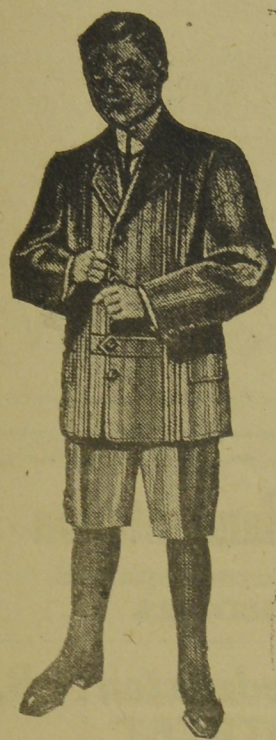

METHODISTS WILL OBSERVE
65TH ANNIVERSARY

Rev. J. W. McConnell of Amherst to Preach at Both Services Tomorrow.

The Methodists of Fredericton will observe the sixty-fifth anniversary of the building of the present church edifice on Sunday. Rev. J. W. McConnell, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, Amherst, N. S., is to be the preacher at both services. He is a former pastor of the local church. On Monday night he will be heard in a lecture on Billy Sunday.

The old Methodist Church in this city was destroyed on November 11th, 1850, in the big fire which burned the greater part of Fredericton. The erection of the present building began in the following year. It was opened for worship in December, 1852. In December, 1902, the semi-centennial of the church was celebrated. Former pastors of the church were brought from various parts of Canada to aid in the celebration.

SHOE REPAIRERS MAKE
SECOND RAISE IN PRICES

Sole Leather Has Doubled in Price Since the War Began.

The cost of repairing shoes in Fredericton has received another boost, the second since the war began. The price card is not yet out, but it is understood that all the shoe repairing shops of the city are pledged to stand by the new schedule. This is the third instance within a few weeks of the advance in the cost of living. Each one has hit the poor down-trodden consumer hard. The first was the increase in the price of bread to ten cents per loaf. The second was the increase in the price of shaving from ten to fifteen cents. The last is the increase of the shoe repairers.

It is announced that it will cost \$1.90 to get a pair of soles sewed on men's boots and the heels repaired. Before the war the cost was \$1.25 and the first increase was to \$1.75. The same work with the soles nailed will cost \$1.75. The ante-bellum price was \$1.00 and the first boost was to \$1.50.

For women's shoes this work with sewed soles will cost \$1.50 and with nailed soles \$1.25.

Men's half soles will cost \$1.25. The cost of other repair work will be in proportion.

The shoe repairers state that the advance in the price of leather has forced them to take this step. Sole leather is now double the price it was before the war. Rubber heels now cost no more than leather heels.
