Every woman of any means adopts as her godson the common soldiers of the trenches and when they come up from the firing line for their little six days leave, each splendid old gentlewoman takes her soldier to her country place, or her city residence, to whatever she has safe from the inroads of the invader, and there she nurses him as though he were her very own son.

This is one of the most effective things that could be done, for the soldier sees, perhaps for the first time, what he is defending.

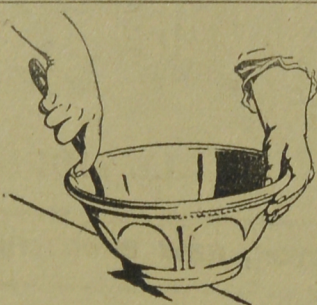
Kindly Toward Americans.

Conditions Normal.

A final word on the condition of France. "Most normal," Mrs. Adams spoke with conviction and admiration. "The theatres are open; restaurants serve guests with the same food; all France is under cultivation, right up to the edge of the trenches; the colonial soldiers of France fight and work in the munition factories, with gladness and loyalty; everywhere is abounding life that will not be downed even although the enemy its only two hours off, and all the border villages in ruins. I looked upon the gallant spirit of France and my heart was reverent within me. To see that is to renew one's faith in the abounding reserves of the human spirit."

A BY-LAW TO AMEND No. 16. A BY-LAW RELATING TO DOGS AND TO IMPOSE A TAX UPON THE OWNERS THEREOF.

[City of Fredericton BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

(Sgd.) Moses Mitchell
Mayor. 1. Sections one, two, three, four and twenty, entitled "No. 16. A By-Law relating to Dogs and to impose a Tax upon the Owners thereof," are hereby repealed and substituted in lieu thereof the sections of this by-law, as follows:

2. In this By-law, the expression "Dog" except where otherwise expressed, includes bitch.

3. In this By-law the expression "Owners" shall mean any person in possession of, or who shall harbor or suffer any dog to remain about his house or premises.

4. Every owner of a dog shall register such dog at the office of the City Treasurer on or before the first day of June in each and every year, the tax or fee for such registration shall be one dollar for the male dog and two dollars for a bitch, which must be paid to the City Treasurer before registration.

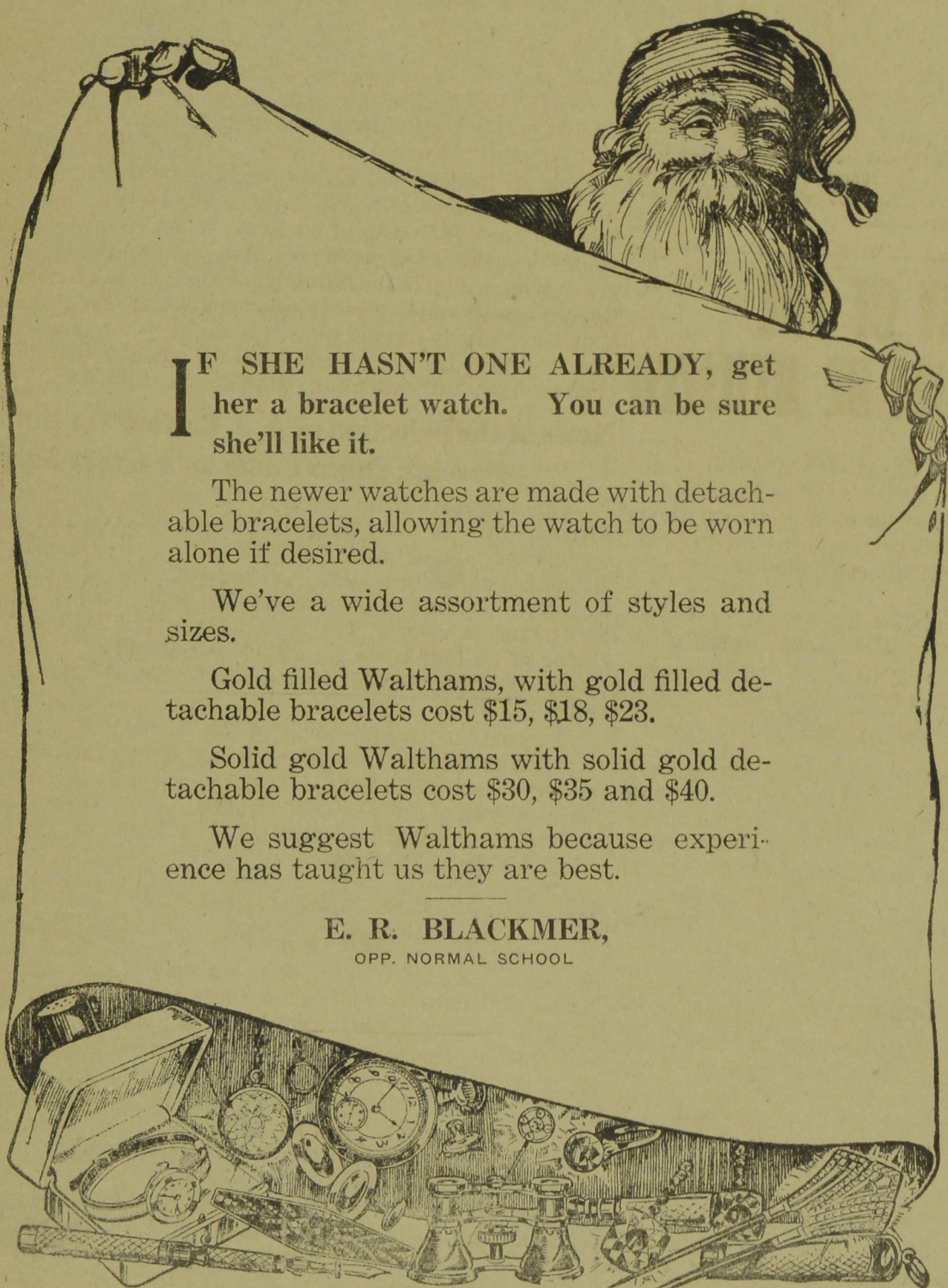
5. The owner of any dog who has not registered the same on or before the first day of June, as aforesaid, may register such dog at any time up to the first day of August next succeeding, for the sum of two dollars for the male dog and four dollars for the bitch.

6. No owner of any bitch shall suffer or permit the same to be upon any street while in heat.

7. Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this By-law, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars.
Passed and enacted this fifth day of December, A. D. 1916.
