the crowd gave them a great hand. After four minutes of play, L. Harrison scored and two minutes later B. Sewell scored, Gibson keeping the play close to the Battery net during the early part of the period. The artillerymen came back hard, however, scoring three goals inside two minutes. DeMont made the first and a minute later McSween made another. In not more than thirty seconds McSween, who played great hockey at all stages of the game, scored again.

The penalizing was light. Referee Dolan having his hands full handling six-men hockey all alone. There was hard checking with the Battery getting the better of it and now and then a "run-in" between two players.

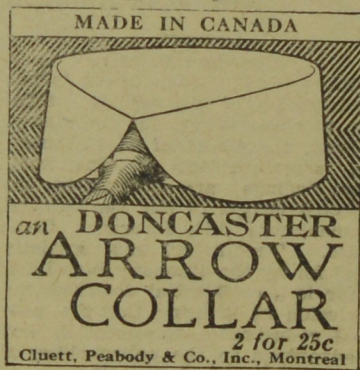
TEN THOUSAND OFFERED McFARLANE FOR MATCH

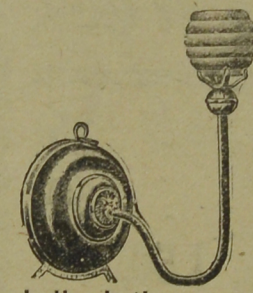

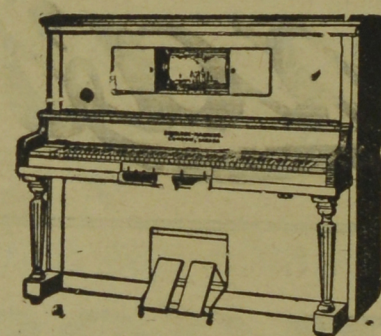
